



JAPANESE POLICE CHARGE INTO MOB FIGHTING IS RESUMED IN TOKIO AND MANY SERIOUSLY INJURED

Anti-Tax Sympathizers Attempt to Hold Meeting in Street to Denounce Squandering of Money.

SABERS ARE FREELY USED

Two Hundred Persons Are Arrested After Battle in Which Mob Hurls Stones and Uses Clubs Against Police—Newspapers are Suppressed—Rioting elsewhere Reported.

TOKIO, Feb. 13.—Bloody fighting occurred today between the police and throngs of anti-tax rioters. This made the third day of disorders in the city.

Five hundred police undertook to disperse a crowd of many thousands gathered to hear speakers denounce the squandering of money wrong from the people by crushing taxation. The throng showed fight. The police charged frequently, wielding their sabers remorselessly. The rioters resisted with clubs and paving stones. They finally were scattered after a large number had been injured. Two hundred were arrested. Scores of shop fronts were demolished.

Only the fact that the government regulations make it practically impossible for the average citizen to own firearms prevented a long death roll. Several newspapers, which criticized the government's policy, have been suppressed and the editors arrested. The prisons are filled. Trouble has been reported at Osaka, Kobe and elsewhere.

COCKBURN HAS CHANGED HIS MIND; TO RUN AGAIN

MILTON MAN ANNOUNCES HE WILL BE IN RACE TO SUCCEED HIMSELF.

Though it has been only a week since H. M. Cockburn of Milton announced that he was not a candidate to succeed himself as county commissioner and that he wished to devote the next two years to his private affairs, he has reconsidered his intention and yesterday came forward with a formal announcement of his candidacy for nomination at the republican primaries.

Urgent solicitation from his friends has caused him to change his mind. He says: "For some months I have been undecided whether or not I should make the race," he states in his announcement. "In fact I had practically decided that I would not be a candidate. During the last month, however, repeated solicitations from many electors in every part of the county have caused me to change my mind and allow my name to be used at the republican primaries."

Mr. Cockburn states he will make his race upon his record during his term of office. He admits he has made mistakes but declares they have been made honestly and that he has always worked for the best interests of the whole county.

TWO WELL KNOWN MEN BOOMED FOR JUDGESHIP

George Roberts, half brother of ex-Congressman W. B. Ellis and well known local farmer is being boomed by his friends as a candidate for the republican nomination for county judge. Though up to this time Mr. Roberts has made no announcement on the subject it is known he is considering the matter and in all probability will enter the race.

Another prospective candidate for the republican nomination is Douglas Belts, prominent retired sheepman and owner of the Schmidt building on Main street. Mr. Belts has been considering the matter for some time past and has been importuned by many friends to seek the judgeship. Like Mr. Roberts he has thus far made no formal announcement.

Judge Maloney has stated positively that he will not be a candidate to succeed himself.

HANLEY AND POLITICAL BEE ARE CLOSE FRIENDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13.—The opening session of the Oregon irrigation congress was given a sensation when William Hanley, after Mayor Albee had delivered an address of welcome, submitted his resignation as president. It was accepted. "I've got a political bee buzzing in my bonnet and don't intend to head any organization until it leaves me," said Hanley referring to his candidacy for United States senator.

Secretary Hinkle's report showed the congress has increased to a membership of 60. Irrigation projects which are each allowed five delegates.

PROSECUTION IN TRIAL OF SENATOR GORE RESTS CASE

EFFORT MADE BY DEFENSE TO GET ADMISSION OF A "FRAME UP."

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 13.—The prosecution rested at 9:45 o'clock this morning in the Gore case. J. H. Ballinger and wife, parents of Mrs. Bond, swore their daughter had been on the verge of nervous prostration since last March, the time of the alleged attack. J. H. Eary, president of the Jacksonian club, who testified yesterday of the alleged efforts of Gore to hush up the affair, was recalled by the defense. He admitted telling D. M. Beatty "We have got to get rid of Gore."

Thaddeus Robertson was also called by the defense. He was asked if he had not admitted in the presence of others at the Hotel Winston that the incident was a frame-up. The prosecution's objection to the question was sustained.

INTRODUCTION CALIFORNIA QUAIL MADE IN E. OREGON

DISTRICT WARDEN AVERILL RECEIVES CONSIGNMENT OF 24 PAIRS.

The first introduction of the California quail into eastern Oregon was made today when District Game Warden E. F. Averill received from State Warden Finley a consignment of 24 pairs of these birds. Half of them will be released at the game refuge near Hermiston and the other half at the refuge on the state hospital grounds. Another shipment will be made a little later and the birds will be liberated in other parts of the county.

