

WHEAT MARKET BULLISH

Market Closes 3-8c Better for Each Option: Argentina Crop is Still the Factor.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—At the closing of the market for options yesterday the price of wheat was 3-8c a bushel better than Tuesday. The market opened with an advance of 1-8c for May and unchanged for July. There was a further fair gain to 3-1-8c for May and 3-1-2c for July on short covering, due to further bullish reports from Argentina.

World's wheat visible supply is 284,281,000 bushels, compared with 261,064,000 bushels a year ago.

Oats supply of United States and Canada, 47,124,000 bushels, compared with 22,299,000 bushels a year ago.

CANADIAN HOGS NOT TO HURT PORTLAND TRADE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—It was reported today that Canadian swine were being brought forward to Puget sound packing houses. This had no effect whatever upon the trade in the North Portland yards, tops again commanding \$8.10 here this morning.

There was only a small offering in the hog sheds for the day and these were quickly picked up at the former extreme price.

Now that there has been a movement of Canadian hogs as well as cattle to the Puget sound market, the trade here is taking stock of conditions. While the importations have hurt the cattle trade, the outlook is for continued good tone in the hog trade here.

Canadian hogs can be sold at markets further east at better prices than they can possibly bring on the coast at this time, therefore it is not likely that much of a movement will come in this direction. Livestock generally moves where the price is best, therefore there is little cause for alarm here.

Sheep Market is Weaker.
Decided tone of weakness is shown in for mutton in the North Portland yards at this time. While there was only a small run for the day, killers took hold rather slowly. Most of the big interests are well filled with mutton and lamb supplies, therefore are little interested in the market at this time.

Cattle Prices Are Better.
Due to a very limited run of stuff in the yards since the week opened, while general expectations were for a very big supply, improved prices were shown for cattle and North Portland today. While it is not believed that the present improvement can be continued if the expected heavy run appears within the immediate future, today's values are from 19c to 15c better than former ones.

Little steers sold in the yards this morning at \$7.40, or fully 15c more than the same class of stuff would have brought a few days ago. On this basis tops are easily worth \$7.75.
