SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE ASKED TO HELP WORK

WILL MAKE EFFORT TO TAKE PART IN GOOD ROADS DAY APRIL 25.

SALEM, Ore., April 1.—In connection with the movement to observe April 25 as good roads day throughout Oregon, State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill is sending out letters calling upon all the county superintendents to use their best efforts to get the school children in every district to drag the main road between school houses on that day.

This is but one feature of a program suggested by Superintendent Churchill to increase interest in good roads and turn it to practical use. Mr. Churchill is one of three appointed by the Portland Ad club as a committee to assist in perfecting an organization that would make good roads day productive of the best results. The other two members are Superintendent L. R. Alderman and O. M. Plummer of Portland.

"Feeling assured of your cooperation," says Superintendent Churchill in his letter to county superintendents, "I am suggesting that through the schools we begin now to prepare to do our part in observing the day by interesting the teachers and the children. I have roughly outlined the following, which I hope will be suggestive in bringing about the desired results."

"Create proper sentiment through newspapers. Send letters to teachers requesting cooperation. Send letter to city superintendents urging cooperation. Have the children interest their parents in the movement. Arrange for proper literature to be distributed to teachers and pupils. Emphasize importance of good roads day through the language lessons. Use drag and graders on roads April 25."

FOREST BOUNDARIES IN OREGON ARE READJUSTED.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—An executive order just promulgated has resulted in an elimination of lands from national forest areas in Oregon. This readjustment of boundaries has resulted in a total reduction of gross area on the Paulina and Deschutes national forests of about 400,000 acres. The lands eliminated are located in the east-central part of the state, a considerable portion being on public lands of low fertility and little value for present or future forest purposes. A portion in already comprises a large percentage of private lands, and includes two towns. These eliminations are a part of the work of boundary examinations initiated five or six years ago, which is resulting in fixing, after careful survey the definite boundaries of those lands which should remain permanently in forests.

The present eliminations are made because the land is not required for forest purposes or for the protection of watersheds. The lands have considerable grazing value, but only a small portion are suitable for agriculture under present conditions.

California's Quota to World Computed by Health Officer.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 1.—California adds one baby every 12 minutes to the population of the world, according to the figures of Statistician Leslie, of the state board of health. In 1913 there were 43,852 births recorded, a rate of 14.4 per 1000 population.

ALASKAN COAL DELIVERED.

Freighter of 900 Tons for Naval Test Says Product Is Good. CORDOVA, Alaska, April 1.—Jack

Dalton and his men, who freighted 900 tons of coal from the Mantanuska coal field to tidewater at Knik-on-Crook Inlet for tests by the navy to determine its steaming qualities, arrived at Chitina, having completed their work in the coal fields.

Dalton says the coal is clean and of good quality. The coal was taken out under the direction of the United States Bureau of Mines.

FAIR SLAYER NOT FAVORED.

Madame Caillaux Treated According to Law, Says Officials. PARIS, April 1.—Madame Caillaux has not received any favors, except

such as are permitted by the French prison act, according to a note made public by the bureau of prisons of the department of justice. Madame Caillaux is awaiting trial for shooting Gaston Calmette dead.

Henri Coucard, the investigating magistrate, examined Paul Bourget, the academician, who was with M. Calmette when Mme. Caillaux's card was presented to him.

GEORGE W. HILL IS DEAD.

Men Long Official in Agricultural Department Succumbs. WASHINGTON, April 1.—George W. Hill, for many years a prominent official of the agricultural department, died after a protracted illness at Franklin, Va.

Mr. Hill developed the plan of widespread circulation of agricultural literature to farmers, agricultural journals and the press generally. His knowledge of departmental affairs led Colonel Roosevelt, when civil service commissioner, to urge Mr. Hill's selection for that board. He was born in England.

"COTTON BELT" DECLARES.

One Half of One Per Cent Quarterly Dividend Is Ordered.

NEW YORK, April 1.—Directors of the St. Louis Southwestern railroad (the Cotton Belt route) declared a quarterly dividend of one-half of 1 per cent on the preferred stock. This reduced the preferred annual dividend rate from 4 to 2 per cent.

"Having in mind the declining earnings for the current year and the somewhat unsatisfactory condition of general business," says a statement just issued, "the directors feel that the above rate is all that is justified. The company has at the present time no floating debt and its physical and financial condition is excellent and the directors feel it is their duty to maintain the present high standard

of the property for which they are responsible."

