WHEAT MARKET TAKES A COMPLETE CHANGE

Chicago Market Closes 1-4 to 1-2 Cent Higher After an Opening Loss for Both Options.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Sentiment in the wheat market was completely reversed after the opening loss of 1-4c for May and 1-8c for July. Closing figures for options were 1-4c up for May and 1-2c for July.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the wheat market was easy. American cables and pressure at Winnipeg caused moderate realizing at opening here and values declined. Later there was a further recession with undertone easy.

SWINE PRICES HIGH IN PORTLAND YARDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—One extra fancy load of swine sold at \$8.20 in the North Portland market this morning, establishing a new high record for the present movement with an advance of a dime above yesterday's figures.

There was a rather liberal run reported in the yards over night but the market was very strong and several loads sold at \$8.6 and \$8.10 during the early trading.

Considerable weakness is shown in the cattle market at North Portland. While an occasion lot of grain fed steers may be sold around \$8, still this price is very misleading as it really does not represent the actual trend of the trade. What may safely be considered the top of the market for first class steers is \$7.75. It takes something of exceptional quality to bring even a fraction above this; in fact it is debatable whether anything recently offered here is better than stuff that has sold of late around that price.
