Home Hints and Recipes

Color Restored. Blue stockings, especially a very delicately tinted kind, which have faded, can have the color restored by dipping them into hot water in which ammonia bluing has been poured, and some lumps of alum dissolved, or they can, together with white stockings, be recolored, and so continue to do a great deal of service, says the Toledo Blade. To the alum add dye instead of bluing, and so recolor the faded pinks and blues and tan-colored hosiery which have collected.

Nutpicks Handy. A nutpick is the handiest thing I know of to take covers off milk bottles or to take paper out of tin covers of peanut butter jars, and if the corkers disappear when a cork is to be removed, run a nutpick down at side of cork and a firm, gentle, upward pressure will remove it, writes a contributor to Los Angeles Express. In fact, I find a nutpick so handy that I keep one at my elbow all the while.

To clean cooking utensils, save your eggshells and when you burn anything in your granite pans, or anything sticks badly use the eggshell to scour the pans. Take a bunch of shells and rub over the burned part and see how quickly all trace of burned food is removed.—Los Angeles Express.

Caps and Bags for Theater. Theater caps with bags to match can be purchased in the shops, but if one has a little skill with the needle they may be made at comparatively little outlay. These caps are made of crepe meteor, chiffon cloth, beaded net or other materials that lend themselves to graceful, folds, crinkled over the forehead. A particularly attractive one is made of a warm golden brown shade of crepe meteor, gathered into a two-inch band of gold lace insertion, the band in turn being edged at top and bottom with very narrow strips of dark fur. In the middle of the front of the cap, at the top of the gold lace band, just where the material is gathered very full, is set an ornament. This gives a pleasing accent to the whole construction. The bag matches the cap in material and color and is large enough to hold opera glass and handkerchief. It is drawn together with a ribbon run through a casing near the top, in the usual way.

Knife Handles Put on Stay. A new method of attaching knife blades to handles is becoming so popular that it is expected it will cause a revolution in the cutlery trade. The

knife is made without a crop; and the blades are fixed by means of two wedges forced into a turned steel socket, the upper part of which is formed into a crop to balance the knife, says the Kansas City Star.

This turned steel socket is soldered in the hollow handle of the knife, which may consist of steel, German silver or any other metal. The manufacturers claim that one of the great advantages of this knife is that it is absolutely immovable in the handle, while the blades made in the old fashion are fastened into the handles by the means of some kind of cement which becomes loose in hot water. The knife handle is free from edges and therefore can easily be cleaned.

Heels Shifted. How to get your money's worth out of rubber heels: When the heels wear down on one side pry them off with screwdriver or strong shears. Go easy, get the nails up with the rubber. Take the right, place on left. Get the points of the nails in the same holes. They fit. That brings the thick part on the outside. Now hammer it down. Do the same thing with the other shoe.—Los Angeles Express.

Don't Move Clock. A clock should never be moved from one position, says the St. Louis Star. If it does not go when it is first placed, probably it is placed unevenly. An unevenness of a fraction of an inch may cause a clock to vary several minutes from the right time each day or may cause it to fall to go altogether. So start it in a good position and leave it there as long as possible.

The Care of Children

The greatest problem of today in child training is, how shall we help our little ones to strength of will? Civilization is being sapped by our weaklings. Home training, the public schools, do not develop character. Dr. Montessori tells us that this is because parents and teachers do not know what will, fundamentally, is. Dr. Montessori says, "To will is to be able. The little child who persistently struggles to pile block upon block, until a miniature tower or castle rises under his fingers, persisting until he completes the labor, is taking his first step toward will-training."

One object of the Better Babies Contest is to learn what is wrong with the child and then seek the cause and finally apply the remedy. The other things the child to the contest expecting to win a prize. The examining doctors tell her why the baby does not take a prize, then how its condition may be improved. It is not always the poor mother who needs advice. Often it is the middle class, the well to do mother who honestly thinks her baby is a better baby and is surprised to learn how much better it can be made.

During the first year the baby gets his exercise by crying a short time each day, and by thrashing his arms and legs about when he is unhampered by tight and improper clothing. At six or eight months of age his muscles are brought into more vigorous use by creeping about on the floor and, at a year, by his attempts to walk.

CRAWFORD'S OPINION SAME AS TREASURER'S

Oregon's tax law muddle has been clarified considerably by a letter from Attorney General Crawford denying that he had advised that a penalty could not be imposed should payment of half of the taxes be left until Sept. first.