WHITE PEOPLE GET LANDS.

Indians Retain Little of Irrigated Area of Yakima Reserve. NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., April 1.—Of the 37,000 acres which will be irrigated and under cultivation in the Yakima Indian reservation, this season, 30,000 acres are in the hands of white persons, according to the estimate of L. M. Holt, superintendent of irrigation, United States Indian department, who says the additional area irrigated this year will be 5000 acres.

Only one-sixteenth of the money annually paid for maintenance of irrigation on the reservation comes from the Indians, being paid through the Indian agent at Fort Simcoe. Of the sagebrush land which will be watered for the first time this spring, about 4000 acres has been leased since last season.

HUGE GUN FIRED ON DREADNAUGHT

Italian Battleship Julius Caesar Fires 13 13-Inch Guns Simultaneously Without Damaging Herself Badly.

SPEZIA, April 1.—At artillery trials of the new dreadnaught Julius Caesar all her thirteen guns of 13-inch caliber, in triple turrets, were fired simultaneously with excellent results. It is said that such a severe trial is unprecedented. It was tried by an Austrian dreadnaught and she was seriously damaged when the guns were fired.

FLYTRAP MODELS READY.

Communities With Fly Campaigns Can Get Specimens From U. S. UNIVERSITY OF OREGON. Eugene, April 1.—Communities in Oregon that are organizing spring anti-

fly campaigns can now secure a model of the most effective flytrap yet devised by writing to the Extension Division of the University of Oregon. This is the flytrap employed by Dr. Clifton F. Hodge in the fly campaigns he supervises, and, while in anti-fly literature he gives full directions for constructing the trap, possession of a model will make construction easier. The trap suggested for general outdoor or stable use is about three feet in height. Light lumber, wire screen and nails are the only materials used, and the trap is inexpensive.

HOBBS KILLS ONE AND SELF.

Baggageman Slain and Railroad Detective Seriously Wounded. AKRON, Ohio, April 1.—Jesse Armstrong, a baggageman on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, died and Frank Moran, a detective of the road was seriously wounded in a gun battle with an unidentified man. The man committed suicide.

The double killing took place at the Howard-street station when the man, who was roughly dressed, jumped off a freight train. Detective Moran sought to arrest him.

LANDSLIDES SCARE ITALY.

Villages Near Venice Menaced and Hundreds Flee.

VENICE, Italy, April 1.—A great landslide threatens the villages of Clausetto and Vitodasio, in the Province of Udine. Parts of the villages, which are inhabited by about 3000 persons each, have already been evacuated in the fear of more extensive slides caused by the overflowing of the rivers.

Swearing May Be Barred. OREGON CITY, Ore., April 1.—"Swearing is becoming altogether too popular in Oregon City, and I believe that it will probably be necessary for Oregon City officials to en-

force the ordinance which prohibits the using of profane language in public places," said Mayor Jones. "I believe it would be better to direct some of the energy toward enforcing this law rather than the ordinance which prohibits the use of tobacco by minors."

THE NATION'S NINE CAPITALS.

(Paducah News-Democrat.) The New York American is authoritative for the statement that the United States has had nine different capitals and that four different times the national capital was located at Philadelphia. It says:

"The capital of the United States has been located at different times at the following places: At Philadelphia from Sept. 5 to 1774; at Decatur, 1774; at Baltimore, Dec. 20, 1776 to March, 1777; Philadelphia, March 4, 1777, to September, 26, 1777; York, Pa., Sept. 26, 1777, to July, 1778; Philadelphia, July 2, 1778, to June 30, 1783; Princeton, N. J., June 30, 1783, to November 20, 1783; Annapolis, Md., Nov. 20, 1783, to Nov. 30, 1784; Trenton, N. J., from November, 1784, to January, 1785; New York, Jan. 11, 1785 to 1790.

"Then the seat of government was removed to Philadelphia, where it remained until 1800, since which time it has been at Washington."

Girls Taught Care of Babies. CLEVELAND, O., April 1.—Students of twenty three domestic science school centers here today took up the study of infant hygiene as part of the city's summer campaign against infant mortality.

Nurses from the municipal infant dispensary are aiding domestic science instructors in teaching eighth grade girls the sewing of sanitary outfits for needy babies; washing, dressing and feeding babies and the general care of infants. The subject today becomes a regular part of the school course for the first time.
