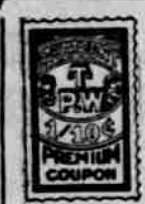

DANISH CHURCH DESTROYED

Methodists Learn That Copenhagen Settlement Is Burned.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—News of the destruction by fire of the social settlement church founded by the Methodist Episcopal church in Copenhagen reached the Methodist Board of Foreign Missions here in a dispatch from the Danish capital. The church, which the parsonage and other attached buildings, was valued at \$100,000.

This group of buildings, known as Jerusalem Church, was established by the American Foreign Missions Board in 1866 through a gift of the late Harold Dollner, Danish Consul-General at New York. It was the only organization of its kind in Denmark and its success was noted all

over the continent. It maintained an employment bureau, a restaurant, a shelter for the homeless, two orphan homes, a kindergarten and a holiday colony for children from the slums of Copenhagen. Except for a small annual grant from the Methodist board it was self-supporting.

TAVERN KEEPER IN JAIL

August Erickson Begins Year's Sentence for Defaulting Fine.

OREGON CITY, Jan. 24.—August Erickson, keeper of the Erickson tavern, is in the county jail beginning a one-year term for selling liquor without a license.

Two months ago he entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was fined \$250 and one year in jail, the

sentence being suspended upon his promise to pay the fine within ten days. The court instructed Sheriff Mass to bring Erickson in for his failure to meet the sentence and he was committed to the county jail to serve his term. The sentence is expected to put an end to the business at the tavern.

Worth Knowing.

Use warm water to sprinkle starched clothes and the effect will be twice as satisfactory.

A painter's brush may be used to dislodge dust from cracks and crevices about the house.
