ALFALFA WEEK TO BE OBSERVED IN MARCH

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 20.—The second week in March has been set as "alfalfa week" in the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, by the Holden Improvement committee, which is conducting a campaign of education in behalf of alfalfa, the big forage crop of the northwest.

State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill is preparing to emphasize the week through the language classes in all the schools of the state, both elementary and high schools.

P. G. Holden of Chicago, founder of the movement, has highly commended Superintendent Churchill for the cooperation given in this state. In a letter to Mr. Churchill he says: "It is very gratifying to me to notice the splendid spirit of co-operation which exists between the people of the government's office and the agricultural college in the state of Oregon by taking a genuine interest in the business of agriculture and of this follow-up work."

"I believe that your administration has set a wholesome example for other states, and I certainly think that you are doing a great work for the state of Oregon in assisting as you are in the work mentioned above."

THE BABY'S ROOM.

In the February Woman's Home Campaign appears a department for Better Babies in which there is a very interesting and helpful article entitled "What Every Baby Needs," by S. Josephine Baker, director of child hygiene in the department of health of New York City. Following

is an interesting extract:

"The best ventilated, sunniest and most easily cleaned room in the house should be the baby's bedroom and nursery. There should be no unnecessary furniture or curtains, just simple wholesome and clean-lined, with a thorough airing every day and a constant supply of fresh air at all times, except in severe, stormy, or very cold weather. The baby should always sleep alone. This does not mean that the mother is not to hold her baby, when properly fed, comfortably clothed, placed in a bed with warm but light bedding, in a well ventilated, darkened room, will sleep the greater part of the 24 hours of each day. Reason develops at a very early age and during the second and third years, if good habits in this respect have been well established, the 'good-night hour' which belongs to the mother and child is a perfectly normal desire which should be satisfied."

"In order to be normal a baby must lead a normal life. The latter does not mean either neglect or over-attention. My personal experience has led me to believe that more babies suffer from over-care than from lack of care. During the time of rapid growth a great deal of quiet is essential to the baby. During the second year it should sleep over twelve hours each night, with a nap morning and afternoon. During the next year the same period of sleep at night should be observed, but one nap a day is sufficient. Remember that the baby needs peace and quiet for the safety of both its mind and body. It needs to be held in its mother's arms gently and quietly."

NEW YORK EATS 1500 MILES BUTTER YEARLY

ITS SUPPLY LAST YEAR WOULD MORE THAN REACH FROM POLE TO POLE.

City Spent in 1913 More Than \$136,000,000 for This Item Together With Eggs and Poultry—Country's First Skyscraper to be Torn Down—Other Items of Interest.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Figures on New York's yearly bill for butter, eggs and poultry have just been published and they have made some of the Gothamites rub their eyes. How this town's bankers "drain away" the money of the country has been explained at great length for those who can follow the explanation, but here is a plain statement requiring no explanation at all of how a very considerable portion of the city's spare change has been drained away by the farmers—mostly by the farmers of the middle west. For poultry alone New Yorkers paid \$22,000,000 last year. More than 6,000 carloads of fowl reached the city, or on average of about 115 cars each week. A curious fact is that a great part of this poultry arrives here alive. It is killed in the "kosher" establishments of the greatest Jewish community in the world. For eggs the citizens contribute a round \$50,000,000, making a total payment for butter, eggs and poultry of \$136,000,000. The public debt of the United States never reached so high a figure as this at any time before the Civil War. If out of this total the farmers got only 65 per cent for their share, after deducting freight, cost of handling and middlemen's profits, then the country has still taken practically \$90,000,000 from this city alone for these items. The amount of butter used in the city was enormous. No Italian Divorce Reform. ROME, Jan. 20.—Italy's hopes of being able to secure from the present parliament a divorce law are again glimmering. Of the 508 deputies which compose the chamber, Count Gentiloni, who engineered the Catholic vote during the recent elections, has just made it known that 223 of these in return for Catholic reform, pledged themselves to the Catholic program of legislation. The latter is irrevocably against permitting divorce, and Italians, as in the past, will have to continue to go to Switzerland and Austria, taking out naturalization papers in those countries, secure their divorce, return to Italy, renounce their foreign citizenship and retake that of Italy.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—A resolution by the Western Forestry and Conservation association commending the excellent work done by the forest service in saving timber from fire, was introduced in the senate by Senator Chamberlain.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Jan. 20.—Ralph Fariss, alias John Boettich, under sentence to hang here for murdering Horace Montague in a train held up near Los Angeles recently, has confessed that he robbed a train on the Burlington railroad just outside Omaha about a year ago. Fariss has been suspected of this robbery but definite proof was lacking.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20.—Eddie Camp of San Francisco and Kid Wilson of Baltimore, will meet at Vernon January 31, instead of February 12, the result of a shift in promoter McCarey's plans. The February date will be given Jimmy Clabby and Ed Petrosky whose meeting last Saturday was prevented by Petrosky's illness.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Jan. 20.—In spite of threats of Industrial Workers of the World, orange growers of the Rialto and Fontana districts will stand by their Japanese pickers. Members of an I. W. W. army encamped near Rialto had demanded that the growers discharge the orientals and employ white men. The army is moving toward Los Angeles.

