CRITICISM IS FOR CRITICS.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 13.—"Literary criticism in American book reviews is lacking in good taste and intellectual candor," declared Bliss Perry, of Harvard, in the first of his Bromley lectures on "Journalism" at Yale.

"Criticism is influenced by the league between the publisher and the critic to obtain the best commercial results from the sale of the books. Most criticisms are done by ill-paid and untrained journalists."

"The courts insist on labels for food," he said. "There is no pure food law for books. The indiscriminate advertising will ultimately defeat itself."

"AEROPLANE WATCH" IS THE INVENTION OF JEWELER

OAKLAND, Cal., April 13.—An Oakland jeweler has invented an "aeroplane watch" that is the first of its kind. It is guaranteed to stand any kind of a fall and not be affected by heat, cold, altitude or shocks.

The inventor placed an ordinary railroad watch in a heavy case and substituted for the old balance wheel a larger one, taken from a chronometer, with compensation springs and a Breguet hairspring. The watch, the inventor declares, can be dropped from a height of 1000 feet without interfering as much as a tenth of a second with its time keeping qualities.

The Pendleton Hotel Company calls for bids for leasing the Hotel Pendleton, in Pendleton, Oregon.

NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

CANADA DOES NOT WANT FREE WHEAT

REJECTION SETTLES BUGABOO THAT BOTHERED SOME GROWERS.

No Danger From Northern Wheat Because It Already Competes in Foreign Market With American Grain.

Local wheat raisers will be interested in the fact Canada has rejected the proposition of free trade in grain with the United States, something the Canadians could secure if they wished under the terms of the new tariff law of this country.

In the Sunday Journal H. H. Cohen, commercial editor, had a story upon this subject and the following is an extract from the same:

"The further rejection recently by Canada of free trade with the United States in grain, should eliminate all alarm from those producers of the Pacific northwest who were panicky regarding the future of the cereal industry."

"Not that there was the slightest danger of any loss to Pacific northwest producers as a result of free trade in grain with Canada, but this was a bugaboo that was constantly before the eyes of the timid ones."

"Not for a moment had they figured that it was quite out of the probable that more than a very limited amount of Canadian grain, and especially wheat, would ever be marketed in this country. Free trade in grain meant to them that they were going to suffer the entire loss of their home market to the alien product."

"The fact that Canadian grain as well as the American growth is practically at all times on a world's marketing basis, and that Canadian growers were even at this time competing with the Americans for the wheat and oats and barley trade of the world, seems to have been entirely forgotten in the scare."

90 Cars of Cattle.—The first trainload of the 3000 head of cattle sold by William Pollman and Thomas Mack to C. L. Anceny and W. W. Childs of Montana were shipped out yesterday to Anceny, Mont., 16 miles from Bozeman in the Gallatin valley.

There were 30 carloads of the train which went to Wallula over the O.-W. R. & N. company line and from there on to Anceny on the Northern Pacific. Over the same route a second trainload also of 30 cars, will be shipped Tuesday and the third shipment of 30 cars will go forward on the same lines Thursday. The shipment of cattle is the largest ever made from Baker county.

Season Very Favorable.—J. N. Burgess, manager of the Cunningham Sheep & Land Co., who has been in town today says he has never seen more favorable conditions on the range at this time. The rains of the last week have been very beneficial from every standpoint. The lambing season is now about finished on the Cunningham company ranch and the increase was good. The company had 7500 lambing ewes.

Fruit Never Looked Better.—That the prospects for a good fruit crop in the Milton-Freewater belt have never been better in all the time he has lived in that section is the statement of Henry Groth, prominent fruit raiser of Freewater who is in Pendleton today. He states that they have had no frosts as yet and that conditions have been made to order.

Looking at Irrigated Lands.—J. H. Landers, a brother of Supt. J. S. Landers of the local public schools, arrived Saturday with his wife and three children from Hillsboro, Illinois, and is looking for a location in Oregon. He will probably remain here a month to look over the opportunities in the irrigated districts after which he will take a look at southern Oregon.

Trading is Dull.—Though the sheep market is strong trading in stock sheep is said to be dull at the present time. According to reports buyers are not quite willing to come up to the prices expected by the growers. The price of \$3.50 is being offered for yearling ewes after shearing. Growers say they should get \$2.75 or \$4.

A \$50,000 Transaction.—Warren W. Raymond has sold 480 acres of land lying about five miles northwest of Athena for \$50,000. Asy J. Warner purchased a quarter section for \$15,000 and David F. Sander purchased two quarters for \$35,000. The deeds for the transactions were recorded today.

95 Per Cent Increase.—Howard Stephens, of the firm of Boylen & Stephens sheepmen says they are having a 95 per cent increase in their lambing camp, counting in the dry ewes. The firm has winter quarters at Pine City. They have a lambing band of 3500.

84 Cents for Wheat.—J. T. Lleualen, Adams wheatraiser who recently sold his wheat crop to E. W. McComas has completed the delivery of the wheat at Adams. He sold 10,000 sacks at a price of 84 cents f. o. b. Adams.
