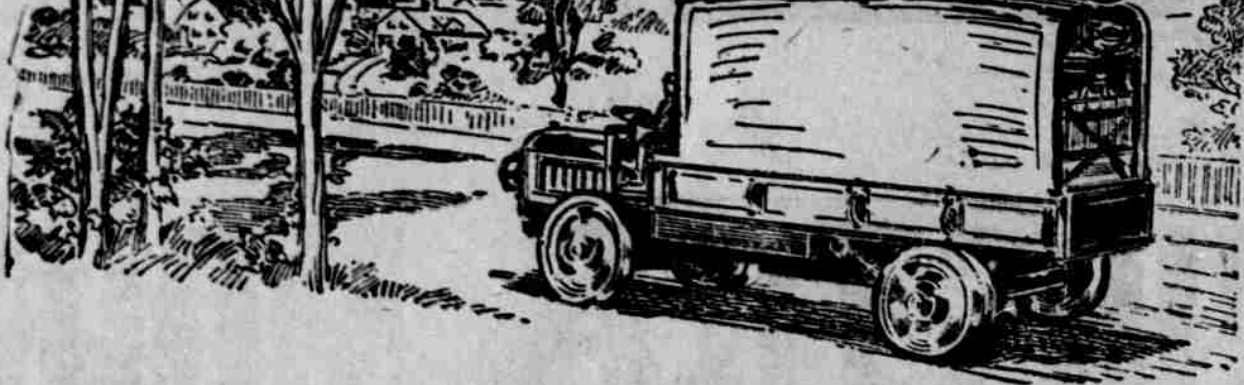

WARSHIPS AT TAMPICO CLEARED FOR ACTION

ADMIRAL MAYO PREPARES TO PROTECT AMERICANS AT THAT PORT.

TAMPICO, April 23.—(Via Galveston.)—It is known that Admiral Mayo had made all preparations for protecting Americans ashore but details were withheld because the admiral wished to avoid creating unnecessary alarm.

The first hint of intervention it was feared might precipitate an attack on Americans and if an outbreak should occur the Imperial hotel, which is filled with Americans likely would be the center of attack. The hotel, however, easily could be made defensible. It is near the river and readily accessible to landing parties of marines from the Des Moines, the Chester and the Dolphin. The Chester and Dolphin are cleared for action.

Rebels Active in Vicinity. Rebels were reported to have re-entered Dona Cecilia and Arbol, where they advised all residents to remove to Tampico.

It is believed the attack on Tampico might be renewed with arrival of constitutionalists reported near. The federalists continued strengthening the city's fortifications. There was a fight eight miles west of the city, from which the federalists retired, bringing a few wounded soldiers here.

American marine officers ashore in uniform attract much attention, but so far there has been no unpleasant manifestations.

Smallpox, Fever, Spreading. Sanitary conditions in Tampico are deplorable. The streets are in a foul condition and no water is available except that drawn from wells within the city. Many of the wells have been contaminated and even this supply is rapidly becoming exhausted, with no prospect of resumption of operations at the water works plant, which was disabled by the rebels, who will resist any attempt to make repairs.

Smallpox and fever are spreading. Several cases classed in the hospitals as "peculiar fever," are said to bear striking resemblance to yellow fever. With the approach of hot weather epidemics are feared.

CARRANZA TAKES ATTITUDE OF HOSTILITY TO U. S.

Act by Huerta Ignored. "And the Mexican nation, the real people of Mexico, have not recognized as its executive a man who had pretended to launch a blunder on its national integrity, drowning in blood its free institutions, consequently the acts of the usurper Huerta and his accomplices do not signify legitimate acts of sovereignty, they do not constitute real public functions of interior and exterior relations and much less do they represent the sentiments of the Mexican nation, which are of co-fraternity towards the American people."

"The lack of representative char-

acter of General Victoriano Huerta, as concerning the relations of Mexico with the United States as well as with Argentine Republic, Chile, Brazil and Cuba, had been clearly established with justifiable attitude of these nations, who have refused to recognize the usurper, in this way lending a valuable moral support to the noble cause I represent."

Right of Demand Denied.

"The usurped title of the president of the republic cannot invest General Huerta with the right to receive a demand for reparation on the part of the United States nor the right to grant a satisfaction as due."

"Victoriano Huerta is a culprit who is amenable to the constitutional government—today the only one under the abnormal circumstances of our nation, which represents the national sovereignty in accord with article 123 of the political constitution of Mexico. The illegal acts committed by the usurper Huerta and his partisans and those which they may yet perpetrate, be they of an international character, as those which recently occurred at the port of Tampico, or of a domestic character, shall be tried and punished by the tribunals of the constitutional government."

"The individual acts of Victoriano Huerta never will be sufficient to involve the Mexican nation in a disastrous war with the United States, because there is no solidarity whatsoever between the so-called government of Victoriano Huerta and the Mexican nation, for the fundamental reason that he is not the legitimate organ of our national sovereignty."

Vera Cruz Invasion "Violation."

"Moreover the invasion of our territory and the permanency of your forces in the port of Vera Cruz are a violation of the rights that constitute our existence as a free and independent sovereignty, and will drag us into an unequal war with our dignity, but which until today we desired to avoid."

