SELLING OF DRUMMERS' SAMPLES IS NOT LEGAL

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—Selling of drummer's samples is an infraction of the law in this state according to a ruling of the state railroad commission. The commission takes the view expressed in a recent ruling by the interstate commerce commission to the effect that it is discriminatory against local dealers to permit drummers to carry samples as baggage or excess baggage and be allowed to sell them, while the merchant has to pay freight on the goods he sells. The commission holds this would be unjust discrimination by a railroad in favor of certain individuals or firms.

**Pin the Socks.**  
Children's stockings may be rolled and so kept in pairs, but children's socks should be pinned together, says the Philadelphia North American. Rolling them is apt to stretch the top, and if the tops are stretched, the socks will not stay in place when worn.

**When Lamp Falls.**  
When a lamp falls to give a good light there is a cause for it, and in 99 cases out of 100 the difficulty rests with the one whose duty it is to care for the lamp, rather than with the lamp itself, says the Newark News.

If the wick of the oil lamp is too short, is crowded, or is cut unevenly, the lamp will not give a perfect light. The top of the wick should be rubbed off every day after it is used. A piece of blotting paper is excellent for this; it removes the charred particles from the wick and does not break the threads, which cutting often will do. A boiling of the wick and burner in vinegar and water will clear it up wonderfully. Plenty of time must be allowed for the wick to dry thoroughly.

**Fern for Table.**  
The hardy fern with glossy leaves is a much better plant for the table than the delicate fern, says the Chicago Journal. The fern will do better in a receptacle with good drainage. Hence it is well to be sure of this important detail of the fern pot.

**Worth Knowing.**  
The screws on the wringer should be loosened after every using; then the rubbers should wear well for a long time.

After using a fireless cooker see that the radiators and also the wells are wiped perfectly dry.

Casserole and other pottery dishes should never be placed in a very hot oven or on a hot stove without first being warmed a little. A sudden change of temperature may cause them to crack.

A little grated cheese added to a cream sauce makes a tasty accompaniment to boiled turnips, says the Newark News.

An old-fashioned way of cleaning brass is to mix wood ashes with lemon juice. Apply the mixture with a soft rag and polish with another.

If a practice is made of dusting a little powder into gloves before putting them on, the gloves will keep their shape better and wear longer.

**ALBANY WILL SOON HAVE NEW POSTOFFICE**

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 10.—That actual construction work will start on the Albany postoffice and federal building April 1, to be completed within a year thereafter, was the statement of Fred A. Erickson, Salem contractor, who was awarded the contract for the lowest bid, \$53,282. Mr. Erickson is in the city looking the site over and conferring with Postmaster Van Winkle. Mr. Erickson said that he had received notice of the approval of his bond and the official acceptance of the contract.

It calls for a two story structure, with a ground area of 4700 feet, stone, and terra cotta facing with tin roof, including mechanical equipments, interior lighting fixtures and approaches.

**Cattle Poisoner at Work.**

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 10.—The county commissioners offered a standing reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of any person who poisons cattle. The action came as the result of complaints of depredations from all parts of the county.
