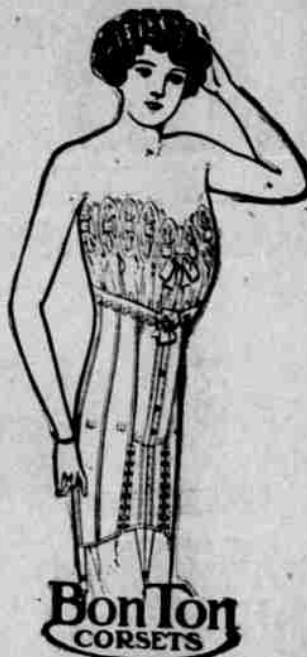

FOREIGN AMBASSADORS IN WASHINGTON INFORMED OF SITUATION BY SEC. BRYAN

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT WILL NOT ATTEMPT TO CONFISCATE GOODS.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The foreign ambassadors in Washington were summoned during the day by Secretary Bryan and informed of the developments of the situation. The German, French, British, Austrian, Japanese and Spanish ambassadors had separate conferences with Mr. Bryan. All declined to talk, but it is understood they received the same information that has been transmitted

abroad to American embassies and legations, being especially told that the American government in seizing the customs house at Vera Cruz would not attempt to confiscate goods consigned there, but merely would detain shipments, giving the shippers an opportunity to recover their property.

Transports Ready.
While the army has received no orders to move, should it become apparent that there will be resistance to the holding of Vera Cruz, the four army transports at Galveston, carrying four to five thousand troops, will be ordered under way.

General Charles J. Bailey, of the coast artillery, will command the first detachment from Galveston when sent and will be followed by Major-General Wood, who will be in supreme command.

Consul Reports.
Secretary Bryan, as a precaution,

had extra police sent to guard the Mexican embassy here. There were no signs of disturbances, but it was thought best to take the precaution.

Consul Canada's report follows: "Marines and bluejackets landed at 11:30 this morning, immediately taking possession of cable office, post office, telegraph offices and customs house, also railroad terminals and yards with rolling stock. Notwithstanding firing from house-tops, we are masters of the situation so far without use of heavy guns. Our men are simply defending themselves. Some resistance from naval vessels was soon silenced by guns on the Prairie. At this time reported four of our men are killed and 20 wounded. American newspapermen and several other Americans in consulate. Several Americans, including some women, who refused to go aboard refuge ship are now marooned in hotels within firing lines. Trains from Mexico City did not arrive."

Home Hints and Recipes

Meat Sauces.

In making a meat sauce of any kind it is wiser to blend the flour with the melted butter, writes a contributor to Los Angeles Express. By doing

this the starch in the flour is more quickly cooked and the butter is absorbed. When the flour is mixed with water and then stirred into the liquid at least 10 minutes of boiling is required to cook the flour, and even then it may have a raw taste. Another difficulty with a sauce made this way is that the butter does not blend, but rises to the surface of the liquid.

The Care of Children

There are certain little ailments to which a baby is quite apt to be subject in hot weather, no matter how carefully it is cared for. One of these, as already mentioned, is sore mouth, a condition that must be continually guarded against. As a prophylactic or preventive treatment the baby's mouth should be washed out twice a day with a one-half strength solution of boric acid, or if it is a very young baby, it is better to wash out the mouth three or even four times a day. To the saturated solution of boric acid there should be added an equal amount of water to make it half strength, and the mouth is washed out with a piece of antiseptic cotton dipped in the solution.

A Hot-Weather Rash.

A slight rash is another hot-weather ailment to which any baby is liable. If the rash seems stubborn or grows very irritating, then the bath should be given without soap of any sort, as even the purest variety tends to irritate the rash, and in place of soap a thin mixture of cooked cornmeal may be used. This soothes the skin and should be continued until the rash has entirely disappeared. Hot weather, too, may cause a dry and scaly condition of that part of a baby's head known as the "soft spot." An efficient remedy for this trouble is sweet-oil, a few drops of which should be carefully rubbed in twice a day, and while this treatment is being used the baby's head should be washed only every other day.

see the same message flashed from an electric sign at State and Madison street. This is "Baby Week" in Chicago. The Infant Welfare Society, which conducts thirteen "baby stations" in the congested sections where mothers are taught how to care for wee tots, is carrying on a vigorous campaign to raise more funds with which to equip more stations, and using every means to call the public's attention to its work. Lorado Taft, the famous sculptor, designed the big electric sign for the shopping district. It bears 1500 incandescent lights surrounding the figure of a mother holding a baby in her arms. Several large milk companies co-operated in the campaign by attaching tags to every bottle of milk delivered, telling the purposes of the society. In the past three years, Infant Welfare Society workers have cared for 36,000 Chicago babies. They hope to raise funds with which to equip at least six more stations, in addition to five new stations to be established by use of interest on a fund created by the sale of souvenir spoons during the Chicago World's Fair.
