WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 23.—Information charging Joseph Cole, colored, with murder in the first degree, was filed. Cole is charged with shooting Robert Cunningham, also colored, at a dance early New Year's day.

Cole says the shooting was an accident.

FOREST NOTES.

There are 36,500,000 young trees in the government's forest nurseries.

Two tons of cascara bark have just been sold from the Siuslaw national forest, Oregon, at one cent a pound.

The northernmost national forest is the Chugach in Alaska; the southernmost is the Luquillo in Porto Rico.

For shingles alone, 750 million feet of timber is cut in that part of the state of Washington which lies west of the Cascades.

California led last year in timber sold from national forests, though Montana had the largest number of sale transactions.

The American forestry association has just elected Henry S. Drinker, president of Lehigh university, and P. S. Ridsdale, as its president and secretary respectively.

The biological survey and the forest service have been cooperating in the extermination of ground squirrels on national forests in California. The annual loss of range feed and grain crops from ground squirrels is enormous.

Temple, Texas, Wants Manager. TEMPLE, Texas, Jan. 23.—It was considered certain here that Temple citizens will adopt the necessary

changes contained in the new charter, draft of which was completed today providing for a town manager form of government like that of Dayton, Ohio. The proposed charter provides for the election of commissioners who in turn will select a town manager. The manager will have supreme control and be held accountable for all departments of the municipal government. Temple will be the third town in Texas to adopt the town manager form.

Mayor's Day is Planned. Tacoma Executive Will Be Host to Congressional Delegation. TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 23.—Mayor's day is to be celebrated at the First Congregational church. It will be under the auspices of the Men's

Brotherhood of the church but Mayor Seymour, of Tacoma, has been sending out the invitations and arranging the gathering.

Skimmed Milk Glove Cleaner. Skimmed milk will clean kid gloves much better than gasoline, according to the Chicago Inter Ocean. Wipe with a dry cloth when done and when almost dry, stretch the fingers out across the hand.

GIRLS IMPORTED BY WHITE SLAVE SYNDICATE HE SAYS

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Not only must the commercial element be proved, but it must be shown that the victim of white slavery is compelled by force to lead an immoral life before conviction can be obtained under the Mann act, attorneys for Jack Johnson argue in a brief for a new trial which was filed in the federal court of appeals.

Attorney Jacob Bachrach made the startling assertion that two thousand girls, largely French, are imported to this country yearly by a syndicate with distributing centers in New York, Chicago, Omaha, Denver, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle and Nome.

Winter Polo in Lewiston.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Jan. 22.—It is not necessary to go to California for western polo enthusiasts to enjoy their game. That is the view of the Spokane Polo club that has just completed arrangements for a tournament at Lewiston on February 21 and 22. Decision to arrange this event was reached after investigations had shown the mild climatic conditions of the inland Empire allowed for field events of this character. There are now thirty ponies in training at Lewiston for the competition, they being in charge of an expert.

CORN GRADING IS URGED.

Seattle Merchants' Exchange Wants State to Follow Federal Plan. SEATTLE, Jan. 22.—As a result of a meeting of the Merchants' Exchange in which all the leading grain interests were represented, the State Utilities department will be asked to provide some system of grading corn in conformity with the standard to be used by the federal agricultural department after July 1 next.

The exchange will obtain from St. Paul and Minneapolis more details as to how the government will enforce the grading and inspection rules and whether a new office will be created. The exchange also will request the State Grange Inspection Department to install a testing machine for this market.

U. S. CUTTER SERVICE SAVED 327 LIVES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Three hundred and twenty-seven lives, and property amounting to \$10,607,710 were saved in storms at sea in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1913, by the revenue cutter service, according to the annual report made public today, while the total expenditure for keeping up the service amounted to \$2,471,532.

While the saving of life and property were the most important performances of this arm of the service, it was not by any means all that was done. For instance, a tremendous danger to shipping in the form of derelicts, and other obstructions to navigation, was removed, thirty-one of these being destroyed.

Derelicts which were recovered and restored to their owners were valued at \$18,900.
