Cross Sugar Pine Found.
MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 12.—Dennis McCarty, official timber cruiser for Coos county, has filed his report of 1913, which shows he has cruised 18,300,000,000 feet since the contract was let three years ago. McCarty's force of cruisers found 6,500,000 feet of sugar and yellow pine in the extreme southern part of the county this year, which was not known to exist. The report does not include the total, as the contract is not completed.

SEGREGATION IS URGED AS REMEDY

SPEAKER AT RACE BETTERMENT CONFERENCE SAYS PLAN HAS WORKED WELL

Better Than Sterilization for Defectives—Other Speakers Dwell Upon Benefits of Eugenics—Importance of Marriage—Many Interesting Subjects Are Discussed.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Jan. 12.—Segregation rather than sterilization of defectives, or restrictive marriage laws, was urged today as an important factor in race betterment, by Hastings M. Hart, director of the department of child helping of the Russell Sage Foundation, New York, at today's final session of the National Conference on Race Betterment.

"In order to restrict and ultimately to put an end to the production of defective delinquents," said Dr. Hart, "it is necessary to restrict the propagation of the feeble-minded variety of the human race. This may be undertaken by educating the people in the principles of eugenics, by laws restricting marriage, by sterilization of defectives and by segregation."

"Education against the marriage of the unfit reaches only the intelligent and is entirely unavailing with the classes that are most dangerous to the public welfare. Restrictive marriage laws exercise only a partial influence. Sterilization is at best only a partial remedy."

"Segregation is the most practical and effective method. It has been thoroughly and successfully tested with the insane. There are in the United States more than 150,000 persons segregated in hospitals and asylums for the insane. Thirty years ago the segregation of the insane seemed almost a hopeless undertaking. What has been done for the insane can be done for the subject of 'Infant Mortality and Marriage Selection.'"

Prof. Roswell Hill Johnson of the University of Pittsburgh, said in part: "It is frequently said that eugenics is futile because the selection of mates in men cannot possibly be improved since it is wholly a personal and capricious thing. This ignores the three stages involved in selection by a concentration upon the last. These three stages are, first, the range of our associates, the choice from these associates of those whom we admire, with whom friendly relations are instituted, and, third, the actual 'falling in love.' In this first stage are three factors. First, the structure of the social unit to which we belong. How frequently matings are determined by the church, school or neighborhood; second by our parents who determine these church, school and neighborhood relationships."

"The mother who sends her girl to college rather than into the fashionable set, determines largely the type of her fiancé, not only because her associates are different in the two cases, but because her ideals are differently built up. The young man who spends his time with fast girls is indirectly determining the kind of girl he will marry. If indeed, he is not thereby led to abandon marriage. Let young persons of both sexes be educated together, as they are now in many institutions. Let parents interest themselves in furthering the acquaintance of eligible friends of opposite sex, though without throwing the young people together obviously and thus nullifying the advantage. Let the young people be impressed with the thought that marriage is their ideal and normal goal of life and let all cynical and pessimistic views of marriage be opposed."

"Above all things, let young people have the widest range of acquaintance possible. Children and youths, nowadays, don't know enough of their kind. School and church do not offer sufficient range. Let civic authorities inaugurate municipal dances, as has been done by the mayor of one American city. Properly supervised there are for the greater good of individual and of the race in future generations."

"Teach the young man that mere physical beauty, except insofar as it indicates physical well being, trivial mental qualities such as vivacity and a forced and feeble attempt at wit, and devotion to stylish dressing are very subordinate. Let the young people see that they are marrying for a long period, that in such circumstances flashy and assumed characteristics are negligible; that they must keep watch against too great a play of mere beauty and vivacity upon the emotions in opposition to more worthy characteristics. For there is a very slight chance for reason after love actually exists."

Paris Styles Bolder Yet.
NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Brick red hair, to be worn preferably with green coats and corkscrew skirts, is what he ladies of Paris are wearing, according to Charles C. Kurzman, a man milliner who has been abroad studying hatting. He arrived on the Lusitania.

The corkscrew skirt can only be donned by the fair wearer of the garment whirling round and round like a music-mad Dervish. Once safe and inside it, she drapes a few yards of lace around it corkscrew style, and there you are.

With the brick red hair of the women and the sky blue locks of the more aesthetic of the Parisian dandies, Mr. Kurzman said that fashionable Paris looked like a futurist picture of a railroad yard on a rainy night.

How to Use Bananas.

For banana sponge peel six ripe bananas and mash the pulp. Add four ounces of sugar, the juice of a lemon and an ounce of gelatin dissolved in three supfuls of water and stir the mixture over the fire for a few minutes. Let it cool, and when it is nearly set add the whites of two eggs beaten stiff. Pour in a mold. Serve with cream whipped or unwhipped. Bananas make a good substitute for vegetables. They should, however, be served in place of potatoes or some other starchy vegetable and should be accompanied or followed by a green vegetable or salad. One way to cook them when they are to take the place of a vegetable is to bake them. In some of the banana growing countries they are baked in the ashes in their own skins until they burst open. A better way in this country is to remove one section of the peel, free the pulp from the rest of the skin and return it whole, cover it with the section peeled off and bake in the oven until the skin is charred and the pulp soft all the way through. The pulp should then be carefully removed from the skin to the hot dish and served with butter and salt and pepper or with an unsweetened sauce—for instance, butter with a little lemon juice or a teaspoonful of sherry added just before it is poured over the bananas.

Tulle Sashes.

Tulle sashes are made with beaded edges. One, of black and white tulle used together, has a deep bead ornament on the end, made of beads or gray, green and silver. The ornament ends in a long bead fringe. Sometimes pink and white, blue and white, black and green and other color combinations of tulle are used, and harmonizing bead ornaments are used with them.

Fur hats with a crown of animal pelt or a band of trimming are preferred to those fashioned entirely of fur.