The quail, as Umatilla county has known it in the past, is of two kinds, bob-white and Oregon quail. The California quail differs from the Oregon quail in appearance by the fact that its top-knot projects forward instead of backward as on the Oregon quail. The bob-white is easily distinguished from either by the absence of any top-knot.

The California quail is said to be much more hardy than either of the other varieties, withstanding the rigors of winter much better. Mr. Averill believes the birds are adapted to this climate and will multiply rapidly.

He also expects to receive soon a shipment of 48 pairs of Hungarian pheasants, a bird about the size of a wood grouse and having many characteristics of the China pheasant and quail. These birds are native of Hungary and a carload is now being brought from that country by Max Muller, a bird enthusiast formerly in charge of the pheasantry at the state asylum. He previously brought one carload and they were released in the Willamette valley where they are doing splendidly. Mr. Averill declares they are one of the swiftest flying game birds he ever saw.

This unusual picture was made as a cabin boy of the British steel freighter Queen Louise was being whisked to shore and safety when his ship ran afoul of a shoal a half mile north of Macasquan, N. J. RELEASE OF MOTHER JONES SOUGHT BY HABEAS CORPUS

PETITION IS FILED WITH SUPREME COURT BY ATTORNEY FOR UNION.

DENVER, Feb. 13.—Mother Jones' release through habeas corpus is being sought by Horace Hawkins, attorney for the miners' union. He filed a petition with the supreme court direct today. In causing her arrest and detention the petition charged that Adjutant General Chase violated the constitution and the bill of rights.

It assumed Chase acted by virtue of the supreme court's decision upholding the arrest under similar circumstances of President Moyer of the miners' union during a strike ten years ago. Hawkins asked that this decision be now set aside and that the dissenting opinion of Justice Steel, who differed from the rest of the court concerning the Moyer case, be substituted.

MICHIGAN MINERS WELCOME PROBE OF UNION AFFAIRS

HANCOCK, Feb. 13.—That Michigan's striking copper miners welcome an inquiry into their union affairs and the conduct of its officers was declared by Judge Hilton, the men's legal adviser, before the congressional committee.

"And at the same time," continued Hilton, "we want to ask you to inquire into the owners' finances. Further, we hope the committee will investigate the Citizens' Alliance, its officers and its purposes."

The committee took the request under consideration. Chairman Taylor is uncertain how far to go. He has telegraphed for copies of the federal industrial commissions' report, published in Washington Wednesday and will have it inserted in the record.

DRIVE SPECULATORS OUT AIM OF IRRIGATIONISTS

STRICTER REGULATIONS FOR LOCATORS WILL BE DEMAND.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13.—Stricter regulations governing locators on irrigated land to the end that the speculator shall be eliminated will be demanded by the Oregon irrigation congress, which begins its third annual session at the Imperial hotel this morning.

"Drive the speculator out," says A. O. Walker of Alfalfa, who fathered a set of stinging resolutions that were adopted by an informal meeting of central Oregon delegates yesterday afternoon.

These resolutions will be sent up to the general congress for final adoption tomorrow night. They call upon the desert land board of the state to require actual proof of cultivation before title to property can be passed, and prohibit the sale of land "under the ditch" until it is actually provided with water.

In an effort to secure adequate financial support for the central Oregon irrigation project, now under development, delegates from Crook county today will bring to the formal attention of the congress the plan recently submitted by Governor West for using the money derived from the sale of land in the Tumalo project for completing the north ditch of the central Oregon project.

The congress will be called upon either to endorse the governor's plan or to reject it finally. Many delegates from Crook county are in favor of it, with some modifications.

FLOYD H. WILKINS GETS STAY OF EXECUTION

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 13.—Floyd H. Wilkins, sentenced to be executed March 24 for the murder of Lou Winters, in Portland, was granted a stay of execution by the supreme court pending his appeal.

REBELS FROM COLD IN EAST IS NOT YET IN SIGHT

Nine Deaths Reported in New York and Other Sections Are Suffering Extensively From Wave.

