## WEYERHAEUSER ESTATE IN OREGON ESCAPES FROM TAX

TIMBER VALUED AT \$180,000 IS IN THE HANDS OF A CORPORATION.

SALEM, Ore., April 7.—The estate of the late Frederick Weyerhaeuser in Oregon will avoid paying the inheritance tax because the holdings are held by a corporation instead of being the personal property of Weyerhaeuser. State Forester Elliott estimated the Weyerhaeuser timber holdings in Oregon approximated four hundred and fifty thousand acres worth eighteen million dollars. The inheritance tax on this valuation would amount to \$180,000.

ANTI-WINE ORDER

VILLA ORDERS 600  
SPANIARDS TO QUIT

LITTLE DELAY IS CAUSED THROUGH LACK OF SUFFICIENT CARE.

JUAREZ, April 7.—Villa was delayed in enforcing the expulsion of the 600 Spanish residents of Torreón by the crowded condition of the railroad between there and Chihuahua City. As soon as he could get the rolling stock, it was said, the entire Spanish population will be shipped northward.

Although it was admitted Villa had issued an expulsion order against the Spaniards without consulting Carranza, it is believed at constitutional headquarters that the action would be approved by his superior. Villa planned to provide passenger coaches for the women and children, but considered box cars good enough for the men.

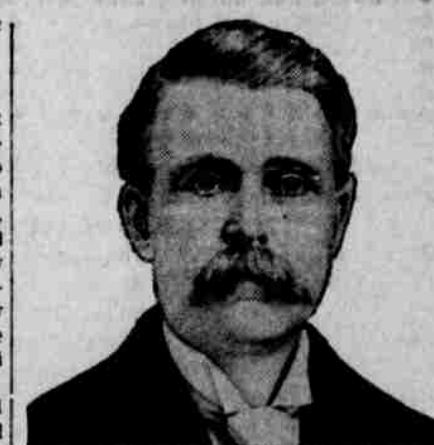
