NEW STOCKYARDS AT THE DALLES, ORE.

THE DALLES, Ore., Jan. 29.—D. P. Ketchum & Son, sheep growers of Wasco county, have a crew of men erecting new stockyards in the eastern part of the city. The ground was leased from the O. W. R. & N. Co. and includes five acres. This will be enclosed and divided into sections. Two feed barns will be constructed, about 25,000 feet of lumber being required for the entire work. The yards when completed will be modern in every particular and will accommodate 1800 sheep.

PRISON FOR TRUST VIOLATORS IS URGED

HENS AS BIG AS TURKEYS. ALLENTOWN, Pa., Jan. 30.—Eugene in hens has been carried to a high degree of perfection by Dr. W. J. Lowright. Last year Dr. Lowright evolved a new breed called the "No-flaw," remarkable for size.

For a recent dinner he served a pair of roosters that weighed 31 pounds, and resembled turkeys in size. He has a number that weigh 15 pounds, and a good many that weigh 11 pounds and over. The pullets weigh from eight to 10 pounds.

The "No-flaw" chickens are reddish, chunky and notable for egg-laying and breeding. Dr. Lowright declines to tell how he produces such mammoth chickens.

Radium Helps Cancer Victim. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Representative Robert C. Brenner of New Jersey, who is being treated with radium for cancer in a Baltimore hospital is improving slowly. The representative's sister, after visiting him announced he was in a better condition than at any time since he submitted to the radium treatment.

Prepare the Salad With Care.

The salad bowl or plate should be carefully arranged. Each leaf should be looked over, and any little bruised or faded spot removed, says the New Haven Journal Courier. Wash the leaves in four waters to insure absolute cleanliness. Then place them in a perfectly clean cloth. Gather this cloth up by the four corners and shake it until no water sprays from the leaves. Then put it in a cool place till it is nearly time to serve the salad, when you can remove the leaves from the cloth and dry each.

After the leaves for the salad are dried, the French tear the big leaves with their fingers and put the crisp little white leaves and shredded large ones into a bowl which has been rubbed with garlic. Sprinkle the leaves with salt and pepper. Then put in your oil after which the vinegar, as they mix better that way. The French never use mustard for their salad.

Raveling Fringe.

I have just finished a beautiful crepe de chine evening scarf, two yards long, with a three and one-half inch knotted fringe on each end, writes a contributor to the Woman's Home Companion. In raveling for the fringe, I found it best to draw the straight thread at the bottom, then draw a thread the desired distance from end, and continue pulling out threads toward the end instead of upward, as is the usual way in raveling anything out. In this way the fringe is flat and smooth, knots better, and looks better than when done in the old way.

To Have Your Oven Work Well.

If a coal range is used and one is having difficulty with the oven, it is well to see that the stove is clear of ashes and dust. There is nothing that causes so great a loss of heat energy as a layer of dust on top or beneath the oven, says the Newark News. Take off the back lids of the stove and see that there is no dust forming a coating on top of the stove beneath the covers. This clean, open the air space beneath the oven and be quite as particular in cleaning that.

When baking cake it must be remembered that a hotter oven is needed for cake that is mixed with water than if mixed with milk. If a cupful of water is placed in the lower part of the oven it is a factor in preventing anything burning while baking. Occasionally a cake will rise high in the center of the loaf and then crack open. This is a warning that the heat is too intense.

Wood that is grained or varnished in imitation of hardwood is best cleaned by rubbing it well with cloths wrung out of soapuds, to which some borax has been added. As a finish, rub hard with a soft cloth dipped in kerosene.