ATLANTIC IS STORM TOSSED

Lodging Houses in Metropolis Are Overcrowded and Many Sleep in Police Stations and at Morgue—Firemen Handicapped in Fighting Many Fires That Break Out.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Eleven had died from cold up to noon today. Nine above were registered but the temperature is rising although a northerly wind, reaching the proportion of a blizzard is predicted for this afternoon.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Nine deaths were reported from the cold last night. Scores were overcome and would have succumbed but for timely relief. The municipal lodging houses could accommodate only a fraction of those applying for places to sleep. Charitable organizations were swamped, many were allowed to sleep in police stations. About twenty bunked in the morgue. The weather was so cold that the hungry couldn't stand in the bread lines. Fifty fire alarms were sounded in nine hours. The fires were extremely hard to fight for the water froze at the nozzles. The firemen fought encased in ice. A terrific gale from the north Atlantic swept the city and masters of ice incumbered liners arriving said mountainous seas were running.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 13.—A snow storm which started yesterday continued today. The city and interurban car traffic is paralyzed. Overland trains are very late. A number of schools have been closed because the children were afraid to venture out in the snow.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 13.—One death and several prostrations from the cold are reported. Jeremiah McGraw fell unconscious at the entrance to charity hospital and died a few minutes later. The mercury touched six below. Relief organizations are overwhelmed.

AKED RESIGNS AS HEAD OF CHURCH FEDERATION

HIS STATEMENT REGARDING IMMACULATE BIRTH CAUSES ACTION.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—Dr. Charles F. Aked, of the First Congregational church, has resigned the presidency of the San Francisco Church Federation. He will not attend the meeting of the executive committee in the California-street Methodist Episcopal church, having already announced his intention to Secretary Hatch. This is the outcome of the attack on him following his declaration that he did not believe in the immaculate birth of Jesus Christ or in the dogma of the immaculate conception.

He will, however, attend the general meeting of the federation. Monday night, and there will announce his views and reasons for retiring, he said.

His resignation as head of the federation, a position to which he was elected a few weeks ago, was asked by the Presbyterian Ministers' Association following his pronouncement. Dr. Aked at once declared that he would not retain the presidency.

"I will not attend the executive committee meeting," he said. "I will, however, take the chair at the general meeting of the federation, give my reasons for not retaining the presidency and deliver an address on the strength of union."

"I never desired office, and if I am not wanted I do not seek or desire the post. I desire to cause no dissension. If the union will be stronger without my retaining office, I wish to step from it."

FREIGHT STEAMER AND ITS CREW OF 8 BELIEVED LOST

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The freight steamer My Own sank in the English channel off Shobeham. It is believed the crew of eight were drowned. The captain was found by lifesavers clinging to the rigging.

HEAD OF PARIS FIRM OF MORGAN & CO. IS ILL

PARIS, Feb. 13.—John J. Hartjes head of the Paris firm of Morgan and Company is reported seriously ill at Grasse.

BANDIT OFFERS TO LEND HIS OUTLAWS TO FEDERAL CAUSE

Huerta Makes no Statement if He Will Accept Force Which Burned the Tunnel at Cumbre.

REBELS READY TO ATTACK

Four Towns to be Advanced Against as Once According to Plans—Oil Supply Runs Out in Mexico City and Serious Fuel Famine Again Seems About to Ensnare There.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 13.—That the rebels are prepared to attack Torreon, Monterrey, Tampico and Mazatlan simultaneously was the news received here by war minister Blanquet today. Huerta has received a letter from Maximo Castillo, the bandit whose destruction of the Mexican Northwestern tunnel at Cumbre caused a passenger train wreck in which more than 50 were killed, offering his services to the federals. It was not stated whether Huerta will accept. The letter was dated February 6.

With the oil supply from Tampico again cut off, the Mexican capital once more faced a serious fuel situation. It is said the railroad track is so badly torn up that repairs will take some time even if the rebels don't oppose them.

Of the fight which preceded the work of destruction nothing was made public further than that a train was partly dynamited and nearly all the military escort of 50 killed, while many passengers lost their lives or were wounded.

Alfonse Bertillon Is Dead. PARIS, Feb. 13.—Alfonse Bertillon, the noted anthropologist and head of the identification bureau of the Paris police, died here today.

NATIVE FILIPINOS ASK AMERICAN PROTECTORATE

MANILA, Feb. 13.—The convention of native progressives unanimously adopted resolutions asking the United States congress for an American protectorate, though with a local autonomy, until the Philippines are able to repel foreign aggression.

Lost in Mojave Desert. SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Feb. 13.—Search was instituted for S. S. Ballard, a prospector of Jerome, Ariz., who has disappeared in the Mojave desert.

NEW HEAD OF JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY

He was for a long time dean of political science at Columbia University and more recently legal adviser to the republic of China.
