CHINESE RULER CRITICISED.

Englishman Pessimistic Regarding Outlook for Republic.

PEKIN, Jan. 29.—W. V. Drummond, an Englishman who has been in China many years, writes a highly pessimistic article to the North China Herald. He says that President Yuan's action in breaking up the parliament swept away the last shadow of pretense as to the existence of a republic. The government is now a dictatorship of the most absolute description, and the tendency of the signs so far visible is all in the direction of reversion to a type nearly resembling the Manchu government prior to its last days of decadence. The two chief weapons wielded by the Manchu dynasty were bribery and intimidation. These have been brought into play with steadily increasing clearness during the last 12 months, and have become glaringly apparent during the most recent events. Edicts and mandates preach admirably, but in actions there is no sign of improvement. It is extremely unlikely that a dictatorship by a nominal president will be acquiesced in peacefully by the people for any length of time.

The behavior of the young republicans and the methods of Yuan Shi Kai are equally hopeless as regards the chances of establishing a really stable government.

HABITUAL DRUNKARDS WIN.

Seven Collect Reward for Remaining Sober One Year.
LONDON, Jan. 29.—Twelve months ago Alderman Vernon Wragge, thrice Lord Mayor of York, and now recorder of Pontefract, offered 20 of the "habitual drunkards of York" £5 each if, during the year, they were not once convicted of drunkenness. Seven of the 20 were successful and recently they, with their wives or husbands and friends, were invited to a substantial tea, after which Vernon Wragge presented them with a savings bank book containing a deposit of £5, which may be withdrawn gradually. The Alderman asked them not to withdraw any of it except in case of great need, and not only to leave the whole sum in the bank, but to add to it during the year. To encourage them in this thrifty course he promised that to whatever of the original amount remains at the end of the year, together with any sum they may legitimately save, he will add 25 per cent on January 1, 1915.

DOG GONE! HE COMES BACK.

Special Messenger Brings Lost Pet From Paris to Coast.
BURLINGAME, Cal., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Francis J. Carolan has regained possession of her blue Pomeranian dog Frou-Frou, a rare animal, which was lost in Paris more than a month ago. The dog has just arrived in Burlingame with a special messenger, after following Mrs. Carolan across the Atlantic Ocean and the American continent. The messenger received \$1000 in addition to his expenses.

When the dog wandered out of Mrs. Carolan's apartments at the Ritz and failed to return, a large reward was offered. Detectives were employed, but no results were obtained until after Mrs. Carolan had sailed for America. Then the pet was found in the public pound. A wireless message was sent to Mrs. Carolan and she sent back word for a special messenger to follow with the dog on the next steamer.

BEQUEST CONTINUES PEACE FOUNDATION

BOSTON, Jan. 29.—The work of the world peace foundation established by Edward Ginn in 1910, has been continued, according to provisions of his will made public. Mr. Ginn left \$5000 annually for the support of the foundation.

Wire Hook Back on Closet Door.

Across the back of my cupboard door I drive rows of tacks, and between the tacks goes a loop of brass picture wire, into which the boots are slipped. If the wire is wound several times around each tack the loop can be made larger or smaller to accommodate different sizes of boots, writes a contributor to the Woman's Home Companion. Wire is cleaner than tape and is also better, because it stands out in a stiff loop, while tape needs to be adjusted each time. Many pairs of boots may be disposed of thus.

Thaws the Pipe.

Salt dissolved in boiling water and poured down a frozen pipe will help to thaw it out. Salt tied about the pipe joint will prevent the freezing of the pipe. Salt sprinkled on window sills and doorsteps will prevent the windows and doors from being frozen shut.—Denver Times.

To Clean Waist.

An easy way to clean a white silk waist, says the Philadelphia North American, is to lay it on a sheet of soft tissue paper, cover it thickly with flour, lay another sheet of tissue paper on top, and roll it as tightly as possible. Leave it for a few days and then take it out and shake it well. Be sure to use only white tissue paper.

Scour at Once.

Clean granite ware that is badly stained by boiling it in water containing washing soda, and as soon as it is removed from the water, scour it with some good cleaning powder. Do not let it cool before scouring. It will be like new.

Turn off the Gas.

In cooking most foods the gas fire under the oven may be turned out before the food is done, for the oven will retain sufficient heat to complete the cooking, says the Newark News. When frying meat and other foods on top of the stove the gas may be turned off several minutes before removing the food, and the heat retained will brown it sufficiently.

Lace Spats.

Have you seen the lace spats? They are one of fashion's latest fancies, says the Newark News. They are made of heavy all-over white lace, some of them lined with white silk, some unlined. The lined ones are warmer of course, but clumsy. With the fact for gauge silk hose and pumps for winter wear, perhaps even lace spats might be better than nothing.

FRUITGROWERS NAME CANNERY DIRECTORS. CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 27.—Nine directors were elected at a big meeting held in Centralia Saturday by the Washington Fruit Growers' Association, an organization that has made arrangements for re-opening the local cannery. The following were elected: A. Blum, D. Wiler and Abe Crabs for three-year terms; Charles Ives, J. C. Norton and E. C. Demore for two-year terms, and F. Reisinger, V. Pearsall and R. F. Jones for one-year terms.

DENIZENS OF UNDERWORLD MUST LEAVE WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Yesterday was moving day for the denizens of Washington's underworld. The Kenyon law, closing resorts, went into effect and the police will see that it is enforced. Three hundred women, many without clothing, were forced into the streets at an early hour. The authorities fear an epidemic of suicides. Threats to invade the residential sections were made by the women.

"We have got to live," they said, "and don't intend to leave Washington."

Stanley Finch, head of the white slave bureau of the department of Justice, canvassed the district and offered the women jobs in department stores here and elsewhere at \$8 a week. The offer was refused in nearly every case.

"We can't live on \$8 a week," they declared, "when we are accustomed to making from \$25 to \$100."

Washington is the first large eastern city to put into effect the Iowa "injunction abatement" law.

WIRELESS SERVICE GROWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—By an agreement announced here between the Marconi Wireless company and the Western Union Telegraph company for the exchange of business, it is made possible by next April to telephone from any American home or office a message for delivery in London, St. Petersburg, Hongkong, Tokio or Honolulu. The telephone message will be delivered to the telegraph company which will turn it over to the wireless to be relayed across the Atlantic or the Pacific as the case may be.

In making the announcement, Edward J. Nally, vice president of the Marconi company, said he expected stations now under construction in the Hawaiian Islands, Japan and Asia to be ready for business in April.

New stations are to be erected at Seattle, Ketchikan and Juneau, Alaska.