A Portland paper originally carried an article quoting the attorney general's position and the county papers generally gave the report circulation. County tax collectors took notice and announced they would follow the law as they interpreted it, the purported opinion of the attorney general to the contrary notwithstanding. Now comes the aforesaid attorney general and complains as follows: "This office has held constantly that all taxes are due April 1, the other half can rest until September 1, but a penalty of one percent for every month or delay is added until Sept. 1; then if not paid Sept. 1, ten per cent more is added, and the whole amount then begins to draw interest at twelve per cent per annum." Which would indicate that the attorney general and the county tax gatherers have been of one mind all the time relative to the workings of the new law.

EMPLOYEES SHARE PROFITS.

Ford Automobile Company Distributes Earnings to Workers. NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The first payment by the Ford Automobile company in its \$10,000,000 profit-sharing plan was made to the 400 odd employees in its Eastern plant at Jackson avenue and Hunnewell street, Long Island City.

The first bonus share from January 12, and the employees' share in the profits will be handed out every two weeks. The exact amount distributed today could not be learned, inquirers being referred to the main office in Detroit.

Office boys in the plant, some of whom are not more than 10 years of age, suddenly found themselves boosted in salary to \$2 a day. Stenographers, too, were boosted to the \$5 limit, provided they aided in supporting a family.

CHIMES TO VIE WITH BAND.

Bagtime and Sacred Melody Will Compete in Church Election. CARTERSVILLE, Mo., Feb. 7.—Whether the rag time melodies of a brass band have a greater vote-getting power than the chimes of church bells will be decided in a local option election to decide whether saloons shall be allowed again after four years' prohibition.

The wets are paying for the band, while the dries are going to have church bells tolled in an effort to drown its music.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—The bout between Joe Rivers and Leach Cross, scheduled for February 20, is off. Rivers claims he injured his left hand in his Milwaukee bout with Ad Wollast and that he will be unable to fight before the middle of March.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—The Los Angeles chamber of commerce is opposed to the proposed unmerging of the Southern and Central Pacific railroads by the government. A report of the chamber's transportation committee declared that such action would retard the development of California and be injurious to business. It was adopted and forwarded to Washington to be presented to the attorney general.

TACOMA, Feb. 7.—That shingle manufacturers are undaunted by the competition of the Canadian manufacturers since the cut in the tariff on shingles is evidenced here by the letting of contracts for the machinery

for two large shingle mills to be erected at Raymond and Everett.

TACOMA, Feb. 7.—"Movies" in the church is the very latest innovation to be adopted here. "Pilgrims' Progress" will be presented Sunday afternoon at vesper services in the First Congregational church in moving pictures.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—The Los Angeles board of education has decreed that teachers in the public schools must train pupils to pronounce correctly the name of their city. The board says nothing but Los Angeles is less permissible.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 7.—Inheritance tax of \$2348 against the Edward W. Sparrow estate in Douglas and Lane counties has been paid to the state treasurer. The tax was on a valuation of \$256,840.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—"A right swing to the jaw was his favorite blow and he landed it whenever he felt like it," was the assertion of Mrs. Elsie May Aldridge in seeking a divorce from Bill Aldridge, former fight promoter at Venice. She got the de-

creed with \$500 monthly alimony. Aldridge weighs 200 pounds, and his former wife 100.

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 7.—Transcontinental railroads will put their usual annual collector rates to the west into effect March 15, according to Gerrit Fort, passenger traffic manager of the Union Pacific. These rates usually result in heavy emigration to the Pacific coast.

Berlin Police Seize Lifelike Wax Model of Woman in Window. BERLIN, Feb. 7.—"Corset raids" are the latest form of police activity in Berlin. Shops have lately been displaying corsets on life-size female figures in

wax. Protesters were made against the "immorality" of such exhibitions and the shopkeepers made a concession by putting filmy petticoats on the figures.

The public prosecutor was not satisfied and a number of policemen, in the guise of customers, raided a fashionable shop in the Leipzigerstrasse and seized a particularly lifelike wax model of a young woman, which had been the subject of attraction to people in the street.

Shop windows are now being secretly photographed by the police with a view to further action.

ITALY EXTENDS TAX LEVY.

MILAN, Italy, Feb. 7.—Italy's New Year surprise in the shape of super-taxes on spirits and tobacco, which took immediate effect, is expected to add \$7,500,000 to the national budget. Recent years have witnessed an enormous increase in the consumption of these articles.

Prime necessities, such as sugar, are also threatened, and the fact that sugar in Italy is already dearer than in any other country in Europe has provoked a widespread agitation.
