AEROPLANE TO SOON BE SAFE AS CARRIAGE

ORVILLE WRIGHT WORKING ON NEW INVENTION WHICH PROMISES SUCCESS.

Will Be Able to Fly from Chicago to New York in a Day in Perfect Ease—Automatic stabilizer is the secret which will make aeroplaning as simple as automobiling.

DAYTON, O., Jan. 19.—To fly from New York in a day with perfect safety in an aeroplane, to enjoy luncheon and dinner "a-wing" without danger and fit over Broadway to an aeroplane garage before the after-time no doubt will be wholly possible within a year, in the opinion of Orville Wright, noted inventor and airman who promises the public an aeroplane that will be as safe as the old family carriage. In the early spring he will show the waiting public his invention, he declares.

The answer is an automatic stabilizer, which Wright says makes aeroplaning as simple and safe as automobiling and absolutely "fool proof." High speed air craft handled by rank amateurs will easily make the Chicago-New York trip or any equal distance in any direction from any point. Filling the gasoline tank en route will be the sample necessity of shutting off the engine and letting the stabilizer do the rest. The new device, Wright claims in addition to insuring the perfect equilibrium in flight will bring the machine to earth with safety, without necessity of hazardous volplaning. It is only a question of time until the air line route will be the mode of travel for the busy business man, the butcher, the baker and the candlestick maker, Wright believes.

"We have invented an automatic stabilizer which will revolutionize flight," said Wright today in discussing his invention. "It will make flying fool proof or as far as anything can be. Our device insures lateral as well as fore and aft stability and it will not get out of order and insures absolute stability in flight."

Orville Wright and his assistants are working every day on the new device. A short time ago it was tested. Wright himself made seven complete circuits of the Wright aviation field here. His hands were not on the controlling bars. A smooth even flight was the result. The plane started to dip, the stabilizer came to the rescue and righted it. Dangerous angles were executed with the same result. Wright couldn't turn turtle when he tried.

The stabilizer prevents the plane from rising too quickly and sharply and if the speed falls below the point required for an even keel it automatically directs the machine to the ground.

Officials of the postal service are said to be investigating the new device preparatory to the delivery of the United States mail in western states where the mail is now carried by stage over long distances.

NORMAN, Okla., Jan. 19.—Oklahoma has enough salt to supply the entire world for thousands of years. If the water of the salt springs was evaporated daily the amount of salt thus obtained would amount to 400,000 gallons of pure salt. In a year this daily production would load a train 18 miles long. But this would be only part of the salt resources of Oklahoma. In some places, along the Cimarron river for instance, farmers actually shovel the salt into a wagon and haul it to market. In fact Oklahoma rest on an enormous bed of salt of great thickness. In prehistoric times this section was an inland sea which had no outlet or inlet. This sea, in the course of ages evaporated and again a thick layer of salt was formed. There followed some great inundation that left the sediment that forms the surface. Salt thus can be obtained by springs or by mining. The plain in the alfalfa country is sixty miles square. It is as level as a floor and mostly sand. One gallon of its water produces a quart of salt.

The Cimarron valley has two salt plains. The largest is eighty miles long and two miles wide. When the weather is dry evaporation is rapid and salt forms thickly on the surface of the earth. This salt surface makes a beautiful sight during the moonlight nights scintillating like a million stars. It is when the salt forms in such quantities during dry spells that farmers haul it away by wagon loads at no expense and little trouble.

Pur On Sweaters. Some of the new sweaters, in An-gora and Angora, have collars and cuffs of fur, and some are edged about the bottom with fur, says the St. Louis Star. White is always a popular color, and some of the brilliant red, yellow and purple shades are also much worn.

Food Kept Warm. A set of shelves above the radiator is useful in keeping food warm. The shelves should be fire skeleton racks, says the Detroit Free Press, and attached to the wall by means of screw eyes over hooks. They are very handy and durable.

Red Covers. Pretty covers for beds can be made of cretonne or heavy chintz, to be used instead of the time-honored counterpane, says the New York Sun. The covers are to be cut at the corners so they will fit and lie flat, and may be finished off with lace or wash edging. Use the same material elsewhere in the room, on dresser, table, cushions—even to the curtains. Be sure to choose a well covered though dainty design.

Instead of Butter. An economical substitute for butter is made by frying out ham, bacon or poultry fat, either raw or cooked, also the fat skimmed from soup or gravy, and the drippings from sausage, allowing to each half pint a onion, a little thyme and summer savory, a teaspoonful of salt and a little pepper, says the Chicago Inter Ocean. Try out at a low temperature and strain through cheese-cloth. Keep in a cool place.

PETE PAYS PRICE FOR EDUCATION

PENDLETON BOY PAYS \$45 A MONTH RAILROAD FARE TO ATTEND COLLEGE.

Peter Crockett Holds Down Preaching Job While Taking Final Year at University.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Jan. 19.—Forty-five dollars a month railroad fare to attend the University sets a new record for expense accounts. However, it costs Peter Crockett, a senior from Pendleton, at least that much every month and will continue to do so the remainder of the year. Crockett is the Christian minister at Wasco, Oregon, about one hundred and eighty miles east of Portland. He spends the week-end, from Saturday morning at 2 to Monday at midnight making his trip to and from Wasco, where he preaches two sermons on Sundays. Next semester he intends to carry twenty-two hours of college work

and perform his duties as pastor, besides entering into oratorical work. At present he is working on an oration for the coming tryouts. Two years ago, Crockett was the star debater of the University, but has been compelled to stay out of college since then. "Too late for debate this year, he is going into oratory, where his ministerial experience may be of value."
