SMALL FARMER SUCCEEDS.

What Efficiency, Puck and Intensive Work Did for One Man Told, SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 22.—A striking example of what can be accomplished on a small acreage well handled came under the writer's observation a few years ago, says W. B. Mercer, a farmer and livestock raiser, in the Springfield Republican. A newcomer landed in a small town in the cotton growing section about the time cotton growing was at its lowest ebb. The farmers naturally were looking for some new crop to substitute for cotton, and tomatoes were selected. The people went wild, and all decided to put in a large acreage the newcomer with the rest. A majority knew nothing about growing the crop from a market standpoint and less about handling it. A small crop, poorly packed, of an inferior grade and miserably handled resulted in an absolute failure, involving everyone in debt.

The newcomer had just bought on credit 12 acres of land, with a cabin on it, and at the end of the season he was involved for more than \$3000. What to do was a serious question. He was too poor to move and had not even the necessities of life to begin another season on. Having a good reputation for honesty, energy and perseverance he determined to fight it out.

A business firm offered to furnish him a limited amount with which to start again. A gardener and truck-

er by nature, he decided to continue this line of farming. The previous year's experience had taught him not to depend on one crop, so radishes, cabbage, beans, peas, tomatoes, cantaloupes and other crops were planted on a small scale to furnish ready cash.

He also set out a strawberry patch, a fruit orchard, planted early corn, sugar cane and sweet and Irish potatoes. Everything did well that year, and the second year strawberries, cabbage, tomatoes and potatoes were selected for the main crops, still growing enough vegetables to supply local demand and a little to ship when prices were good. He shipped nothing but the very best stuff, sold culls and inferior stuff to local trade or fed it to stock. He then established a regular line of customers in the nearby towns and cities throughout the season. When his name appeared on a package it sold for a good price, while other growers' stuff went to waste for want of buyers. In less than ten years he had paid for the land, wiped out all debts, built a comfortable home, splendid barn, etc., and had a bank account of several hundred dollars.

Brass Lacquer Made at Home.

A fine finish may be made for brass doorknobs, candlesticks, bowls and even the brass rods on the enamel beds, to say nothing of articles made entirely of brass.

These may be preserved to look like new if covered with a thin coat of lacquer, says the Chicago Inter Ocean. Dealers make you pay well for this finish if ordered after the first purchase of the article, and incidentally it is almost universally applied to all brass and silver, now sold for toilette and decorative use. The following may be kept on hand and used at any time that a fresh piece needs to be covered:

Dissolve two ounces of gum copal in one pint of denatured alcohol and one fourth of a pint of amyl alcohol. Since the gum is slow in dissolving, it is well to get it powdered and shake it occasionally for a few days and then let it settle for a day or so. The clear liquor should then be poured off into another bottle. Polish your brass or silver first and then apply with a small brush. A very thin coat is all that is needed.

Growers' Combine Pays.

MILTON, Jan. 21.—The first annual report of the Walla Walla Fruit Growers' Association shows a net profit in all business for the last year. Manager H. D. Lamb reports that 473 cars of fruit was shipped from the Milton-Freewater district in 1913, and of this number 201 cars were shipped by this association.

Directors for the incoming year were re-elected, as follows: E. J. Jensen, Henry Effert, W. A. Wallace, J. L. Ramsey and D. Riggle.

Mr. Lamb's report shows that the association made a net profit of \$4,322.28, and that the association's debts are about \$2000.

E. P. Jensen was re-elected president, and W. A. Wallace, secretary.

DON'T SAY "DON'T" TO BOY; GIVE HIM TASK TO DO

DENVER, Jan. 22.—"Don't say 'Don't' to the boy. Give him something to do." This was the keynote of an interview given by the United Press today by Professor John R. Bell, resident manager of the West Side Neighborhood House and principal of the Edison school here. Professor Bell, because of his success in handling lads of all manner of dispositions has earned the sobriquet of "boy-tamer."

"I pity the boy who has no chores to do around his home. I do not see how he can develop and I fear for his future. For the chores are what occupy the boy's mind and give him an opportunity to show his real worth," said Prof. Bell.

"A few years ago the boy could easily walk into the country, pick up a friend and go fishing. Now his pleasures must be found in less wholesome surroundings. I believe the country is good for the boy and the movement to the city must be studied and watched so that it will not work harm in that way. One of the big secrets of handling boys lies in furnishing them with wholesome work or recreation. It is a mistake to restrain any lad too much; instead, his energies should be directed into proper channels.

"Every church should be equipped with a gymnasium in its basement so the children of the neighborhood can congregate there for recreation. I believe in pool halls and billiard tables. One of the greatest things accomplished in our Neighborhood House has been in installing a pool room. I discovered most of the boys were trying to help know how to play pool and had played in the back of a saloon or in some other place where they had no business to go. So I decided to give them a chance to play pool in the Neighborhood House. And to a boy they recognized the advantage of this and not one of them used indecent or vulgar language during the hours they have played there.

"We have given over to the forces of evil everything except what we should, it seems to me. Only a few years ago there was a terrible howl when it was suggested that we put poolrooms in the Y. M. C. A. buildings of the country. But that very thing has been the means of saving hundreds of young men."
