POTTS TO RETURN TO FACE CHARGE

PRISONER IS WILLING TO RETURN TO OREGON FOR MURDER TRIAL.

Declares Charges Are Result of Spite Work on Part of Relatives — Woman Believed to Have Been Strangled—Wife Is Found Under Peculiar Circumstances.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28.—Charles E. Potts, collector and ex-private detective, who was arrested charged with murder of his wife in Canyon City, Ore., will be taken back to that city Saturday to face trial on the murder charge.

Despite the entreaties of Fred E. Potts, his brother, to fight extradition, the prisoner declared that he would welcome the arrival of the sheriff from Oregon.

Potts was visited by a score of friends. All urged him to fight extradition until the authorities in Oregon force the issue.

"I am innocent of this charge and I want to return and fight it as soon as possible," said Potts. "Mrs. Potts and I always were on the best of terms and this is the work of spiteful relatives."

In the city jail today he told the officers that his wife was treated by Dr. Francis Tate, a Los Angeles physician, for fainting spells. When she left here last July to get her estate, valued at \$14,000, and that he might be free to bestow his attentions upon a woman with whom he is said to have been living in Los Angeles, will be the contention of the prosecution of Potts on a charge of murder by Grant county officials.

Potts was arrested in Los Angeles upon telegraphic instruction from here.

Potts is a detective employed by the Los Angeles board of trade. Last summer Mr. and Mrs. Potts were visiting at the Mt. Vernon Hot Springs, a summer resort about 13 miles from this place, owned by Mr. and Mrs. McGavin, parents of Mrs. Potts. On July 13, Mrs. Potts died suddenly. With her husband she had retired in apparently good health. About 6 o'clock in the morning Potts notified the family that his wife was having some kind of a fit. When Mrs. McGavin reached the side of her daughter she was dead. Blue marks were seen on her throat at the time, but the grief-stricken parents did not closely investigate the circumstances of the death.

The morning after the funeral Potts with his 10-year-old son, left for Los Angeles. Suspicion began to grow, especially when it transpired that Mrs. Potts left an estate of about \$14,000, and that Potts was infatuated with a Los Angeles woman. E. A. Robertson, Mrs. Potts' brother-in-law, placed the matter before the district attorney and had the body exhumed. Dr. V. C. Belknap held an inquest here Saturday. The examination revealed the fact that the hyoid bone was broken. It was explained to the jury that such a fracture could only occur with external pressure. This with other suspicious circumstances resulted in the verdict that Mrs. Potts came to her death by strangulation or suffocation at the hands of her husband, C. E. Potts. The coroner removed the stomach and sent it to Portland for examination, as it was thought that it would show some trace of poison.

MOB THREATENS SPEAKER.

Roslyn People Aroused by Y. M. C. A. Secretary's Alleged Slur.
ROSLYN, Wash., Jan. 28.—Nearly 200 men and boys crowded the streets when the noon train arrived to receive Bert G. Mitchell, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., who, according to the Seattle papers, stated that Roslyn had been morally regenerated from a "black town" to a "white town" in the last two years. Mr. Mitchell fortunately did not arrive at the station at his appearance in the city, the cooler judgment tempered the feeling of the crowd. On Mr. Mitchell's arrival he at once repudiated the statements in the press and declared that the facts had been misrepresented by the officials of the Seattle Y. M. C. A. He asserted that instead of defaming Roslyn he had lauded the cleanliness of the city. A mass meeting was held at the Y. M. C. A. at which Mr. Mitchell made a statement. Feeling still is high, the principal contention being that the choice of a subject by Mr. Mitchell, "Making a Black Town White" was in itself injurious to the city.

WATER SUPPLY IS CUT OFF.

