Woman and Her Varied Interests

Social and Club News, Personals, Fashions, Home Hints and Other Items of Interest to the World Feminine.

Concerning Women.

Miss Anita Belleville, who acts as purveyor of the correct time in London, is probably the only woman to hold such a position in the world.

Girl students who want to earn their way through college have formed a feminine education earners' union and the adoption of a wage scale.

Since the enactment of the woman's labor law in Pennsylvania it has done much to lessen the hardships endured by the feminine sex compelled to work for a living.

The Russian minister of imperial railroads has sanctioned the admission of a great number of qualified women into the engineering section of his department.

Filipino women are now given regular courses of instruction in cooking, lace making, hygiene and care of babies by a department instituted by the United States government.

Of the 73 women who took examinations last year for positions as sorters in the British postal department, 559 qualified, out of which number seventy were given appointments.

Miss Lena Baltz of Pocatontos, Ark., has demonstrated that a woman can be just as big a success as a farmer as a man, for she cleared \$222.15 from one-tenth of an acre of ground.

Running Furnaces.

A furnace authority says: "In mild weather it is not necessary to 'shake down' the furnace fire. You can economize on fuel and still have a fire ready to start full blast should the north wind begin to blow. With the furnace poker rake down only part of the ashes, forming a sort of crater by poking out the ashes thoroughly from the bottom and the top. Into this 'crater' put the fresh coal. This is really a sort of furnace without the larger one and holds the fire without using coal to heat the whole furnace. When the cold snap comes shake the grate thoroughly, shovel on fresh coal and open the drafts."

New Glassware.

The newest glassware is of rock crystal and the tumbler for water has a tall, slender stem and other glasses the same shape in miniature. With the home dinner finger bowls of rock crystal, with a little plate to match, and a pretty lace doily under the bowl are brought in with the dessert plates, and with the plates for fruits and bonbons at a more formal affair.

REVELATIONS ARE MADE REGARDING CHILD LABOR

BERLIN, Jan. 6.—Startling revelations concerning child traffic in Germany are contained in a book published today by Mme. Henrietta Arendt, of Stuttgart. She charges that the sale of children goes on unintermittently with the silent consent of public opinion; parents actually disposing of them to the highest bidder among better-situated childless families. In a single month she collected 227 advertisements inserted in the newspapers by persons offering to sell or "adopt" children. As many of the little ones are "adopted" merely for future exploitation, it really means a slave traffic of the most remarkable character, says Mme. Arendt. In a number of the papers the advertisements regarding children are interspersed with those for the sale of cattle and pigs.
