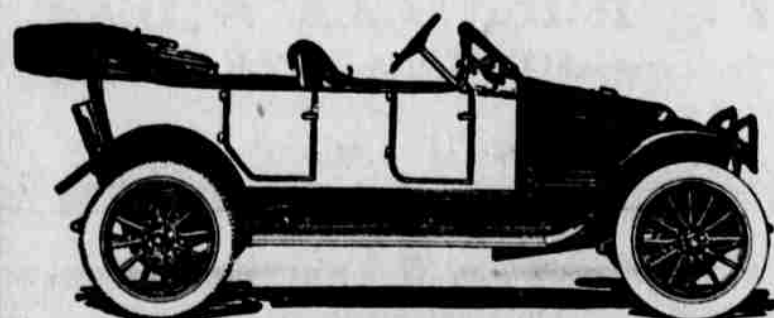

Drumheller brings suit against Telegraph Co.

An intimated in an interview with the East Oregonian several weeks ago, Samuel Drumheller, prominent Walla Walla stockman, has commenced suit against the Western Union Telegraph Co., for damages resulting from an alleged mistake in transmitting a message. He claims that instead of sending the message "We will wait six days as requested," as received, the company employees made the "six" read "sixty."

Mr. Drumheller states that as a result of the change in the message he was subjected to inconvenience and trouble and an actual damage of \$1800, and has filed suit for that amount in the Walla Walla court.

A judgment secured against him in Spokane in the case of Gage vs. Drumheller, was the cause. It is stated Mr. Drumheller asked a few days' delay in paying the judgment and that the Exchange National bank granted him six days, but that the message read "sixty." As a result he was in a hurry to pay. Proceedings were started to collect and other creditors hearing of it jumped in and filed actions in Pendleton.

These actions were immediately settled and dismissed but Mr. Drumheller wants the company to pay him.

GLYNN TO VETO BILLS EXCEPT FOR NECESSITIES

ALBANY, Jan. 7.—Economic was Governor Glynn's text in his message at the convening of the state legislature today. He urged the abolition of luxury and sinecures in the state government and warned the legislators against "vicious and foolish" lawmaking. It is understood he will veto all appropriations except for absolute necessities.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7.—Benjamin Brown, president and manager of the Jewish Agricultural and Colonial Association, of Utah, arrived in Portland to organize a Jewish agricultural colony in Oregon.
