The Care of Children

For the proper care of a baby, and particularly a bottle-fed baby, in hot weather there is an indispensable rule that should not be lost sight of for one moment. That is the rule of absolute cleanliness, for there is nothing else that contributes so much to a little baby's health and comfort. There are various degrees of cleanliness, all the way from the thorough sterilization of everything with which the baby comes in contact down to the condition arrived at by the judicious use of soap and water, and known to ordinary, unscientific folk as just plain clean. The average mother who has no particular theories about germs and their activities, but who wants to keep her baby healthy and comfortable in a perfectly normal way during the hot weather, can do much toward bringing this about if she is careful in the little things that go to make up cleanliness and guards against the minor ills to which the baby is liable.

Home Hints and Recipes

Worth Knowing.
If a gloss is desired on linen, add a teaspoonful of salt to the starch when making.

Soap that is allowed to dry and harden lasts twice as long as if used when fresh. Therefore it is cheaper to buy it in quantities and keep it in a dry place.

White velvet can be freshened by applying chloroform to it after freeing the velvet of dust.

When shoe polish becomes dry from keeping it too long, moisten it with a little turpentine, as it softens the polish, which is usable once more. It also gives a good gloss to the leather. —Janesville Gazette.

On Both Sides.

It is a good idea to make buttonholes on both sides of a lingerie waist says Los Angeles Express. Sew the buttons on a tape and button them to one side of the waist. When the waist goes to the laundry you can remove the buttons. And the same tape or buttons can be used on several waists.

Classic English Race Run.

NEWARK, N. J., April 29.—The Two Thousand Guinea, first of the season's big classic three-year-old races, was run today over the usual mile course here. The race, being its name, was worth \$25,000 to the winner, and as might be expected with regard to an event which is considered a dress-rehearsal of the all-important Derby (run at Epsom a month from now) interest centered on the way in which the cracks had wintered.

King George was present to see his colt Sunny Lake and to follow in Minor's footsteps and place the race to the credit of a monarch, and the royal colt was much liked on account of his stylish display at the Newbury recently. Unfortunately Sunny Lake is not entered in the Derby. King George had not won a classic race up to today. Americans planned their hopes to Durbar, France. American bred son of Rabelais-Armelia, belonging to H. B. Durvey, made no secret of his belief that Durbar would repeat the victory of his good colt Sweeper II, a couple of years ago. Betting however, has taken but a narrow range owing to the uncertainty as to the well-being, or otherwise of Capt. Dermot McCallmont's phenomenal grey, The Tetrarch, who simply smothered all opposition as a two-year-old. This oddity marked son of Roi Herode, has been suffering from leg trouble, and right up to the last moment there was uncertainty as to whether he would run. Fit and Well, the "Two Thousand" and the Derby, were reckoned a "take-walk" for McCallmont's entry, but it was known that he has been pin-fired, and the racing public has for months been tormented by reports that the rocking horse, as The Tetrarch is popularly called on account of his queer color, would not be seen on a race-track again. McCallmont refused an offer of \$150,000 for him last fall.

Spaniards Are Neutral.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Spanish diplomatic officials in Washington said emphatically that Spaniards residents in Mexico were maintaining the most scrupulous neutrality in the present situation.