"In the face of the real situation through Mexico's travesty, weak, more so than ever, and compared with the bloody strife, and compared with the formidable power of the American nation, in considering the acts committed to the dignity and independence of Mexico, and contrary to your reiterated declarations of not de-

siring to sever the state of peace and friendship with the Mexican nation and in contradiction also with the resolution of the American senate, which has just declared that the United States does not assume hostility against the Mexican people; neither do they propose to levy war against it, considering also that the hostile acts already accomplished exceed those exacted by equity, for the desired end, which may be considered as satisfied."

"It not being, on the other part, the usurper, who, in all cases, should have the right to constitute reparation, I interpret the sentiment of a great majority of the Mexican people which is so jealous of its rights, and respectful of foreign rights, I invite you solely to suspend the hostile acts already initiated, ordering your forces to evacuate all places which they hold in their power in the port of Vera Cruz, and to formulate before the constitutional government, which I represent as constitutionalist governor of the State of Coahuila and first chief of the constitutional army, the demand on the part of the United States for the acts which originated at the port of Tampico, in the security that the demand will be considered in a spirit of elevated justice and conciliation."

Bryan's Note Given Out.

The letter from Carranza was inspired by the following to him from Secretary Bryan:

"The president does not desire any resolution that could be construed as authorizing him to engage in war;

all he asks and all that will be given is a resolution declaring that he is justified in using the armed forces to compel redress of a specific indignity. He has been careful to distinguish between General Huerta and his supporters on the one side, and the rest of the Mexican people on the other side. He has reiterated his friendship for the Mexican people and his desire to help them establish a constitutional government. The taking of the custom-house at Vera Cruz was made necessary by Huerta's refusal to make proper preparation for the arrest of the American sailors."

"The constitutionalists are reported in the newspapers as standing aloof from the controversy. This is a very proper attitude, and we hope that they will not misunderstand the president's position or misconstrue his acts."

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OFFICIALS AT VERA CRUZ REFUSE TO COOPERATE IN KEEPING ORDER IN CITY

FLETCHER SERVES NOTICE ON MAYOR BUT GETS NO RESPONSE.

Six Americans Killed in Yesterday's Skirmish With Mexicans, the Latter Being Hidden on House Tops—Smaller Guns of Fleet Used to Demolish Their Positions.

VERA CRUZ, April 23.—Six Americans killed and about 30 wounded marked the complete investment of Vera Cruz by the United States forces. Rear Admiral Fletcher sent a note to the local officials, calling on them to co-operate with the American officers in the restoration of order by calling off sharpshooters and by resuming the local government, but it could not be delivered.

Julio Franco, the Mexican chosen by American Consul Canada to be the bearer of the warning, was unable to communicate with any of the federal officials and only the mayor, Roberto Diaz, could be found.

When Franco tried to communicate with the mayor admiral was refused him by Mexican guards stationed at the roof of adjoining buildings in the court of the Diaz residence, but he did not succeed in seeing the mayor.

Senor Diaz refused to leave his bedroom, so Consul Canada's messenger shouted the contents of Rear-Admiral Fletcher's note to the Mayor and personally appealed to him to yield in order to save the city from bombardment by the American ships, reminding him of the grave risk to families of the Mexicans and others in the city.

General Movement Ordered.

Rear-Admiral Fletcher at 8.30 o'clock yesterday morning ordered a general movement for the occupation of all the town. A column of blue-jackets advanced and passed the uncompleted market place and naval college. When they had reached the walls of the college a terrific rifle fire was poured in all directions from the roof and the windows. The blue-jackets were helpless to return the fire against the stone walls and scattered.

The Prairie, Chester and San Francisco opened with their five and six-inch guns and shattered the walls. The blue-jackets reformed and advanced against the fire, which had diminished greatly.

By 10 o'clock there was only desultory firing from the inshore side of the tower. Battalions of blue-jackets had made their way along the waterfront to the southern end of the town and cleared several streets, but the sniping from houses continued at intervals.

Cruiser Shows Good Marksmanship. The scout cruiser Chester pounded buildings on the outskirts with six-inch shells, firing over the heads of the men ashore and showing almost perfect marksmanship.

Admiral Fletcher's proclamation to the mayor, chief of police and citizens of Vera Cruz said:

"It has become necessary for the naval forces of the United States of America now at Vera Cruz to land and assume military control of the customs wharves of Vera Cruz. Your co-operation is required to preserve order and prevent loss of life."

"It is not the intention of the United States Naval forces to interfere with the administration of the civil affairs of Vera Cruz, more than is necessary for the purpose of maintaining a condition of law and order and enforce such sanitary conditions as are needed to meet military requirements."

"It is desired that the civil officials of Vera Cruz shall continue in the peaceful pursuits of their occupations. Under these conditions, full protection will be given to the city by the United States naval forces."

"It is enjoined on all inhabitants and property owners to prevent firing by individuals from the shelter of their houses on United States forces, or on any one else. Such firing by irregulars not members of an organized military force, is contrary to the laws of war; if persisted in, it will call for severe measures."
