FEDERAL OFFICER ISSUES A WARNING

FARMERS ARE NOT ALLOWED
TO SHOOT GEESSE WHICH
FEED IN FIELDS.

Measures of Relief Will Be Provided.
However, if Conditions Are As Bad
As Some Seem to Believe—Inspec-
tor Writes Letter to Mr. Scholl of
Echo, Advising Him.

Taking issue with a letter from
Louis Scholl, Jr., of Echo, published
in this paper a few days ago, L. Alva
Lewis, federal game official, has is-
sued a warning to all farmers against
following the advice of Mr. Scholl to
shoot ducks and geese if they are
damaging their crops. At the same
time he proposes a measure of relief
if conditions are as Mr. Scholl now
believes. The following letter was re-
ceived this morning by the East Ore-
gonian from Mr. Lewis:

February 5, 1914.
To the Editor, East Oregonian, Pen-
dleton, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—
I am enclosing herein a copy of a
letter just written to Mr. Louis Scholl,
Jr., Justice of the Peace, at Echo, in
answer to a letter which he had pub-
lished in your paper on January 31st.
It is felt that in view of Mr. Scholl's
official position, and the fact that he
advised certain persons that they are
within their rights in disregarding the
law, that the public should be given
the information that his advice is er-
roneous and not founded on law, and
is likely to lead innocent persons into
that this letter be given publicity.

The following is his letter to Mr.
Scholl:

February 4, 1914.
Mr. Louis Scholl, Jr., Echo, Oregon.
Dear Sir:—I notice with regret
your letter to the East Oregonian in
which you advised that persons believ-
ing themselves damaged by the geese
may kill same without proceeding in
accordance with a section of law, now
in force, providing for the killing of
game birds and animals doing dam-
age.

I feel that you, as a peace officer,
should have been more careful in ad-
vising the public to commit a crime,
especially in view of the fact that
your court has only subordinate juris-
diction to the federal courts for the
hearing of cases where a violation has
been committed.

I regret very much that you could
not have accompanied Mr. Averill,
Mr. Cranston and myself on our trip
of inspection of the wheat fields. If
you had done so, or would afterward,
and before you wrote the letter, have
taken the trouble to make this in-
vestigation you would have admitted
that no damage had been done, or
that no damage could be done to the
grain by the geese under present con-
ditions. I feel now that you honest-
ly believe that the geese are doing
damage, just as some of the farmers
believe their crops are being damag-
ed.

You believe so because the farm-
ers have told you so. We realize
that if the geese are quite plentiful
and the farmers see the birds work-
ing on their crops, a certain per cent
of these men are sure to jump at the
conclusion the geese are injuring
their crops. Neither Mr. Reese or Mr.
Rohde could show us any damaged
grain. In fact, I believe Mr. Reese
told Mr. Averill that the geese were
not now doing damage but had done
him damage in the past. Mr. Rohde
told the three of us, after vainly en-
deavoring to show us damage, that
while the geese might not be doing
damage now, that two years ago they
did do him damage. Not a single
acre, not even a single rod, of grain
could we find that had been damaged.
Not an acre could we find that had
to be reseeded.

That we did examine the district in
which damage was reported thorough-
ly, I believe you would have admitted
had you accompanied us. When we
would come to a field of grain the
three of us would spread out and
thus cover a wide area, and being fa-
miliar with the feeding habits of game
birds we knew just where to look for
the places where the geese would nat-
urally feed, and we had no difficulty
in locating the feeding grounds. We
saw where the geese had nipped the
tips of the blades of young wheat but
damage we could not find for the
simple reason that at this season the
geese are doing no damage. We did
not attempt to ascertain the damage
the geese might have done last fall
or two years ago, for the obvious rea-
son that such an investigation would
have been impossible.

If you still are of the opinion that
the geese are doing damage to the
crops in your section, we will, at any
time, be pleased to assign a represen-
tative to accompany you to any lo-
cality to investigate conditions. If
damage is found we will also afford
the farmers such relief as we can in
accordance with law. We will also
be pleased to pay all expenses of the
investigation, such as lively hire, etc.
This offer is open to any reliable per-
son who feels that he can show dam-
age.

The game belongs to the people in
their sovereign capacity, and accord-
ingly the people have elected to say
when and in what way the wild crea-
tures may be taken. The season when
geese and ducks may be taken is from
October 1 to and including January
1. At other times it is made a crime
to kill the birds, except under excep-
tional circumstances, such as damage
to property, permission may be ob-
tained on application to your game
warden to kill the birds or animals,
and the law is so worded that it is
compulsory on the game warden to
show where actual damage can be
shown. Every complaint of damage

appear in the federal court at Port-
land and answer for his crime and

crops are being damaged for the rea-
son that a plain provision of law had
not been complied with in order to
obtain relief.

Assuring you that it is the desire
of this department to work in co-
operation with the people in the preser-
vation of the game and that careful at-
tention will be given to all communi-

MINTO STARTS FUND FOR
BURIAL AT CHAMPOEG

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 6.—John Minto,
82 years old, has started a fund for
the preservation of the body of Francis
Xavier Matthieu until next May,
when on the anniversary of the event-
ful day in the early history of the
Oregon country, when Mr. Matthieu
took the decisive step that saved Ore-
gon to the United States, the body
may be buried on the historical spot
at Champeog, where Mr. Minto wants
an appropriate monument to be erect-
ed.

When Mr. Minto heard of the death</
