The Portland Oregonian says it is ridiculous that money interests have been conducting a Bryan's Great campaign through the

press to make Bryan absurd.

Certainly such a charge is ridiculous. The money trust does not work that way.

When the trust wants a certain public man to be assailed it sends out no signed instructions directing that the offender be bitten on the hind or anything of that sort. The money trust is not so crude.

It is a fact, however, that the tory press throughout the entire country has been busy for months assailing Bryan in a bitter, unfair manner.

They have not attacked him for reasons that appear upon the surface. The grape juice and chautauque attacks are not sincere. The tories don't care how whether Bryan drinks grape juice or not. It is entirely a personal matter. So is the proposition regarding chautauque lectures. If Bryan were afloat outside of these matters the tory press would

take his abstinence as shown by his grape juice preferences and they would praise the democrat he displays in giving public addresses at chautauques.

Bryan's real and only offense is that for 16 years through a smashing storm he has been a political and economic reformer; he has stood for the public welfare and opposed the

privilege, he has placed man above the dollar; he has denounced the anarchy of big business and stood for the Americanism of Lincoln and Jefferson. He has been the originator and the uncompromising champion of the progressive movement. He is the man who made Wilson's nomination possible and in doing so showed he had the manhood and the patriotism to sacrifice his personal ambitions to advance the principles in which he believes. He is the strongest individual factor back of the administration today.

It is because of these things not because of grape juice that Bryan is assailed. He is too strong and influential to suit the tories. So every effort is made to break down his power and the arrows of ridicule are kept flying thick and fast.

But as the Oregonian says the money trust is not doing it. No instructions from that source are needed. Tory editors know some things without being told and one point they never forget is that whenever Bryan shows strength it is their cue to sneer.

In the following editorial the New York World pays a compliment to the latest wireless victory: An Inspiring Victory. There are many wonderful triumphs to the credit of wireless telegraphy for life-saving at sea, from the case of the steamship Republic to that of the burning Volturno, and beyond. But among them all there is none more remarkable and thrilling than this rescue of most of those on board the Cobequid and the assured safety of the remainder.

This staunch liner had run upon rocks somewhere along the dangerous approaches to the Bay of Fundy in the midst of a blinding storm. It must have been in danger of being pounded rapidly to pieces by the mountainous seas. Below-zero temperatures added to the dangers and terror of the situation. Its wireless apparatus worked feebly and uncertainly in the wild disorder of the atmosphere and was never able to give the ship's exact location, because this was not known on board.

But the distress calls were heard and how bravely heeded by ships from the American and Canadian shores, and by ships at sea, groping through the mist and storm in a hunt as dangerous as it was blind, the news of the morning tells. Only two figure in the first rescue, but to others equal credit is evidently due. This is of the new power of man over the forces of nature by which the call of distress can be sent widely circling through the air, and of the new humanitarianism of the sea which at the call hurries all ships within reach from their course to the work of rescue. It is most inspiring.
