Not in vain did the Pendleton bowling team enter the northwest tournament last week in Portland. Among a large field of contestants from many cities, Pendleton took third honors in the singles bowling championship contest and third also in the doubles.

Nick Noel was the man to roll the third highest score and he and Fred McMonies composed the team that won third in the doubles. Hermann of Vancouver, won the singles with a score of 677, Greese of Salem was second with 647 and Noel was third with 627. Leap and Christian of Portland won the doubles with a score of 1213 pins, Bayland and Kincain were second with 1153 and Noel and McMonies third with 1138.