Big Tank at Junction City Wrecked by Sunday's Storm.
JUNCTION CITY, Ore., Jan. 28.—The Junction City water supply has been cut off. The water tank owned by J. H. Miller, located on the east side of town, was blown down. A strong south wind blew the tank, which was 100 feet high, into the south end of Mr. Miller's barn. Roy Miller was in the barn, but escaped injury. Thirty-two thousand gallons of water was in the tank. The end of the barn was totally wrecked. The schools may have to be closed down for a few days, as they are heated by steam heat. J. H. Miller will start work immediately on a new tower.

Habit of Keeping Commonplace Book.

Many interesting and valuable bits of history are contained in old commonplace books or memorandum pads that our forebears kept with such assiduous care. The habit of keeping some memorandum is useful and often the means of preserving odds and ends of knowledge or information that persistently elude us just when we most wish to have them. The only sure way to keep a hold on them is to jot them down in a commonplace book and then be sure to keep track of where you put it.

A Handful of Helpful Household Suggestions.

To drive a nail through a plaster wall without injury to the wall dip it in hot water first. This will prevent it from breaking away the wall. To afford a soft surface to oilcloth, and also to increase its length of serviceableness, put a layer of sawdust on the floor before laying it.

To keep bread boards a good color rub them well with half a lemon; then wash them in cold water and stand them in the wind or in the sun to dry.

To prevent the corners from wearing on table oilcloth paste at each corner on the wrong side a square of cotton before putting the oilcloth on the table.

To remove the greasy looking marks on the arms and head rests of leather chairs use linseed oil as follows: Boll half a pint of oil and let it stand until nearly cold; then pour in a half pint of vinegar. Stir until it is well mixed; then bottle, and it is ready for use. Put a few drops on a flannel and polish with soft dusters. This will thoroughly renovate all leather.

Portfolio for Periodicals.

A pretty and inexpensive portfolio for papers or periodicals can be made by covering two pieces of heavy cardboard with any kind of fancy cretonne or silk. The one I originated, said a clever woman, consisted wholly of materials found in the house. I covered corrugated cardboard with a piece of silkoline, pasted smoothly over one side of each cover. For a lining I used some silesia which was found in my piece bag. Next I used heavy embroidery silk to sew together the covering, cardboard and lining—taking long stitches and sewing over and over all along the four edges and back again. This gives a cross stitch effect on the edge; then two holes were punched, about two inches from the end, in each cover. Into these were run several strands of the embroidery silk, which were tied into cute little bows. Leave the strands very loose, to allow space for several periodicals. In the opposite side of the cover a single hole may be punched on the middle edge for strands if one desires to tie the papers in securely.

To Give a Tinge of Color.

Many women who are pale and sailow would like to use rouge, but are afraid of ruining their complexions by applying cosmetics of which they know nothing. Homemade remedies are the best, for then one knows exactly what is being put on the face. Beetroot makes a very good coloring medium. Sponge the face with warm water which has been softened by a few drops of eau de cologne; then thoroughly dry it. No soap should be used. Next apply a fairly strong solution of alum water, rubbing it on and leaving it to dry, and then apply a slice of beetroot direct to the face or better still, the extracted juice of beetroot put on with a piece of cotton or a small brush. Be sure to tint the face carefully and to shade off the outside parts of the bloom so that it looks quite natural.

New Blouses.

Some of the new models for afternoon blouses are quite exquisite. All sorts of lovely materials are used in their construction, and bands of fur give them a picturesque finishing touch, besides making them admirably suitable for winter wear.

The very latest idea is the afternoon blouse composed of pale lemon yellow or pure white tulle and trimmed with bands of skunk. Some of these dainty blouses are partially lined with hettalic lace, which forms a decolette underbodice, and bands of very supple satin ribbon are skillfully introduced to give a touch of delicate color under a veiling of soft tulle. For wearing under the fashionable loose wraps of velvet or fur these blouses are ideal. They give a charmingly fresh effect when the wrap is thrown off in a restaurant.

New Hats and Belts.

Suede leather hats are shown in becoming styles for the motorist. They are by far the most sensible hats for motoring that have yet been designed.
