MACON, Mo., Jan. 6.—John W. Nisbeth, of Beaver, Mo., was found not guilty of causing the death of Merle Drinkard, a stenographer, formerly in his employ, by a jury. It was alleged by the state that Miss Drinkard, who died last June, came to her death from a drug that had been given her.

George Critchfield, who is charged with being instrumental in causing the girl's death, and who was the principal witness for the state against Nisbeth, is under \$6000 bond. He was a clerk in Nisbeth's store. Critchfield testified that he had been sent to Kansas City by his employer to purchase the drug, but Nisbeth denied that he had anything to do with the girl's death and made counter-accusations against his former clerk.

TRADE IS QUIET IN THE WHEAT MARKET

Entire World's Market Is Slow for Day; Chicago Is Down a Mere Fraction.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Closing prices for wheat were - $\frac{1}{8}$ off from Saturday with opening figures down an additional fraction.

There was a very quiet tone in the trade abroad, values as a rule being fractionally lower than on Saturday. Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the wheat market was higher on steadiness in America and firmness in Buenos Ayres. La Platte offers are firmer with Russian offers limited and Australian offering rather sparingly. Heavy rain is reported in Argentina. Later there was some recession with some profit taking largely in sympathy with corn and larger world's shipments.

World's shipments: Wheat, 11, 632,000 bushels; corn, 2,561,000. Russian wheat shipments, 2,904,000; Danube, 1,784,000 bushels.

Cattle Supplies Are Heavy.

As expected, there was a rather heavy run of cattle in the North Portland yards over Sunday. Total receipts were 3373 head, compared with 551 last Monday, 338 a year ago and but 23 head on this same day two years ago.

Of late there has been a shade of weakness in the local cattle trade. This is attributed directly to the fact that prices of meats has been so high that consumption demand is limited, therefore offerings of livestock more than meet immediate requirements of killers.

VISCOUNT SNATCHES PURSE.

Scion of Old French Family, Starving, Asks to Be Sent to Jail.

PARIS, Jan. 6.—Viscount Charles Enguerand de Marigny, scion of an old French family, penniless and starving, snatched a pocketbook from a woman in the street here. He told the police he wished to be sent to prison, where he could be obtained food and shelter from the bitter cold. The viscount's father once was wealthy, but lost everything in a bank failure.

Viscount de Marigny served with the French cavalry forces in the Morocco campaign and was awarded a medal.

Recently he was discharged from the army his term of service having expired. He spent his savings, he said, vainly seeking employment. The police complied with the request and sent De Marigny to jail.

Anti-Bellum Telegrapher Dies.

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 6.—Charles E. Ways, 72 years old, assistant general traffic manager of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, died here. He was employed as a telegrapher at Harper's Ferry, West Virginia, at the time of the John Brown raid and sent the telegram that announced Brown's attack on the United States arsenal at Harper's Ferry.
