## TACOMA ARTILLERY IS HIGH SCORE HOLDER

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 13.—Notification by the war department that the fourth company, coast artillery of Tacoma, holds the highest score in the United States for firing large guns was received by Captain Clarence Parker. Using 10 inch guns at Fort Worden, the local company scored 70.3 out of a possible 100.

The second score of 45 was made by a Maine company on 12 inch guns. The competition was entered by 85 companies. It was held at the different forts along the Pacific and Atlantic coasts during last summer.

## HOW WEATHER MAN CAN MAKE FORECASTS

NOTHING MYSTERIOUS OR OCCULT ABOUT THE METHODS NOW IN USE.

Storms Are Followed in Their Courses and Predictions Made by Weather Bureau in Accordance With Simple Laws Which Are Understood—How Observations Are Made.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Many people have an idea that there is something mysterious and occult about the work of the weather bureau in forecasting the coming of storms, frosts and floods. Not a few think that the observers must necessarily get their data by reading the planets, the stars and the moon. As a matter of fact the forecaster of the bureau foretells the coming of disturbances in a businesslike way, very similar to that in which a man who has ordered a shipment of goods would estimate the date of its arrival.

Suppose a business man had ordered a carload of pineapples from the Hawaiian Islands. He would know the average time it would take the steamer to make the trip to the Pacific port, the average time for unloading and loading into refrigerator cars, and the average number of days to be allowed these cars for their trip across the continent to New York. His estimate, however, would be subject to error because the steamship might be delayed by fog, or the cars might meet with an accident.

Storms, like pineapples, as a rule do not originate in the United States. They come to us from the Philippines, Japan, Siberia, Alaska, Canada or the Gulf of Mexico. The weather bureau gets cable, telegraphic or wireless notice of a foreign storm. Station after station, or vessel after vessel reports the storm's arrival in its neighborhood, so that the general direction and rate of progress can be determined very early. In fact, the arrival of some storms can be forecasted ten days in advance.

To keep tab on cold waves that come into the United States from Canada and Alaska, the weather bureau studies the Canadian weather reports. England sends reports from Iceland, the British Islands and continental Europe, and daily reports come from St. Petersburg on the conditions in Russia and Siberia.

The same businesslike system used in tracing the track of a storm is applied in determining the arrival of frosts.

Flood forecasts are made in much the same way. Information as to the amount of rainfall at the headwaters of streams that cause floods are covered by telegraphic reports sent by local observers. As this rain reaches the main channel, the height of the water in the channel is determined by successive gauging stations. Past records establish how much a height, say of 20 feet at Dubuque, Iowa, will produce at Davenport, another station 80 miles down the Mississippi. This plan is followed all the way down the river, and at each point full allowance is made for the effects of water from tributaries, and from additional and local rainfall. As a result of these observations in the recent flood, the people of Cairo had warning a week or ten days in advance. The Pittsburg district can be given only 12 to 24 hours' notice, because a flood is upon them within 24 hours after a heavy rain storm.

## Irrigation Bulletin Issued.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—With a view to giving quick and accurate information on special irrigation investigations the geological survey has adopted the plan of issuing short bulletins upon completion of such work. The first bulletin, issued today, holds that vegetables, certain fruits, alfalfa and other field crops can be raised profitably in the vicinity of Wichita, Kansas, through the use of "ground water." This is a supply which may be obtained through wells, as an aid to agriculture in the Kansas draughts.

## "POOR LONE WIDOW" GAG PROVES SUCCESS

BAKER FOLKS FALL FOR PASTHETIC STORY TOLD BY MRS. MARY SIDES.

Collection is Taken Up and Even the Mayor Helps Along—Says She Is On the Way to Huntington—Pendleton Officials Recognized Her as Having Tried Fake Before.

Baker people seem to be a little more gullible than Pendleton folk. At any rate they swallowed the pathetic story told by Mrs. Mary Sides and her flock of children and touched by tender pity, coughed up shekels enough to send them on their way rejoicing in the success of their "sympathy gag." Here in Pendleton she was recognized by the officers and others as the same woman who worked the city a year ago with a similar tale and though lacking positive proof, they branded her as a professional beggar and assert a man is traveling with her to assist her in times of trouble and to share in her profits.

The following story from the Baker Herald tells how the mayor and others of that city fell for her tale of woe:

A widow with five children and without a cent arrived in Baker yesterday on her way from Seattle to Denver. Two months ago her husband, a laboring man, died at Seattle and left her virtually penniless. The little fund did not cover the funeral expenses and the widow started out at once to try to get to Denver where she has a mother, herself in straightened circumstances. Bit by bit the mother and her five little ones—the oldest is a boy of 14; the youngest a baby in arms—have traversed the miles between the coast and the interior, and now in Huntington where, she said, her mother would have some money waiting for her.

It appears that the mother in Denver has a cow—the only merchantable article of real value. She had written her daughter that she would sell this cow and forward the money to Huntington, so Huntington is the widow's immediate goal.

Her story reached the ears of Mayor Palmer and he quickly arranged that tickets to Huntington be provided. Then the Social Workers gave \$5 and it was a treat to see the sparkle in the widow's eyes as she fingered the gold piece which meant so much to her. A real estate man gave her 25 cents and she used this to buy a pair of shoes for the baby. Good people of Baker provided clothing and food and the widow and her children went on their way from Baker to Huntington with hearts much lighter than when they arrived.

## AGED TRAPPER THOUGHT TO BE DEAD UNDER ICE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 13.—Tracks leading to a jagged hole in the ice near Worden indicate that G. W. Jones, an aged trapper who has been missing for several days, lost his life while making the rounds of his traps. The evidence indicating that he had gone through the ice was found after three days of searching. Jones had a homestead near Worden about 20 miles from Klamath Falls. He had resided on it for three years and had carried on a successful and remunerative trapping business during the winters.
