Home Hints and Recipes

Books of Needles.

The Care of Children

Most assuredly children should be taught to leave things alone, but one should never put an object out of sight or reach, for by so doing one intimates to a child the possibility of his not being strong enough to resist temptation. A child's nature is instinctively broad—one should not hedge and shrivel it by suggesting limitations.

He should not only be told that there are many things which he must not touch, but when old enough to reason, he should be made to realize the joyous truth that he is captain of himself—his will, his arms, his feet are his to control.

If a mother says "No," she should hold to it, even if in the conquest she develops several cases of "nerves," for it is not alone the peace and order of the home which is at stake, but the steadfastness of the child himself.

Many of us do not mean to make it more difficult for our children to mind, but we surely do, if we do not begin at the beginning and teach them the principles of self-control and consideration.

We surely do if we fill all our windows (avenues through which come so much of health and inspiration) with plants or other obstructions—if we sacrifice comfort for artistic effect, if we give the "pretty-pretty" to the baby just because he wants it, thinking to correct him when older or, worse still, if we put the much desired out of reach for the sake of a case of "nerves."

CIGARETTE LAW IS FOUGHT.

Illinois Tobacco Dealers Threaten to Test Prohibition Ordinance.

ROCKFORD, Ill., April 14.—The city council has rejected an ordinance licensing the sale of cigarettes by a 10-to-5 vote. Tobacco dealers threaten to test the constitutionality of the ordinance enforced for the last six years barring the sale of cigarettes and have obtained continuances of several charges of illegal sales pending action by the council.

RIVER BOOSTERS URGE IMMEDIATE OPENING

COMPLETION OF PENDING IMPROVEMENTS DEMANDED BY CONVENTION.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 14.—Immediate completion of pending improvements at the mouth of the Columbia river and an early survey of the tributaries above Celilo with a view toward their ultimate canalization, are two of the big development projects that the fifth annual convention of the Columbia-Snake river Waterways Association, which opened at the Commercial Club yesterday morning, is considering.

Plans for development of the Upper Columbia and the Snake river on a basis that not only will make those streams navigable, but will provide water and power for reclamation purposes, were earnestly discussed in the afternoon and at night.

"Make the Columbia navigable to the Canadian line and open the Snake to Lewiston," were the demands emphatically expressed by a score of visitors from eastern Washington and northern Idaho.

Discussions and formal addresses all were based on the theory that eventually the great Columbia river drainage system will be supplied with water transportation through the use of these streams together with canals or other artificial channels. The natural barriers, such as rapids and waterfalls, must be overcome, it was pointed out.

Speaker after speaker set it forth as the plain duty of the convention to devise means to overcome these barriers. Active co-operation of every interest from the mouth of the Columbia to the international boundary was demanded. Individual efforts of the several communities are useless, it was asserted.
