LOOK INTO CAT COSTS \$25.

Roommate Objects to Operation on Pet and Judge Frowns, Too.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 14.—When C. P. Galloway, a student in the Kansas City Veterinary Hospital was two years old he was given a neat zinc watch at Christmas time. Within an hour he knew what was inside it and within another hour he had it back in its proper shape and going again. When he came to school here he did not hesitate to tell H. L. Wright, his roommate, about the watch incidents of his childhood, in all of which everything came out of something and some of it went back. Wright, who is a veterinarian, said that he had heard of the fact that Mr. Galloway was attending a veterinary college. Mr. Wright flew in the face of fate and kept a cat.

In court today Wright testified that the operation was almost over when he detected the smell of ether and followed Galloway operating on the room pet. He reprimanded him, he said, and told him to sew the cat up immediately and not to be so curious thereafter. The cat was duly sewed up, regained her feet and after glaring at Galloway indignantly and with back curved for several minutes turned on her paw and left the flat. She was apparently none the worse for the inventory taken by Galloway. Calloway, who was summoned to court by the angry Mr. Wright, said that he thought it the proper and scientific thing to do and that he would not have thought of meddling with the cat had he not felt perfectly confident of putting everything back as he found it. The court failed to see the merit of his research and he was fined \$25.

Black Giant Race Found.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—A tribe of black giants known as "Jeng" inhabiting a district of the White Nile, in the Sudan, 1000 miles south of Khartoum, has been described by the Rev. C. Lea-Wilson, the leader of a medical mission. There are about 8000 people in the tribe and they live in the neighborhood of the Bah-el-Ghazal, the largest of the White Nile. They are among the tallest tribes in the world, says Mr. Lea-Wilson. "They are jet black, typical negroes, and do not practice either cannibalism or human sacrifices. I have never seen among them a case of cruelty to women or children. For some reason, apparently unknown even to themselves, all adults have six of their lower teeth removed. They

have a habit when at rest of standing on one foot like storks."

POLICE WOMEN FOR WORK IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Chicago's experiment with police women has proved so successful that Mayor M. L. C. Funkhouser, second deputy superintendent of police, today announced that he will ask the city council for funds to employ 15 more women police.

"The women 'bluecoats' have done a wonderful amount of good," said Mayor Funkhouser. "The 10 we have on the force have been assigned to dance halls and the curbing they have done there has been conducive of much good."

"We need more police women. We want a squad, what might be called a flitting squad, to look out for the obnoxious flirts and mashers who terrorize girls in moving picture theaters and in the downtown section."

AGED MONEY ORDERS ARE FOUND UNPAID

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 14.—While looking through some old papers belonging to his father-in-law, Isaac Levens, Frank Rowell found two money orders for \$241.71 each, dated October 4, 1859, and issued to L. D. Tracey by the Wells-Fargo Express company and which had never been cashed. The orders had been drawn at Portland and were payable at New Orleans.

ONCE MODEL OF VIRTUE NOW IN PENITENTIARY

PARIS, Jan. 14.—Awarded the annual prize at Amiens three years ago for "virtue and nobility of character," Lucie Chantrel today began serving a sentence of life imprisonment for causing the death of her lover, who had killed her, by throwing a pint of vitriol over him while he slept.

1646 STUDENTS ATTEND AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 14.—There are 1646 students enrolled in the various departments of the Oregon Agricultural college. This number represents an increase of more than 20 per cent in the registration of one year ago, and does not include the short course students. The following registration figures were prepared by Secretary W. A. Jensen: Total enrollment, excluding students in short courses, 1546; number of men, 1089; number of women, 563; increase over registration at end of first semester by a year ago, 20.5 per cent. The registration represents all counties of Oregon, 31 different states and eight foreign countries. Of the states other than Oregon represented there are 39 students from California, 78 from Washington, 25 from Idaho, 12 from New York and 11 from Illinois.

HUERTA WILL PLACE THE BLAME ON UNITED STATES

MEXICO, Jan. 14.—Huerta's decree suspending payment of interest on the national debt is interpreted here as an attempt on his part to anger European powers at the United States inasmuch as it is generally recognized that Mexico's financial duties were caused by the American non-recognition of the Huerta regime. It is said the president believed his bondholders will blame the administration when their pocketbooks are touched. English and French bankers are principally affected.

WHITE SALMON, TOO WILL GET THE TANGO

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Jan. 13.—A series of subscription dances is to be given in White Salmon, the first to take place Friday. An instructor from Seattle is to be here to teach the club members the tango.

