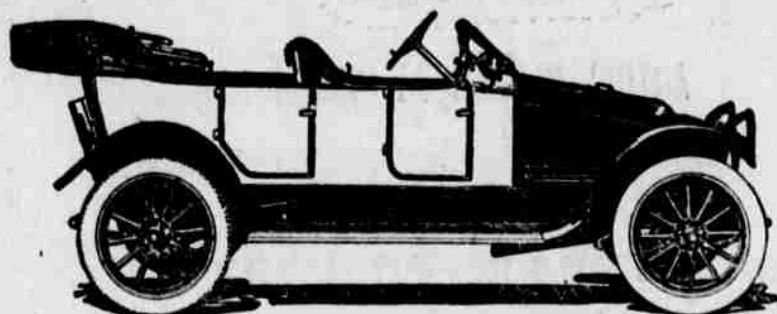

SAYS FEDERAL OFFICERS
SLIGHTED MINE OWNERS

NO ARBITRATION PROPOSAL SUBMITTED FOR SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE.

DENVER, Feb. 13.—Before the congressional committee today John C. Osgood, chief spokesman for the mine owners, continued his testimony. "When Ethelbert Stewart, representing the federal labor department was here in connection with the strike he visited none of the owners until a day or two before he left," said Osgood. "He had no arbitration proposal, and said he wanted no information from us. Secretary of Labor Wilson, when here, was with the unionists most of the time. He only talked to us briefly. In a report made later he said if the owners had consented to arbitration the strike could have been ended. I am trying to correct that impression."

Osgood asserted that miners' wages averaged more than \$4 a day and invited an investigation to examine the books so as to convince themselves. Cross examined, the witness admitted the owners have a tacit agreement among themselves, though not in a regular organization. He defended the operators' control of saloons in some districts, saying he recognized the miners right to liquor if they wanted it, but believed by controlling the saloons, they could regulate the quantity of intoxicants consumed. He owned freely that there had been a "shocking number of mine accidents in Colorado," but denied they were due to the owners' refusal to recognize the unions.

POOLROOMS ACQUITTED BY JURORS IN BEND

BEND, Ore., Feb. 13.—After spending three days trying cases brought by the newly formed Law and Order league against proprietors of local poolrooms for keeping open on Sunday, the juries in the two cases brought in verdicts of "not guilty." The league was formed by Rev. E. J. Bulgin at the close of the revival meetings he conducted here in January, and its first efforts were directed against the poolrooms. Both were run in an orderly manner, but were open on Sundays.

WOMAN WAS STRANGLED IS OPINION OF THE JURY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13.—Death from strangulation was the verdict returned by the coroner's jury investigating the death of Mrs. Anna McIntosh, who was found dead in her room at the Rheinfels hotel Sunday evening. The investigators were unable to name the person responsible for her death.

The woman's husband is still held at the city jail, pending further investigation by the detectives, who believe they have circumstantial evidence connecting him with the crime. McIntosh now refuses to talk of the affair, although he vigorously denied knowing of the crime when first arrested.

TOO MANY HINDUS HERE, ALREADY SAYS COMMISSIONER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Commissioner of Immigration Caminetti and A. W. Parker of the department of labor told the house immigration committee that the immigration of Hindus into the United States should be prevented. They declared the situation on the Pacific coast already was alarming.

Young Men's Club Will Fill Long Felt Need

ORGANIZATION FORMED YES, TERDAY FOR SOCIAL AND ATHLETIC PURPOSES.

At a meeting held here yesterday, the anniversary of the birth of Lincoln, there was formed an organization that promises to meet with much popularity among the young men of the city. It is the Young Men's Club and the purpose of the organization is to provide a social and athletic club for young men above the age of 18 years.

W. P. Evans, secretary of the Farmers' Union Grain agency has been the chief spirit in working for the formation of the club. Mr. Evans has a bible class in the Presbyterian church and states that the idea of the organization had its inception there. The desire is to provide a place where young men may meet for social and amusement purposes. It will not be a religious organization and membership will be open to all above 18 years without reference to church membership or church leanings.

At the meeting yesterday a permanent organization was formed with the following officers: Charles Calvin, president; Arnet Grigsby, vice president; and Richard Hansen, secretary-treasurer. The initiation fee is \$1 and the membership dues will be 50 cents a month. It is the purpose to make the club entirely self supporting and no public subscription is contemplated. Already the club has a membership of 18.

The new club has not yet secured quarters but it is the intention to rent and fit up such a place in the near future.

Arrange Harness Race Dates.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 13.—Programs, dates and purses for harness racing on the fair circuits in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia this summer, are being arranged today by the directors of the North Pacific Fair association, who began a two days' conference. It was believed that purses would be limited to \$500 or \$400 as it was said that last season various fair associations advertised larger purses than they were able to pay.

WHITE SOX WILL GO INTO TRAINING AT OAKLAND

OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 13.—The Chicago White Sox have made reservations at Hotel Oakland for the spring training seasons of 1914 and 1915 and will remain in this city, even while playing ball in San Francisco. This decision was received this week by Manager Reiter from Danny Lonk, western representative of the American League team.

The Sox will reach Oakland March 4, and will begin training at once.

Lincoln Memorial Work Starts.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Contractors on the \$2,000,000 Lincoln Memorial hoped today to begin work of breaking ground for the gigantic marble pile which will honor the man whose birthday the nation yesterday commemorated—Abraham Lincoln.

The movement to break ground formally on the 105th anniversary of Lincoln's birthday was inaugurated by ex-Senator Wetmore of Rhode Island a few weeks ago, and the contractors rushed their preparations.
