The Care of Children

The 1914 Better Babies contest season started off with a splendid scientific contest at Battle Creek, Michigan, held in connection with the Race Betterment Conference, attended by eminent men and women from all over the country. Dr. J. H. Kellogg threw open the Sanitarium annex which was fitted up like a modern hospital with sanitary equipment and trained nurses in attendance. The examinations were conducted by physicians connected with the Sanitarium, local physicians, and Dr. Lydia A. De Vilbiss, Medical Director of the Better Babies Bureau of the Woman's Home Companion. The Better Babies Standard Score-Card was used, and the table of weights and measures was extended to include school children. Preliminary examinations were conducted for six weeks in advance, and the finals were held during the conference, January 9th to 21st. Race Conference gold medals were awarded to the best girl and best boy, and Better Babies medals in bronze, together with certificates of award, were presented to prize-winners by the Woman's Home Companion. The Pathe Weekly news service made moving pictures of the contest.

We should not worry too much about the teeth coming along too soon. The two lower central teeth come first at six or eight months; the four upper central teeth two months later; within the next two months the two other lower teeth appear on either side of their fellows. At fourteen to sixteen months come the four double teeth, and at a year and a half the eye and stomach teeth come along to fill in the space that intervenes. We may not expect the four other double teeth until two and a half years, when our baby has all the temporary masticators, twenty in number.

Any marked delay or great irregularity of teething may be caused by errors in diet and nutritional abnormalities. Extreme delay in teething should be looked into, as rickets and other nutritional diseases are particularly apt to cause it.

Home Hints and Recipes

Articles Made of Odd Ends of Lace.

Any woman who is fortunate enough to have some pieces of hand-crocheted lace or insertion three to five inches in width, from the simplest to the most elaborate designs, can use them to great advantage for decorative purposes, says the Newark News. If the lace is white it can be tinted a pale ecru by putting it through a little saffron infusion. This gives the lace a beautiful antique appearance. If the lace is made with filet design, it will look all the more artistic.

Very handsome candle shades may be made by stretching strips of this lace around the frame that has been covered with a colored silk. This ecru lace is particularly effective over a scarlet, royal blue or violet foundation.

For a bureau scarf the strips of lace may be used at the ends or three or four inches from the ends. An ecru linen of good quality is chosen. If the monogram is done in a contrasting color it adds to the whole.

Various small articles can be made from lace of this kind. Satin boxes for the toilet table are rendered more durable and artistic by a mounting of the crocheted lace, for the lace may be taken off and washed when soiled.

GREATEST SHIP-O-WAR OFF FOR GUANTANAMO

Rogers, the super-dreadnaught New York, the largest and most formidable fighting vessel afloat, today is sailing to the Guantanamo, Cuba, testing grounds, where she will go through her paces before becoming the flagship of the great Atlantic fleet. still uncompleted, has ten fourteen-inch guns, the largest on any battleship in the world and capable of hurling seven tons of explosives encased in steel a distance of fourteen miles once every minute. The monster guns are in five turrets, two forward and three aft, the turrets being so arranged that a full broadside can be fired from either side of the vessel. The secondary armament consists of twenty-one five-inch guns. Alike in other details, both the New York and Texas will each have two submerged torpedo tubes forward. Both are 573 feet long, 95 1-2 feet beam and have normal draughts of 28.6 feet. Each has a displacement of 28,400 tons when loaded and can make 21 knots an hour. The New York, built at a government yard, was finished four months ahead of the Texas, built at a private shipyard, officials of which say the Texas will be completed in four months. Besides Captain Rogers, her officers will be Commander George Day, executive lieutenant, Commander W. B. Tardy of the Brooklyn navy yard, engineer officer and Lieutenant John H. Newton, aide to the commander of the navy yard.
