BURGLARS ENTER HERMISTON STORES

BETWEEN \$30 AND \$40 IS TAKEN FROM ONE PLACE DURING THE NIGHT.

Suspicion Is Directed Against Large Number of Unemployed and Hungry on Who Have Been Attracted to Hermiston by the Work on the Umatilla Project.

HERMISTON, Ore., Jan. 28.—The stores of F. C. McKenzie, hardware and implement dealer and Ghent & Cross, groceries and general merchandise merchants were burglarized sometime during the night.

The glass door of Ghent & Cross was broken and entrance was made through it into the store where between \$20 and \$40 dollars in silver was taken from the safe.

Entrance to McKenzie's was made in a like manner through the back door, first breaking the glass and then knocking the bars down which were locked across the door. McKenzie's safe was opened but nothing was missing but some razors. Since work began on the west extension of the Umatilla project this section has been over-run by the unemployed, many hanging on the outskirts of the town at night. It is doubtless some of these transient men who have caused the merchants of the town their trouble here of late.

McKenzie's store was burglarized in the fall, the suspected burglars being on trial today.

Deputy Sheriff Joe Blakely came down on the local this morning.

Clatsop Farmers to Secure Expert to Help Solve Problems.

The plan is that as soon as the owners of 600 cows are members of the association an expert, to be selected by the faculty of the Oregon State Agricultural College, will be engaged to test the different herds, weigh the feed and secure data that will aid the dairymen in raising the standard of their respective herds.

REVISION URGED IN CANADA

America's New Tariff Feared by Dominion Lawmakers.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 27.—That the American trade between the Canadian West and the United States and the application of the new tariff bill will make for an economical division between Eastern and Western Canada was predicted by E. M. MacDonald, M. P., of Canoe, N. S., in an address before the Canadian Club.

Mr. MacDonald said that the situation in Canada was similar to that in the United States during and after the Civil War, and argued that a revision of the Canadian tariff in favor of the West must be made immediately if a crisis is to be avoided.

CONCERNING ALSACE-LORRAINE

In regard to Alsace-Lorraine, which is now such a stormy topic in Germany, Bismarck once said: "The French Lorraines are not half so bad as they are painted. Those who are good haters can also be good lovers. The very first night I slept in France during the war—and I remember, by the way, that I had a tame but very tough rabbit for supper—my host said to me, 'It is all the same who takes us, Russians or Prussians, but we prefer those to whom we should have to pay fewest taxes.' I replied that he would have to pay less to us than to France, though how long this would last I could not say." Individual taxation is now heavier in France than in Germany.

At another of his "beer evenings" Bismarck asked a group of Alsatian deputies how they liked Germany. "Your highness," replied one of them, "We have made it a marriage of reason, and sometimes that is the best kind of wedlock." "Yes," rejoined the chancellor with a laugh, "love and mutual respect between a couple often come from their living together. Let us drink to that. Prost!" When the chancellor was made a prince—on the day the first Imperial German parliament met—the old Kaiser insisted on his quarters in Alsace-Lorraine in his coat of arms.

In the readjustment of boundaries after the Franco-Prussian war the little village of La Schlucht was divided between the two nations. There France and Germany meet in the middle of the street, and as the boundary line follows a slanting course it is possible for a French and a German soldier to pose for a joint photograph, each remaining within his own territory. From the number and variety of postcards adorned with photographs of this nature on sale in the village it is evident that the men of the two armies are ready enough to fraternize when stationed close together.

BAKER IS BADLY SHAKEN UP.

Many Buildings and Residences Damaged by Record Wind.
BAKER, Ore., Jan. 28.—The hardest wind ever recorded in Baker played havoc with windows, fences, lumber, signs, chimneys, awnings, telephone and telegraph wires, poles, trees and several roofs.

Reports from the country nearby are that haystacks were blown to bits and fences and telegraph poles blown down.

About half the roof of the Blue Mountain Ironworks and part of the brick gable front were wrecked. Lumber in the Shockey Lumber Yard adjoining was scattered to and fro and the wind took one piece of lumber, one by 12 inches and 12 feet long and carried it through a window of the iron works into the center of the pattern room.

Nine Western Union poles were blown down and service was crippled. Seventy-five telephones in Baker are out of commission and electric light wires also suffered.

