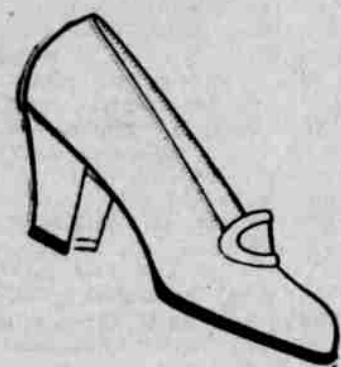

871 HEROES RECOGNIZED.

Carnegie Commission Swells List by 30, of Whom 17 Lost Lives.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 24.—Individual acts of heroism which the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission has recognized since it was established ten years ago were brought up to a total of 871 when 30 names were added to the honor roll.

The commission held its tenth annual meeting here. In 11 cases silver medals were awarded, in 19 cases bronze medals were awarded. Seventeen of the heroes lost their lives, and to the dependants of 12 of these persons aggregating \$7680 were granted.

Among those to whom the bronze medals were awarded was William Kerr of Vancouver, B. C., who saved John Magee from drowning at Skagway, November 26, 1909.

PORTLAND POPULATION

IS NOW ABOUT 243,327. Commissioner Dieck Presents Figures: 166,736 Reside on East Side of the Willamette River.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—Portland has a population of about 243,327, according to figures presented by Commissioner Dieck at the council meeting this morning. Of this number 166,736 reside on the east side of the river and the remainder, 86,591 reside on the west side.

The figures were compiled by computers in the department of public works and represent several weeks

work. The estimate includes the population of Lents, number 5699, which became a part of Portland since the United States official census taken in 1910. The official census taken then showed a population of 207,214 for the entire city, therefore, according to Commissioner Dieck's figures, a growth of 39,314 in three years, or an increase of 5 per cent a year, has been noted.

GOLD PLATE IS GIVEN

EX-SENATOR BOURNE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Russell Hawkins presented Jonathan Bourne, Jr., with a solid gold plate as a Christmas remembrance from citizens of Nehalem, Wheeler, Tillamook and Bay City, with an inscription testifying their "lasting appreciation, respect and esteem and particularly in recognition of loyal, indefatigable, intelligent and effort in upbuilding the wonderful state of Oregon and welfare of the people."

1600 COINS ARE FOUND.

Russian Numismatic Society Announces Valuable Discovery.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 23.—The Russian Numismatic society has now reported on a find of 1600 coins of the eleventh century made this year at Spanko, in the peterhof district. This treasure is believed to have been buried in the twelfth century, probably by merchants dealing with Novgorod the Grand.

It consists principally of coins of

the various small German states on the Rhine but almost all the countries of Europe are represented. Among the rare specimens are coins of King William Rufus of England, an admirable example of the Danish King Magnus with a Runic inscription, and some coins of Bishop Gerard. An interesting piece is that bearing a figure which is not certainly identified, but is believed by the society to be that of Godfrey de Bouillon.

TINY LEONARD MAY CLIMB THE LADDER

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 23.—There is a chance that "Tiny" Leonard will go up this year according to Jimmie Richardson who has recommended the tall Bear hurler to Judge McCredie of the Portland club of the Pacific Coast league for a tryout this year. Leonard was going like a house afire last year and just before the scouts go around to look him over he was plugged in the pitching arm with a pitched ball and an internal corn or something kept him from showing up well. At the start of the season the fans picked Leonard as the one sure bet when the matter of climbing the ladder was discussed. The injury put him clear out of it. This year he is in good shape and his friends believe that given a chance he will attach himself to the Coast league payroll.

Woman's Advance.

Keeping Sharp Carving Knife.

There is nothing worse for the sharp edge of a carving knife than having it in a drawer with other knives. To keep the edge of a knife in good condition, have a special place for it. If the kitchen is provided with a top rail, see if the knives cannot be slipped between this and the wall proper; usually there is just enough space to permit the blade of the knife slipping in easily, says the Newark News. Where this is not practical, tack strips of leather against a closet door, on the wall or some other convenient place, and keep the knives in this improvised holder. If this practice is followed, the pleasure of having sharp knives when wanted will be the result.

Hints of Value to the Cook.

Shred codfish and chipped beef and put them in jars so that they will be ready to cream without trouble. Slice bacon and wrap it neatly in daxed paper, else pack the slices in a glass jar.

Gather all bits of dried cheese— which should always be saved— together and grate them. Put this grated cheese in a bottle and cork it, ready to sprinkle over dishes prepared "au gratin." Grate dried bread and put that in a glass jar. Dry all stale crackers in the oven and roll them into fine crumbs to use in place of breadcrumbs for the outside of croquettes.

Grate chocolate and mix it with sugar. Then when you want a quick cup of hot chocolate add some of this grated, sweetened chocolate to a cupful of milk, let it reach the boiling point and serve it. This must be kept in a cool, dry place.

Make some caramel and put it in a bottle for use for flavoring soups and sauces, ice cream and puddings and cakes.

Sugar Basket.

The spoon and sugar holder is new for the tea table, says the St. Louis Star. It is a little silver basket with a partition lengthwise through the center. On one side of the partition lump sugar is ranged. On the other spoons are laid in a compartment rounded at each end to accommodate their bowls and handles and narrow in the center.

ONE CAUSE OF CRIME.

Drunkness was responsible for 6,955 arrests by the Portland police in 1912, according to the annual report of Chief of Police Clarke. Aggravated drunkenness which led to drunken and disorderly conduct caused 1,095 arrests. Vagrancy was the charge preferred against 2,250 more. And as most "vagrants" are the product of drink and these also may safely be charged against the liquor traffic, making a total of 10,300 arrests traceable to drink, or nearly two-thirds of the total number of arrests during the year. Seventy persons committed suicide in Portland in 1913—more than one a week.

Violations of the various liquor ordinances led to the arrest of 213 persons, the majority being for "bootlegging" on Sundays. Liquor sold without a license caused the arrest of 55 persons.

Sexual immorality caused 327 arrests, a moral squad being kept busy most of the year on such cases.—Pacific Patriot.

Denver Housewives Combine.

DENVER, Jan. 26.—To organize all the housewives of Denver in a fight for pure food and lower prices, a Denver branch of the National Housewives' league was formed here today. Mrs. C. M. Little was elected president. The movement has the backing of the Denver woman's club. Mrs. Julian D. Deane of New York City is national president of the league.
