## SAVE WASTE AND REDUCE HIGH COST

LEAKS IN KITCHEN OF HOUSE—HOLDS TO BLAME LARGE—LY FOR PRICES.

Save, Save, Save, Is Cry of Mrs. Susie E. Weber, who has made a life-long study of domestic economy—how to save waste and work in the kitchen. She hopes some day to establish a school in which she will teach the results of her experience.

Mrs. Weber recently delivered a lecture to Normal school girls, who are seeking to learn how a family of five must live to get along on an income of \$19 a week.

"The chief thing is to save waste," said Mrs. Weber. "Let me tell you it is the leaks in the kitchen of many households that are not only partly to blame for the present high cost of living but also the direct cause for not a few divorces. Save your greases, fats and suets off meats, out of which to render lard for cooking purposes. Grate your stale bread to use in place of flour in baking doughnuts, muffins and biscuits. Use one cupful of breadcrumbs to every two

cups of flour or cornmeal. Use celery leaves to make celery soup. Celery soup made this way is the finest. Celery ends make good celery salad. Eat lots of raw carrots if you wish to keep your hair from becoming gray. As for coffee, it all depends on its making. The highest grade does not always make the best coffee. It is care that makes good coffee.

"When working in the kitchen try to find the most graceful way, because it is the easiest. Do not hunch over when peeling potatoes. Bring the potatoes to yourself. You save much of the potatoes as well as yourself. Beat eggs on a platter; not in a bowl. You will get a greater quantity and better results. Have plenty of tools to work with and up to date ones. Keep chickens or a garden so as to use the waste you cannot otherwise prevent."

Miners to Demand Increases. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 30.—Demands for a ten per cent wage increase for coal miners were to be formulated today at a district meeting of the United Mine Workers of America. Patrick Gilday, district president, was to preside. In sounding the keynote of the meeting today Gilday declared that the operators, with whom their contracts expire April 1, are practically certain to grant the increases to be demanded. He predicted that the increases would go into effect by February 1 and that the same wage raises

will be granted in other Pennsylvania districts. The operators today declared that the calling of a convention of the miners for February 24 was done in the hope of forcing a meeting of the wage scales committee of both sides later in the month in order that when the present contracts expire there will have been a month of disagreement over wages, which, according to the contracts, would give the men the right to strike without automatically breaking the agreements.

Farm Homes Behind Age. WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—That the average farm home in the United States is a rebuke to America's boasted civilization is the conclusion reached by the farm architect of the department of agriculture as a result of extended investigation of the subject. In a statement the department emphasizes the importance of an economically constructed and comfortable home for the farmer, the most important feature of which should be the kitchen.

Attention is called to the fact that the average farm home has failed to share in the improvement being made in agricultural conditions. Relatively, it is declared, the housewife of a century ago with her fireplace cooking and log cabin was better provided for than is the housewife today. As a result of the public awakening to the fact that better farm homes are needed the department of agriculture, through its office of farm management, is now investigating this problem systematically and to evolve, if possible, practical improvements for the benefit of the farmer.

Experiments by the Japanese government of producing camphor by distilling the leaves and branches of camphor trees have reached a stage at which 317 gallons of distillate are produced from each 400 pounds of leaves.

Leaf tobacco imported into France during the first eight months of this year weighed 60,000,000 pounds, an increase of 18,000,000 pounds over the corresponding months in 1912.

Worth Knowing. To clean a copper kettle rub its surface with lemon skin and salt. Wipe the surface quickly, and rub with a dry chamol.

Always keep sewing implements handy for dressing fowls—strong cotton, a thimble, tape, twine, needle and scissors.

Stains may be removed from tinware by scouring with common soda, then washing thoroughly and drying.

To eggs baked in individual casseroles add a slice of tomato and a sprinkling of cheese.

Lemon juice and salt, with the aid of sunlight, will remove rust stains on linen.—Detroit Free Press.

Shepherd's Pie. Leftovers may be utilized in this shepherd's pie, says the Chicago Journal: Roast beef, gravy, potatoes mashed with butter. Mince the beef, and put layers of the beef and mashed potatoes in a buttered baking dish. Boisten each meat layer generously with the gravy. Salt and pepper to taste. Make the top layer of potatoes, dot with small pieces of butter and brown. A great deal of rich gravy should be used.

Wide Scarfs. Wide scarfs of velvet or plush, lined with satin, are to be worn when the furs are laid away, according to the New York Tribune. One already seen was of deep sapphire blue velvet, lined with flame colored brocade. A parma violet panne lined with oyster white satin or one of brocade or velvet edged with narrow borders of fur would be effective.

Modes in Brief. Vegetables are said to be among the unusual trimmings designed for the spring hats.

The double skirt effect seems to be more popular than the three tiered-skirt. The platted double skirt will be seen, says the New Haven Journal-Courier.

Pale green velvet is frequently being chosen for evening wear. Jet and tulle are favorite materials in black by which to give the green costume its most charming effect.

The "Medici" hat, named by reason of its likeness to the wired collar, is a small, close-fitting velvet hat trimmed with a ruff of lace wired stiffly upright all around and edged with a narrow band of fur or marabout.

Trig Models. The 1914 sports coats are seen in trig models, the exaggerated belt of last year having been diminished to a very dignified affair, says the New York Times. Some sports coats are in cotton ratine, others of velvet, finished duvetyne. Often the belt is of chamol in the natural color and the coat of a vivid color, making a pretty contrast.

Vapor Tube for Illumination. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Illumination experts are hard at work in the electrical laboratories at Schneckstad, New York, experimenting to produce novel lighting devices for the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. Several original lighting appliances have been devised and these are being perfected in the laboratories.

When developed these devices will add greater enchantment to the brilliant illumination of the exposition and will contribute much to the magnificence and beauty of the palaces and courts.

One of these is a vapor tube which will be used to illuminate the cascades of the Court of Abundance. These tubes will be placed beneath the water and when vari-colored lights are produced in them, their delicate shades will glow through the seething waterfalls, throwing dainty shadows over the vines and evergreens along the cascades.
