WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—After a two hour conference between Attorney General McReynolds and Chairman Howard Elliott, of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, it was understood that the New Haven will agree to a reorganization to restore competition in transportation throughout New England. No official announcement was made, but Elliott will remain in Washington for several days, and it was believed he may settle details of the plan.

EYE KEPT ON REVOLUTION.

United States Survey Ship Ordered to Port au Prince.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The survey ship Eagle, at Gonaves, Hayti, was ordered to Port au Prince, a sail on only a few hours, to observe the latest revolution, at the request of the state department. The warship Petrel or the Nashville may be ordered to Hayti from Dominican waters if the revolution should take on a more serious aspect.

Meager reports to the state department were summarized in this statement:

"The state department is informed of the capture at Thomazeau of one Celestin, a Haytian exile, who was the promoter of the disturbance on the Haytian frontier. Government troops occupied Thomazeau on January 2 and after the capture and execution of several revolutionists quiet was restored."

TO DETERMINE LIABILITY OF OWNERS OF TITANIC

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Whether the liability of the Oceanic Navigation company, as owner of the ill-fated Titanic which went down off the Newfoundland banks nearly two years ago with 1,635 persons, on the giant ship's maiden voyage from London to New York, shall be governed by American or British law, will be decided by arguments scheduled to begin before the United States supreme court.

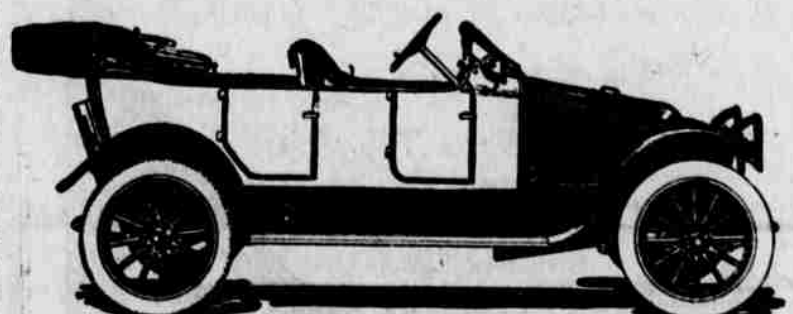

Testimony Given in Hearing Before Mary F. Bell.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 8.—Testimony regarding a bill in equity brought by the Bell Telephone company against the Johnstown Telephone company of Johnstown, Pa., charging conspiracy, was given by the defense in the government suit before Mary F. Bell, the special examiner appointed by the United States district court of Oregon.
