Home Hints and Recipes

Flannel Cases Good For Silver.
Frequently odd table silver will come in a pasteboard box from the jeweler, and we open it to find that the piece is swathed only in tissue paper.

If we are careful, and, indeed, if we wish to save ourselves the work of frequent polishing, we must replace the silver in the tissue each time that the silver is used. This is more or less of a trouble, and not nearly so simple a matter as slipping the silver into a flannel case, says the Washington Herald. These cases can be made of two strips of dark flannel. They may be as long as desired, and contain as many compartments as one wishes to make. One of practicable size is two feet long and a foot wide. Divide it into about 2-1/2 inch compartments. This size compartment will accommodate almost any ordinary piece of flat silver. A large case may be made for the larger flat silver.

To make the case, cut two strips of the flannel, one two feet by 12 inches and the other two feet by 11 inches. Either hem the top 24 inch edges of these two pieces or buttonhole them in silk that matches the flannel in color. Join the two pieces together by stitched or buttonhole seams on the lower 22-inch edge and the two 12-inch sides. Run row of machine stitching up and down the case (each row will be 11 inches in length) to form the compartments. Hand sewing will not be sufficiently strong. The half inch difference in the strips forming the case appears at the top. One edge being a half inch below the other enables one to more readily get at the silver when it is placed in the compartment. At the center of one 12-inch end place a 2 1/2 inch narrow ribbon or tape to tie about the case when it is rolled up, to keep it from unfastening and allowing the silver to slip out.

A dark garnet flannel or cotton flannel is very good made for such cases. This is the flannel commonly used by jewelers for the purpose.

Try Potatoes.
When baking griddle cakes, instead of using lard on griddle rub it with a

raw potato. The cakes are just as brown and the kitchen is not filled with odor of burning fat.—Los Angeles Express.

The Care of Children

Some weeks ago the United States government acquired, by official appointment, the services of three mothers. The appointment marked an innovation in governmental tactics in that the mothers were selected because of their motherhood, were given office in recognition of their knowledge of the subjects and their success in its administration. The fact is significant. It marks unmistakably the acceptance of motherhood as a profession. For the first time in history Uncle Sam has said to the mothers of the country: "You are doing something worth while. Let your representatives help us," although the official announcement states simply: Mrs. Frederick C. Schoff, Mrs. Helen Birney, Mrs. Laura Johns, of the National Congress of Mothers, appointed special collaborators in the Bureau of Education for duty in the department of Home Education.

PARCEL POST ORDER EXPANDS ITS SCOPE

Crated Articles Outside Mail Sacks Will be Accepted Hereafter.

To insure further the safe delivery of articles sent by parcel post and to educate senders in packing goods which might injure the mails, instructions have been received by Postmaster J. T. Brown from the department at Washington, D. C. The new order regulates the shipping of butter, eggs, fruits, vegetables, dressed poultry and other articles weighing over 50 pounds, making it possible to ship them in the first and second zones in boxes and crates to be carried outside of mail bags.

All liquids sent through the mails must be carefully packed either in boxes holding excelsior, sawdust or other absorbent material. The stoppers or corks must be put in so that there will be no danger of loosening. Unloaded pistols or guns may be sent through the mails, but the Postmaster at the mailing office must examine them and determine whether they are safe. Parcels containing perishable articles shall be marked "Perishable." Articles likely to perish before the time allowed for delivery at their destination shall not be accepted.

Manufacturers or dealers intending to transmit articles in considerable quantities should submit to the Postmaster at the mailing office for approval a specimen parcel showing the manner of packing.

Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments or tools shall be capped or incased so that they can not cut through their covering. Blades shall be bound so that they will remain firmly attached to each other or within their handles or sockets. Plovers, shares, stove castings, pieces of machinery, etc., shall have all points, edges and corners thoroughly protected with excelsior or similar material and be wrapped in burp, cloth or tough paper, or be properly boxed to prevent damage to mail or equipment, when intended for other than local delivery.

Butter, lard and perishable articles such as fish, fresh meats, dressed fowls, vegetables, fruits, berries and articles of a similar nature which decay quickly, when so packed or wrapped as to prevent damage to other mail matter, shall be accepted for local delivery either at the office of mailing or any rural route starting therefrom. When incased in an inner cover and a strong outer cover of wood, metal, heavy corrugated pasteboard, or other suitable material, and wrapped so that nothing can escape from the packages they will be accepted for mailing to all offices to which in the ordinary course of mail they can be sent without spoiling.

Butter, dressed fowls, vegetables, fruits and other perishable articles in parcels weighing more than 20 pounds shall be accepted for mailing to offices in the first and second zones when suitably wrapped or incased and packed in crates, boxes or other suitable containers having tight bottoms to prevent the escape of anything from the package and so constructed as properly to protect the contents. All such parcels to be transported outside of mail bags.

Vegetables and fruits which do not decay quickly will be accepted for mailing to any zone if packed so as to prevent damage to other mail matter. Eggs shall be accepted for local delivery when so packed in a basket or other container as to prevent damage to other mail matter.

