The Care of Children

DON'TS.
Don't—Feed the baby too often or
too much.
Don't—Let him be longer than 20
minutes at the breast or bottle at one
feeding.
Don't—Let him have an empty bot-
tle to suck.
Don't—Give him a Pacifier. Mother's

device to keep him quiet, he will not
need them if properly cared for and
fed.
Don't—Let him suck his thumb. It
spoils the shape of the mouth.
Don't—Let him go for days or even
a day without a drink of water, give
a teaspoonful occasionally.

cold days, especially if there is no
carpet, unless there is a blanket or a
pad under him.
Don't—Let him sit in front of an
open window, with a direct breeze
blowing on him, or allow him to sit in
a draft between open window or door.

Home Hints and Recipes

Air Your Pillows.
Comparatively few housekeepers
seem to understand that feather pil-
lows should be occasionally aired and
the feathers freshened. Every few
weeks the pillow and bolsters from
the various beds in the house should
be laid in the hot sunshine, there to
remain for five or six hours, being
turned once during that time. This
process of sunning dries and fluffs
every feather, making each stand by
itself. Any one who has not tried this
will be surprised on using a pil-
low thus aired to note its increased
softness and elasticity.

Window Pole.
Take an old broom handle. Paint
it to harmonize with your room and
insert at one end a screw hook. Screw
into the upper sash of each window
in the room a ring screw for the
hook on the pole and your window
pole is ready for immediate use. This
will save you from having to run up
and down through the house looking
for a window pole or climbing on
chairs to reach the sashes every time
you wish to raise or lower a window.

Dictates of Fashion.
For formal occasions the large hat
of velvet or moire reigns supreme.
In midwinter one finds afternoon
dresses composed of chiffon and tulle.
Almost any color or any two or
three colors may be made into one
dress.

The butterfly blouse is a fashion-
able combination of white and black,

wear. The blouse is of white satin,
with black tulle sleeves. Across the
front and back of the blouse are large
butterflies of black lace, applied to
the white satin with small jet beads.

Pretty frocks for winter rest resorts
where elaborate toggery is not the
custom, are of dark gray handdowns,
trimmed with gray opussus, a bright
touch of color being given a plaid or
gray silk sash. Gray is a practical
shade for the one formal gown car-
ried in a suitcase, since it is always
dressed enough for any occasion, yet
never offends by being conspicuous.

Colors Restored.
Blue stockings, especially a very
delicately tinted kind, which have
faded can have the color restored by
dipping them into hot water in which
common bluing has been poured and
some lumps of alum dissolved, or they
can, together with white stockings, be
recolored, and so continue to do a
great deal of service. To the alum
add a yeast of bluing, and so resus-
cite the faded pinks and blue and
tan colored hosiery which have col-
lected.

the police reported, had left McPherson

wearing caribou skins with the hair
inside, and no underwear.

ACCOUNTS SHORT; MAN ENDS LIFE IN BAY

F. S. DOW IS SUICIDE AT MARSH-
FIELD—WEIGHT FOUND
ON NECK.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 7.—
The body of F. S. Dow, a suicide, was
taken from the bay yesterday at a
point immediately next to the ocean
dock, his place of business, after 10
men had been dragging for three
hours. A. H. Allen, a Balfour-Guthrie
company auditor, who was here to
canvass Mr. Dow's accounts and
arrange for a change in the system of
collections, was to have met Mr.
Dow at his office at 12 o'clock, but
on arriving found a note which said
he would be found at the bottom of
the bay in front of a pile of brick
which had been arranged on the dock.
Later Mr. Allen said that the cause
for auditing the company's accounts
here was an alleged shortage of be-
tween \$12,000 and \$15,000. The drag-
ging proceeded for three hours in
all parts of the channel, but the man
who snagged the clothing was drag-
ging from the dock.

The suicide left his hat on the dock
to mark the place from which he
jumped. Mr. Dow made his prepara-
tions carefully, leaving, besides the
note to Mr. Allen, one to Mrs. Dow,
another to his partner, W. P. Murphy,
and a fourth addressed to a brother
in California. The contents of none
have been disclosed. A piece of
drain 1/4 eight inches in diameter was
attached to his neck.

The Balfour-Guthrie company ar-
ranged with Mr. Dow to handle its
business in Coos county about two
years ago and the account was a large
one including branches at Coquille
and Myrtle Point.

Mr. Dow leaves \$8000 life insurance
payable to his widow.

BABY IS BORN IN STREET.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Mr. and
Mrs. Herold Herman, No. 78 St.
Mark's place, set out for Bellevue a
few hours after supper. They had
just alighted from the Twenty-eighth
street car, a stone's throw from the
hospital, when the baby arrived.
Dr. Wellington was hastily sum-
moned, and arrived to find that a po-
lice-man had given his overcoat to the
new East Side resident.

LOG KILLS CAMP WORKER.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 7.—
Luther C. Haskell, a resident of Gard-
ner, was killed while slinging rigging
in Camp 4 of the Smith-Powers Log-
ging company, on South Inlet.
Haskell was about 30 years old and
had been at work in the camp only a
few days. His death occurred when a
heavy log rolled over him. It started
without warning.