Dressed Hog Weighs 700

SHERWOOD, Ore., Jan. 14.—What promises to be a record for dressed hogs in this part of the county has been reported by Mr. Fickens, of this place. Mr. Fickens butchered a hog during the week that, after being dressed, weighed 700 pounds. The animal was shot twice with a .22 special rifle without any noticeable result, and was finally killed with a carbine. Six men were required to handle it.

PRICES OF SHOES TO GO TO \$10, DEALERS SAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—In the opinion of speakers at the annual convention of the National Shoe Retailers' association, the retail price of shoes may soon reach \$10 a pair. "Pure shoe laws," already adopted in 25 states and several measures of the same nature now pending in congress were given as the chief causes for increasing the price of footwear.

FORMER HELIX RESIDENT PASSES AWAY IN IDAHO

(From the Winthrop, Iowa, News.) Philander C. Scott, was born May 7, 1856 at Seward, Ill. At the age of three years he was left an orphan, in company with four brothers. He was taken to the home of his uncle, James Hill, at St. Thomas, Ontario, Canada, where he remained until the age of 15. He returned, and joined his brothers in farming at Seward, Ill. His grandfather, William Scott, appears in the revolutionary war as one of the prison ship Marlyrs. In turn his son, William Scott, Jr., Philander's father, commanded a company in the 163rd Infantry, New York, war of 1812. In 1848 Philander C., father, settled near the present village of Seward, Ill., where the deceased was born.

On October 17, 1878, he married Ida M. Lane near Winthrop, Iowa. They lived near Waterloo, Iowa, for many years. To their union were born five children, Mrs. Sadie L. Child, of Lamont; Mrs. Loretta F. Gray of Catoosa, Oklahoma; Miss Edith L. and Edith M. Scott of American Falls, Idaho, and William E., preceded him June 9, 1912.

In 1906 they moved to Helix, Oregon, and in 1910 they moved to American Falls, Idaho. The deceased died at Pocatello, December 10, 1913, of uremic poisoning, his sickness being of a very short duration. He was a member of the Baptist church.

The funeral was held in Masonville, December 20. Services were conducted by Rev. Cooper of the M. E. church. He was laid to rest in the Fairview cemetery at that place. The text was taken from First Peter 24-25 verses.

He was an I. O. O. F. of Black Hawk Lodge, No. 72, of Waterloo, Ia. The I. O. O. F. of Pocatello, Idaho, held services over the remains before leaving there. The pall bearers were I. O. O. F. brothers.

He leaves to mourn his loss his wife and four daughters, two brothers—Jonathan, of Winthrop, Iowa, and Hurschel of Seward, Ill., and many relatives and friends.

Metcalf; second alternate, Merrill D. Richmond; third alternate, Kenneth A. Moores, all of Salem.

REFERENDUM TO SETTLE SQUABBLE OVER OFFICE

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The method adopted by Representative Archibald C. Hart, of the Sixth New Jersey district to settle the question of which democrat shall be the postmaster in places where more than one democrat is a candidate, has caused a stir in political circles and is attracting the attention of his fellow congressmen. In Tenafly, N. J., where the republican incumbent has held office over for more than a year, numerous democrats have wanted the \$2000 job. Finally, the contest narrowed down to a fight between C. J. Bross and William F. Boedeker. Representative Hart then hit upon the referendum scheme with the result that Bross, it is reported, secured a majority of votes. Mr. Hart made it strictly a party affair, sending cards which asked for an expression of preference, to every recognized democrat in the municipality.

Cupid Breaks Into Jail

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15.—Jail bars and prison walls failed to block Dan Cupid when Eastland Britton, the 17-year-old highwayman, who held up the Athens Hotel in Oakland, married Gertrude Crawford, the girl for whom he confessed he robbed. The ceremony was performed in the Hall of Records by Justice of the Peace Quinn and the witnesses were the boy's mother, Mrs. Emma Britton; Miss Beatrice McCall, formerly woman probation officer, and Ollie Snedinger, assistant probation officer of Oakland.

STRONG-ARM SQUAD BACK

Mayor Mitchell's Order to Clean Up Cause of Reorganization. NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The unusual activity of pickpockets and robbers caused Mayor Mitchell to instruct Police Commissioner McKay to "make the streets safe," and to accomplish this the "strong-arm squad" which went out of existence with the arrest and conviction of ex-Lieutenant Baker for the murder of Herman Rosenthal gambler, will be reorganized. The new squad will consist of 40 policemen in plain clothes. Mayor Mitchell has received a letter from Colonel George W. Goethals, engineer in charge of the Panama canal construction, declining the mayor's offer of the Police Commissionership.

The material taken from the Panama canal would make a pile higher than the Woolworth building in New York and 1350 feet square at the base.