Eggs shall be accepted for mailing regardless of distance when each egg is wrapped separately and surrounded with excelsior, cotton or other suitable material and packed in a strong container made of double-faced corrugated pasteboard, metal, wood or other suitable material and wrapped so that nothing can escape from the package. All such parcels shall be labeled "eggs."

Eggs in parcels weighing more than 20 pounds shall be accepted for mailing to offices in the first and second zones when packed in crates, boxes, buckets or other containers having tight bottoms to prevent the escape of anything from the package and so constructed as properly to protect the contents. Such packages to be marked "Eggs—This side up," and to be transported outside of mail bags.

REBEL LEADER HAS WONDERFUL CONTROL OVER HIS SOLDIERS

INTIMATE STUDY OF VILLA EXPLAINS HIS INFLUENCE WITH MEXICANS.

His Personality Draws all Classes to Him to Fight for His Cause—While Huerta is Forcing Youths Into Battle Villa Leads Them Through the Power of His Personality.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., March 28.—Noontime of a cold raw day, in the mountains; a score of Mexicans sitting around a campfire, their guns and cartridge belts beside them; an American miner rides up to the fire. "Welcome, señor," says the captain. The Mexicans feed the newcomer. The time comes for him to go. He starts off over the mesa on his horse, after hearty goodbyes. "Wait, señor, one minute," shouts the captain. The American obeys; the captain comes running up to him. "When you go to Chihuahua don't tell Villa that you saw us sitting around the campfire at noontime. You see he sent us out to find the bandit Castillo. He would not like to know that we were resting at noontime. We were only talking over what we had better do to find that diablo Castillo. But don't tell Villa, huh?"

This is only one of the hundred incidents that show the tremendous power that Villa exerts over his soldiers. All of Villa's soldiers are volunteers. While Huerta, in the Mexican capital, is seizing farmer boys in the market places and dragging fathers from their families at midnight to get soldiers, Villa is getting them in this fashion:

"We wish to join your army," say two Mexicans, approaching the rebel leader. "Did you ever fight before?" snaps Villa, half closing his dull, gun-metal colored eyes. "No, señor." "Why do you wish to join?" "For our country," answered the peons. "Well, I'll take you," says Villa. And then he snaps out: "But if I ever see you run or quit fighting I'll kill you myself. Understand?" "Si, señor," declare the delighted peons.

Villa's looting in a store in Manaca was the height of orderly pillage. He had given orders that any man who looted would be shot, and five men were killed that day. But he learned that a Spaniard, owner of the largest store in town, had been working against the rebels. The next day Villa himself went to the store and took possession. Squads of twenty men were permitted to enter the store at a time. "Hand down those hats,"

said Villa, pointing to a supply of broad-brimmed Stetsons. The clerks brought down a hundred or more hats. "Come here, Jose," said Villa to a soldier. "Take off your hat." Then Villa slammed a new Stetson onto the head of the happy soldier, and twisted it about critically. "Doesn't fit you huh? Here try this one," slamming on another sized hat. All day long and all the next day Villa himself worked fitting coats, trousers, shoes, shirts and all the things his men needed. "This isn't looting," he explained. "It's confiscation of warfare." But there was another side to it. Villa met half a dozen of his men, later, all dressed up. "Got everything you want?" Villa asked them. "Got shoes, clothes, money, hats, guns, ammunition, everything you want?" "Si, si, señor, we are very happy and content." "Very well, then," snapped Villa, with a dreadful look in his face and with an oath. "Now I've taken care of you, but if you don't take care of me when it comes time to fight I'll kill you with my own gun."

"Why don't you quit?" a friend asked Villa, one time early in the game, at Juarez, when things looked dark for his side. Villa pointed across the Rio Grande to El Paso. "When I see El Paso, with its fine buildings and its clean homes and its clean, well clothed, gentle children and women, and then look at Juarez, with its rotten schools, its muddy streets, its rotten homes and its poor ragged children and women, it makes me mad. Our women and children have as good a right to fine things as the women and children of the United States have and it's the fault of Mexican men that they haven't got them. We've let a few people get everything, and we've got to get it back again."

There's one American, somewhere in the southwest country that Villa would like to find. "I was stranded once," says Villa, "in Santa Fe, Texas. There was a prison on my head in Mexico and I didn't have a cent. I couldn't get a job either. I got to talking with an American fellow on the street and he took me to a restaurant and bought me a ten dollar meal ticket. That was the last I ever saw of him, but I'll do favors for 10,000 Americans just to pay him back." But there's very little of the soft side to Villa. One of his best friends, an acquaintance of his boyhood, betrayed him. Villa sentenced him to death. The man's mother and sister came to Villa; he had known them from his childhood. "You had a mother and sisters," they pleaded. "Don't kill Manuel. I have no father no mother, no sisters, no brothers no friends, no money," said Villa, "when the welfare of my country is at stake." And that night Manuel died.

Villa doesn't drink or smoke. It's an old story that he first began life as a bandit, when a rural, a mounted policeman, outraged his sister, and was killed by Villa, who had to flee.
