

TRAVELING NURSE UNDER CRITICISM

SUPREMACY OF THIS COUNTY
THINKS HER WORK HAS
BEEN SUPERFLUOUS

Resolutions Adopted by County School Superintendents Condemning Inspection as Conducted by Mrs. Katherine J. Kelley, Employed by the State Board of Health.

Supt. I. E. Young of the Umatilla county schools, was one of those most instrumental in securing the passage of a resolution by the county superintendents in session at Salem criticizing the work being done by Mrs. Katherine J. Kelley, state school nurse employed by the state board of health. He declared that she had been superficial in her investigation of schools in this county, had completely ignored him and had made reports manifestly unfair.

The following is the resolution adopted:

"Resolved, That we, the County School Superintendents of Oregon, in convention assembled in Salem, are heartily in favor of medical inspection in the public schools, the same to be conducted by the state board of health, working through the office of the superintendent of public instruction, and the offices of the county superintendents. But we feel that the inspections made by Mrs. Katherine J. Kelley, traveling nurse for the state board of health, are superficial in the extreme, and, consequently, unfair.

"We believe any inspection should be thorough and constructive and that modern and improved schools should be commended. We further believe that the names of defective children should be omitted from Mrs. Kelley's published reports."

In speaking for the resolution, Supt. Young said:

"The inspections should be made through the state superintendent and the county superintendents. It is important work and should be done thoroughly. I have been informed by the teachers that Mrs. Kelley spent from three to ten minutes in the schools. She criticized the sanitary conditions of the Pilot Rock school, which is practically a new building and well equipped. It has a modern heating and ventilating system, and the school board is willing to do anything reasonable to improve conditions. A somewhat unfavorable report was made of Adams school, which has four rooms each of which is supplied with modern heating lighting and ventilating systems. Such criticisms are unfair to the teachers, the school boards and the county superintendents. I am satisfied proper inspections cannot be made unless more time is given to each school."
