The Care of Children

"Teething and Care of Teeth." The twelfth lecture in the course on Infant Science was delivered recently by Dr. William Cavanaugh, his subject being "Teething and Care of the Teeth." A brief synopsis of his talk follows:

"Modern dentistry concerns itself more with the prevention of deformity and decay than it does with repair. As the first teeth are formed long before the child is born, nothing can be done to improve their quality after birth. It is of the most importance that they be kept in the best condition for reasons appearing below. In the first place the temporary teeth are more important than the permanent set because they functionate during the building-up period of the child's life. The cereals contain most of the tooth forming salts, so these should be taken freely during the early months of pregnancy. The outer portion of the wheat, which is eliminated in the preparation of white flour, is the richest in these salts, so whole wheat bread should be used.

"All the defects in the temporary teeth are magnified when the permanent teeth erupt. Thus, parents must see to it that they are preserved and kept straight, otherwise the second teeth will come crooked and out of place, and be nearly useless. Sucking the thumb, and adenoids cause the upper front teeth to project beyond the lower ones, causing loss of function and an ugly deformity. Again it is the use of soft food that causes a poor development of the teeth. These things, decay, lack of exercise, mouth breathing, adenoids and thumb sucking together cause 90 per cent of irregularity in the teeth. Fehle diseases of childhood, like measles

and scarlet fever, stop the growth of the enamel over the permanent teeth, so that sometimes little or no enamel appears on the teeth when they erupt. "Each temporary tooth reserves a space for a permanent tooth, so if one of the baby teeth are pulled or allowed to decay before five years of age no room will be left for the new tooth, and it will have to crowd in crookedly, and perhaps cause all of the new teeth to be out of place. As soon as the teeth appear they must be cared for. The first teeth should be cleansed with milk of magnesia applied on a soft cloth wrapped about the finger. Silk floss should always be used between the teeth, for it is here that the toothbrush does not reach and it is here that decay usually starts. As early as possible the child should be taught to use the brush and floss regularly. The most important time is after the last meal of the day. After rinsing out with water, it helps to use the milk of magnesia as a final wash. After the child is 20 months old take it to a dentist every six months. Neither the dentist alone or the mother alone can preserve a child's teeth, but the cooperation of both will assure the child a fine set of permanent teeth—the foundation stones of a good digestion.—Portland Journal.

Home Hints and Recipes

Coal Saved by Oven Gauge.
A word about an oven indicator which will save tons of coal or quantities of gas, to say nothing of hours of anxiety. This is a clocklike apparatus that fits into the oven door. The spring is expanded or loosened by the heat, and in turn moves the hands on the face. The face looks like that of a clock, and the moment the hands move the housewife can tell at a glance whether the oven is too hot or too cold, thus doing away with the necessity of opening the oven door to obtain this information, and thereby cooling the oven. It also warns of too great heat, which means a waste of coal.

And right here it might be well to say a word about having the fire too hot. Many cooks say if the oven is too hot put in a pan of cold water. Why build an enormous fire and then have to protect the cakes and pies with paper to prevent burning? This hardly ever happens with an indicator, for it warns the cook before the stove gets too hot, and she can adjust the draft. Such an attachment is inexpensive at first cost, and in the end saves a great deal of coal.—Farm and Fireside.

Baked Calf Liver.

One calf's liver washed and dried, slashed and scored inside. Have bread dressing ready, well seasoned with onions. Stuff the liver with this and tie with cord, skewer to liver with toothpicks several pieces of bacon, put a little hot water in the bag and bake at least one hour in a hot oven. Send to table hot with a parsley garnish.—Dallas News.

Lamp Chimneys.

Have you ever tried drying lamp chimneys on a hot radiator or on the back of the stove? It works like a charm. Wash and rinse chimneys in hot water. Stand on the radiator on a dry cloth, or in a wire wish-rainer on the stove. The glass will be clean, dry and bright.—Modern Priscilla.

Worth Knowing.

Ink stains on handkerchiefs, etc., may often be soaked out in milk, but the sooner they are dealt with the better.

Cream soup: A spoonful of whipped cream is a tasty addition to any cream soup. Add it to the top of the soup just before serving.

For creaming butter or butter and sugar, a perforated spoon will be found more convenient than a fork or the hand.

When chopping suet, try sprinkling the knife with a little ground rice or cornstarch and you will have no trouble.

A baker says that a cupful of liquid yeast is equivalent to half a compressed yeast cake or whole dry yeast cake.

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REPEAL RESOLUTION PASSES IN THE HOUSE BY MAJORITY OF 86

All Attempts to Stem the Tide of Administration Success Are Futile—Measure Will Now Go to the Senate Where the Fight Will Be Renewed—220 Democrats Stand by Wilson When the Final Vote Is Taken Late Yesterday.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The house of representatives, after one of the most spectacular legislative struggles in the history of the nation, voted last night to repeal the provision of the Panama canal act exempting American vessels from the payment of tolls. The vote on the repeal was 247 to 161, a majority of 86 votes in support of the personal plea of President Wilson.

The bill goes to the senate, where the fight will be renewed with all of the vigor and determination that attended it in the lower house.

On the final vote 220 democrats in the house stood by the president. Twenty-five republicans and two progressives also voted to sustain the president.

Fifty-two democrats followed Speaker Clark and Leader Underwood to defeat.

Nothing, it seemed, could stem the tide of administration success.

President Wilson was at dinner when the result of the vote was announced. He was gratified, but made no comment.

STATE UNIVERSITY SITE IS MAPPED FOR FUTURE

New \$100,000 Building to be Finished Next February, First Under Block Plan.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 1.—Expansion needs for very many years will be provided for in the campus block plan about to be adopted by the Board of Regents of the State University. Whatever buildings are erected hereafter will go up in that conformity and harmony that characterize a number of the large state universities.

First of the new structures under

this block plan will be the \$100,000 administration and classroom building. Bids for its construction will be called in about two months and it is to be ready for classes in February, 1915. The crowded conditions that have prevailed during the recent years at Oregon, however, will be remedied before the Freshman class enters next September by additions and repairs to four other buildings, for which \$75,000 has been provided.

The new administration and classroom building will give more classroom facilities in Villard Hall, the present administration building; and will free Deady Hall for exclusively science uses. The development of a strong pre-medical course at the State University, and the addition of much law school work at Eugene, together with the fast-growing number of first-year students, nearly 300 of whom have come during this college year, makes more room this year imperative.

Scout Doyle Opens Ball School. PORTSMOUTH, O., April 1.—A free baseball school was opened here by "Scout" Billy Doyle, of the Cleveland Naps. Any youngster with semi-pro or college experience who is anxious to get up in the baseball world will be taken as a pupil. "It's a business proposition," said Doyle. "I'm tutoring the youngsters and then placing them with some minor league club." Doyle plans to keep a string

on all such youngsters for the Cleveland club. It is the Naps who will profit in the long run and incidentally Doyle will get credit and cash for producing likely looking youngsters.