The cornice was blown from the courthouse, big plate glass windows were smashed by the dozen, several residences were unroofed, porches were torn from residences and in four cases brick chimneys crashed through roofs. The Standard Oil warehouse was wrecked, the city barns demolished, five cathedral glass windows demolished and trees were uprooted right and left. One residence in South Baker was turned around and blown in to the next lot.

One freak was that scores of bulb lenses in a big electric sign were unscrewed from their sockets by the wind and scattered around over a roof.

PRESIDENT OF HAITI FLEES TO WARSHIPS

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, Jan. 28.—The president of Haiti, Michel Oreste, fled from the capital and took refuge aboard the German cruiser Vineta. He was accompanied by his wife.

Fighting began in the city yesterday. An hour later the president left the palace under escort and was conveyed in a launch to the warship lying in the harbor. Almost immediately detachments of bluejackets were landed from the United States armored cruiser Montana and the Vineta.

Firing continued throughout the afternoon and it was evident that the revolutionary movement, which began in the north and spread to some of the southern towns, has gained sufficient strength in the capital to threaten not only the power, but the life of President Oreste.

The new congress, which met in extraordinary session, failed to take adequate measures to check the revolution. It had been conceded for a long time, however, the position of the executive was weak. Opposed to him were Senator Davidmar Theodore, in command of the rebel troops at Cape Haitien, and General Bellard, both of whom have a strong following.

OTHER PEOPLE'S WAYS.

Many stories are told concerning the Swiss president's unassuming status. Edmund d'Auvergne, visiting the government buildings at Bern, "noticed the word 'Bundespräsident' (president of the confederation) inscribed over an inconspicuous door just as one might see the word 'Cashier' or 'District Registrar'.

An important English railway conductor once knocked at this door and was answered by a man in shirt sleeves, whom he took to be a clerk. It was the president himself." In the time of Sir Horace Rumbold the story was that a diplomat, calling at the president's private abode, was admitted by a lady with tucked up sleeves and soapy arms. She was the wife of the president straight from the wash tub.

A census of smokers taken the other day among the boys attending nine elementary schools in a suburb of Amsterdam, Holland, reveals that among the 6 year olds they number 16 per cent; among those of 7 years 16 per cent; and 22 per cent among those of 8; while in the sixth schooling year, at which the average age is 12, the percentage has risen to 43. As it falls rapidly after the limit of compulsory attendance, the only use of tobacco would not appear to be an incentive to learning. It is the clear, not the cigarette, which these Dutch youngsters delight in.

Twenty years ago a clean shaven Frenchman was pretty sure to be set down by his compatriots as either a priest or an actor. Nowadays smooth faces are favored by the younger generation of Frenchmen, partly as a result of the growing cult of athletics. It appears, however, from a portrait published in Le Journal that not a single member of the new cabinet is clean shaven and four out of the twelve wear a full beard and mustache.

PANIC SIGNALS DISAPPEARING.

(Philadelphia Telegraph.)
Evidence accumulates that industrial conditions are rapidly improving in this and other states. One item of evidence is found in a report from Pittsburgh that following the placing of orders for 125,000 tons of steel in that district some 50,000 men who have been unemployed for several weeks will be engaged at steady work before the end of the present week.

It is the confident prediction of reliable observers that the advent of spring will find business and industrial conditions in the United States well established upon a scale unexcelled since the depression of 1907. They are already moving swiftly toward that point. The new tariff law is no longer a mystery to business men, sources of credit know what to expect under the provisions of the new currency law and the Washington administration faces another session of congress without any program of economic legislation at which business is likely to take fright.

OLD CRUISER AGAIN USED.

Brooklyn, Shiley's Flagship at Santiago, Works After Ten Years.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 28.—The old cruiser Brooklyn, which was the flagship of Rear-Admiral Schley at the battle of Santiago, went into commission at the Philadelphia navy yard after an idleness of more than 10 years. The historic vessel has undergone a number of important changes and has been completely remodeled.

The Brooklyn, when fully commissioned, will carry a crew of 550 officers and men, but for the present only a skeleton crew will man the vessel.

The Brooklyn has been assigned to the Atlantic reserve fleet, but later will be sent to China to relieve her sister ship, the Saratoga.
