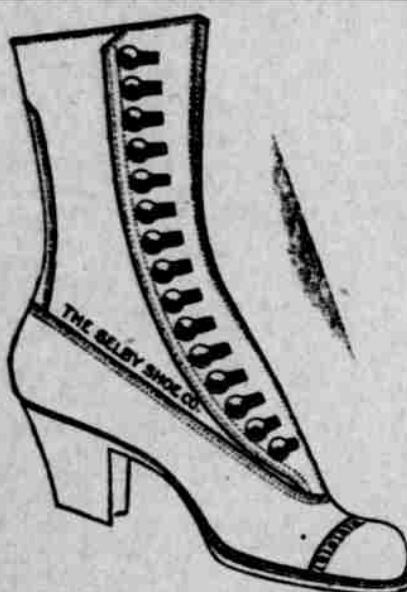

Portable Step is Also Seat.
Every short woman finds many things about a house are out of reach, and she must lug about and climb upon a chair or step ladder. A portable step, made from a box seven or eight inches deep, to which two long strips of board, with a shorter strip fastened across its two ends, are nailed, is easy to carry and easy to mount, says the Ladies World. Stained and varnished, with a wider crosspiece placed a short distance above the box and with a removable cushion, it also furnishes a comfortable and not unsightly seat for a child.

Prune Whip.
In making prune whip, if the prunes are soaked and then cooked in a double boiler you are sure of their being free from the prunes through a sieve, add sugar and lemon juice to flavor and cook the mixture for a few minutes in the double boiler. Add the prune pulp to the beaten whites of eggs—the whites of three eggs to half a pound of prunes is a good proportion—and then heap the mixture in sherbet glasses or put into a baking dish and bake in a moderate oven for 10 minutes. If the dessert is baked, use the yolks of the eggs in making a soft boiled custard to serve with it.

Worth Knowing.
To test silk, fray out the threads and break them. If they snap easily, it is not good. The warp threads running lengthwise should be of equal strength with the wool thread running crosswise.

When frying doughnuts it is a good idea to have a dish of boiling water on the stove. As each cake is done, lift it out with a fork and dash quickly into the boiling water and out again.
If your kitchen is small and crowded, take out the kitchen table and have a hinged shelf made. A shelf answers every purpose of a table and can be put down out of the way when not in use.
To flower pansies in the house, sow the seed in shallow boxes of sandy soil. When they are rooted, transplant them to wooden boxes or separate pots. Keep them quite warm, giving them abundance of water and a great deal of sun.—Washington Herald.

Bag and Pocket Inside the Muff.
Starting out on a shopping expedition, one woman said to her friend, "Aren't you going to carry your handbag?" "No," replied the other, "I have made a bag in my muff, and it is much more convenient than carrying an extra one this cold weather and the muff answers the purpose of both muff and bag."

She handed the muff to her companion for inspection. It was two bags or pockets. The first was large, being about the size of the size of one side of the muff, and in this were slipped small packages, letters or anything of the kind that it was necessary to carry, and a large button prevented anything from slipping out.
On the outside of this large pocket was a small one for holding a little pocket book and keys. This was fastened with a large button and buttonhole, so that the contents of the pocket were secure and this saved the carrying of a handbag, which was a great convenience and enabled the owner of the muff to keep both hands protected.

WRITER TELLS OF THRILLS OF SHOW

CHARLES WELLINGTON FURLONG CONTRIBUTES ARTICLE ON ROUND-UP.

Correspondent for the World's Work Who Saw Big Show Here Last Year Describes It in Tense Terms in February Number—Photographs of Events Accompany Article.

The article is one of the cleverest ever written on the Round-up and describes the people and the action so true to life, tersely and clearly, that the reader can see the whole panorama passing before him as he follows Mr. Furlong's narrative. He can see the wild horses plunging, rearing and bucking, see the steers falling under the rope, hear the roar of the spectators and feel that indefinable thrill which makes the Round-up the greatest emotional drama ever staged.

Mr. Furlong paints and pictures all this and more, too, with sureness and deftness that is enchanting, entertaining and true to life. And his article is all based on his personal observations and emotions. He was here for the 1913 Round-up, a guest at the home of Roland Oliver, was on the ground every minute of the show with his camera and note book, almost lived at the cow camp and Indian village, mixed with the cowboys and cowgirls and thoroughly studied the entire situation and even tried to ride a bucking bull himself. The result is that his article is one that cannot help but be a classic of western literature.

The author of this article has a wide reputation as explorer, author and lecturer. He has been through Africa, South America, Australia and other of the unexplored and interesting countries and has written and lectured extensively about his travels. He came to Pendleton last fall to see the Round-up of which he had heard considerable, but in his travels he says he had never met with anything of the kind as great as the Round-up. During his stay in Pendleton he made many warm friends and they will find his article doubly interesting.

The bride is a grand-daughter of the late William Stearns, president of Amherst College. One of her brothers is Professor William Stearns Davis, author of "A Friend of Caesar's" and other historical novels.

Skating Championships On.

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y., Jan. 27.—Under the auspices of the Saranac club, the final series of championship ice speed races began here today with the best ice skaters of the two countries entered. To the winners will go the international amateur ice skating titles of Canada and the United States. The events will run through today, tomorrow and Thursday.

Canada is nearly 30 times as large as Great Britain and Ireland, the total area of the domain being only 237,000 square miles less than the whole continent of Europe.