Will Chop Stock Food—J. S. Gutridge of Strawberry, Grant county has purchased a four horse power gasoline engine to run for the purpose of chopping food for stock and for other purposes.

ALBANIA RULER TO TAKE THE THRONE

PRINCE WILHELM OF WIED WILL UNDERTAKE TO GUIDE COUNTRY'S DESTINY.

Is the Third Ruler Which Germany Has Furnished to the Balkan Country—Kaiser's Influence Is Slowly Being Extended—Country Is Uncivilized—King's Job No Cinch.

BERLIN, Jan. 20.—From simple lieutenant in the Kaiser's guard at Potsdam to King of Albania, the jump that Prince Wilhelm of Wied will make late this month. It is the third ruler that Germany will furnish the troublesome Balkans. Germans soon will govern the greater part of the Balkan country. Slowly but surely the Kaiser's influence in the form of a chain of German rulers, is extending from Berlin to Constantinople.

At Bucharest is King Karl of Roumania. He is a Hohenzollern prince of a branch of the Kaiser's house. His queen—Carmen Sylva—was Princess of Wied. At Sofia is Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria, a German prince of the house of Coburg. His wife is Queen Elzabeth, a princess of the German principality of Reuss. The Queen of Greece is a sister of the Kaiser. And now Albania, the new nation born of the throes of the Balkan wars, is to be given to Prince Wilhelm of Wied. That leaves but two Balkan thrones not occupied by Germans—Serbia and Montenegro. At Constantinople one of the Kaiser's generals, General Liman von Sander, at the head of a group of German officers, is organizing the Turkish army.

The Albanian people had nothing to say about being made into a nation and still less as to who shall be their ruler. The "powers," whom the Greek premier during the war sarcastically referred to as "real respectable old ladies," "made" Albania into a nation and selected the man who shall sit on the newly created throne. At the start his title will merely be the Prince of Albania but there is nothing to hinder him from promoting himself to king in name, which he will be in fact. Nikita of Montenegro changed his name from prince to king in one day and has been king ever since. Karl of Hohenzollern went to Bucharest as Prince of Roumania and did such a good job in governing the country that the Roumanians had no objection to his promotion as king.

No one envies Prince Wilhelm his new job. The throne went begging for a long time. No one seemed to have the nerve of tackling the task of governing the fierce Albanians. After consulting the Kaiser, Franz Joseph of Austria, King Karl and Ferdinand of Serbia, and receiving assurances that they would send a rescue expedition if he "got in bad" with the Albanians, Prince Wilhelm decided he would take the chance of being king. Albania is the most backward, uncivilized country in Europe, its people the fiercest. It is the home of "blood feuds," the Paradise of Tuberculosis and the hell of women Law with the Albanian tribes is written in blood. Blood is law. Albania is the original Kentucky. Its law is "a law full of teeth for a tooth," and "two eyes for an eye."

Many of the houses of the better classes are strong and well built. They must be as they are often turned into forts. Sanitation and hygiene even the most elementary form are unknown. This, together with the habitual excess in the use of alcohol, coffee and nicotine causes the white plague to rage among the people. Sixty per cent of the deaths are said to be from tuberculosis.

Prince Wilhelm will govern a country where women are considered little more than beasts of burden. They are treated like slaves. The life of an Albanian girl is indescribably sad. Until she is married she rarely ever sees her nearest relatives. She merely works. Aside from the house and field duties, her principal occupation is embroidering on silk and cotton. During these years she not only makes her trousseau, but al-
