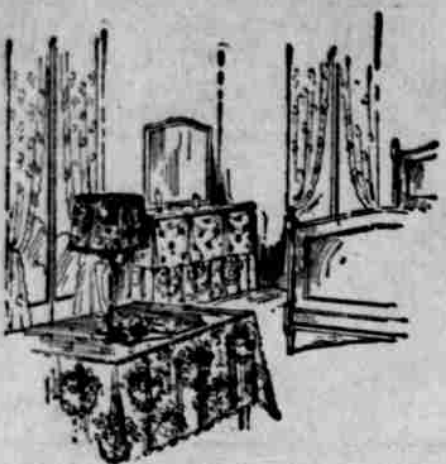

### MILITARY RULE MAY BE ENFORCED AT EL PASO

#### MANY MEXICANS LIVE THERE— CITY IN HIGH STATE OF EXCITEMENT.

EL PASO, April 20.—Troops at Fort Bliss are under orders to come into this city and place it under martial law the moment there is an appearance of concerted disorder.

These instructions were issued by the war department when the Tampico incident first assumed a grave aspect, but became known only yesterday. There is a large Mexican population here and the orders to the troops at the fort, five miles from the city, were issued because of the possibility that partisans might start burning buildings or rioting.

The city, however, was quiet last night, although every one was excited over the possibility of war. Extra editions of the local papers were sold as fast as they could be printed, women and children being among the eager readers of the smallest scraps of information from Washington. The refugee colonies here and the presence of Americans and Europeans with business interests in Mexico gave new a vital interest.

There are more than 2000 Infantry, cavalry and artillery at the post in readiness to descend on the city at a moment's notice. The gunners have the ranges of every important building and position in Juarez, across the river, also.

**400,000 Drunkards in Germany.**

BERLIN, April 20.—There are 400,000 drunkards in Germany of whom 40,000 are women. This was the declaration made by President Frau Gerken at the meeting of the Berlin Women's Association against Alcoholism. Frau Gerken said that there were between 2500 and 3000 women drunkards in Berlin. Speaking of the psychology of drunkards Frau Gerken said that while men were fond of noisome companionship, drinking, women drunkards tried to conceal their falling and were addicted to "solitary spree." In most cases

she said, heavy drinking among women was due to sickness, unemployment, loss of standing and despondency. She said it was more difficult to cure and restore a woman than a man.
