

COLLECTION TAXES SOON TO COMMENCE

ASSESSOR C. P. STRAIN, UNDER
NEW LAW, WILL RECEIVE
MONEY DIRECT.

Sheriff Still Authorized to Collect Delinquent Taxes—Number of Changes Have Been Made in Procedure—No more Rebates for Prompt Payments Will be Made.

On or before February 1, Assessor C. P. Strain will turn over his tax rolls to County Treasurer G. W. Bradley and the annual harvest of gold will be on. The county treasurer is ready to commence his work at any time now but it will be probably the first of next month before he secures the books. This will be the first time that the taxes have been paid in directly to the treasurer as the law heretofore has made the sheriff the tax collector. He is still the collector of delinquent taxes.

There are a number of changes in the regulations for taxpaying this year. For instance, there will be no more rebates for prompt payment. The property owner still has the option of paying half of his taxes by April 7 and the other half before Sept. 3 but after April 1, he will be charged one per cent interest each month.

The following is a resume of the new tax law provisions, (Sec. 3682, Chapter 184, 1912 Session Laws):

The county treasurer is made collector of all except delinquent taxes; the sheriff collecting delinquent taxes the same as before.

No rebates will be paid on any taxes. (Three per cent was formerly allowed if paid before March 15th.)

All taxes are due and payable before April 1st. They are not delinquent until September 1st, but a penalty of one per cent per month is charged on all taxes paid after April 1st, and before September 1st. The first half may be paid before April 1st, but a penalty of one per cent per month is charged on the remaining half if paid before September 1st.

On all taxes unpaid on the 1st of September a penalty of ten per cent is imposed and one per cent per month interest is collected from that date.

On October 1st, delinquent certificates bearing interest at the rate of 15 per cent per annum shall be issued.

WESTERN UNION COMPANY ANSWERS DRUMHELLER SUIT

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 12.—The Western Union filed an answer in superior court yesterday to the suit recently brought by Samuel Drumheller in which Mr. Drumheller asked \$2500 damages. He complained that the telegraph company had changed a word in a message received by him and that it caused him damage and inconvenience.

The Western Union in its answer states that each telegraph blank expressly states the company is not to be held liable for damages unless written statement is filed with the company within 60 days and that in this case this was not done. Furthermore, it is stated the message cost but 25 cents and was an unimportant message, while if 12 cents had been added to the message it would have been repeated and that Mr. Drumheller can recover no more than 25 cents; also that he should have investigated further when he received a reply that the Exchange National bank of Spokane would wait 60 days for its money, when he had asked for but five or six days' delay.

The Western Union asks to go free, or in any event, to pay no more than 25 cents.

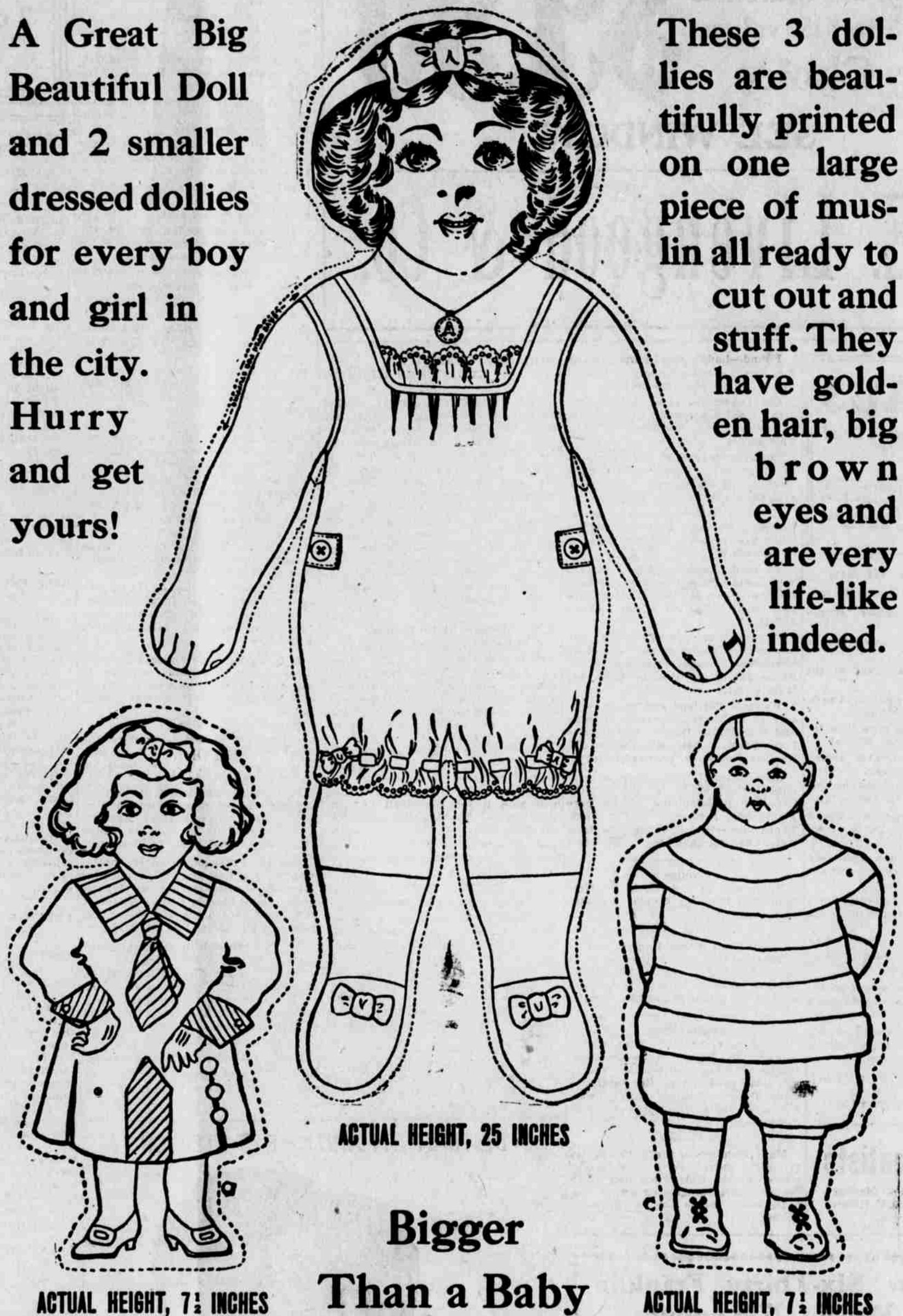
