The Care of Children

Nursing the Contagious Diseases.

While a physician should be in charge of all cases that are contagious the mother is generally called upon to nurse the little patient and meet many emergencies when they arise. It must be remembered that each child differs from others, and may show a different set of symptoms. The suggestions given here will be helpful in the average case showing the most common symptoms of the different diseases.

If a child has measles, what can the mother do to make him more comfortable?

Select a large, well-ventilated room at the top of the house if possible; or if in an apartment, then select a room which does not communicate with the other rooms. Isolate the sick child there. Keep a wash wrapper or gown hanging just inside the door of the room and when you are with the child slip it on. Also tie a handkerchief or cap of wash material over your hair.

As the disinfectants to be used are poisonous they should be prescribed by the doctor in charge of the case, and careful directions as to their use should be given by him.

It is not necessary to keep the room in complete darkness during a case of measles. The first three or four days it is better to have a subdued light.

While the rash is out it is not advisable to give the child a full tub bath, but the body may be sponged with warm water and then rubbed with an oily substance of some kind to which a little carbolic, one per cent may be added to relieve the intense itching of the skin which is often present.

When the fever is very high the sponge bath will often prove soothing. An ice cap kept at the child's head will also often soothe him and help reduce the fever.

Home Hints and Recipes

To Store Bedding.

Line a large packing case with heavy wrapping paper letting it come above the edge of the box so it will fold over when the box is filled and so prevent moths from working their way in. All bedding must be thoroughly aired or washed before being put away and the wisest plan is to fold the blankets in paper singly sprinkling freely of camphor, lavender, or, in fact, any moth preventative.

A piece of paper is pasted over the top of the box and then the wooden cover is nailed down.

Use For Old Blankets. When blankets have become very thin to the verge of breaking put two together and cover with cheese cloth on both sides. Tie through with yarn as for a comforter and finish the edges with a fancy stitch, using colored wool. This makes a very nice lightweight quilt or can be used for ornament only, taking it off the bed at night.

To Clean a Clock. When a clock stops for no known reason it is probable some foreign substance has settled upon the wheels. If a cloth is saturated with kerosene and laid upon a saucer then put into the clock case the fumes of the oil will loosen the matter, causing it to drop. They also tend to lubricate the works.

NEW YORK SEES ROOM AS BIGGEST GRAIN MART

NEW YORK, April 30.—Within the next year, according to a committee of the city's Produce Exchange which has just completed a careful study of the subject, New York's former prestige as the greatest grain market of

200 Acres Sell, \$26,000.

WALLA WALLA, April 30.—Nearly a record price was paid for wheat land in the foothills seven miles east of the city. George McGuire sold 200 acres to Bruce Farrell for \$26,000 or \$130 an acre.

The United States will be restored, for several years past the volume of grain passing through this port has been decreasing and this movement has been reflected in a declining volume of transactions on the local exchange. Two factors are expected to combine to bring about a renewal of activities that will give New York once more a leading position among the great grain markets of the world. One of these is the great State Barge Canal which is to be completed within the next few months at a cost of \$140,000,000. It will be ready to handle shipments by the end of next year and will enable grain cargoes to be shipped in one bottom without breaking bulk, from Fort Williams, Port Arthur and Duluth, a distance more than half as great as from New York to Liverpool.

LUMBER 'COMBINES' RAPPED IN REPORT

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Lumber manufacturers' associations through combination and agreement have increased the price of lumber and endeavored through lobbying to influence legislation, according to a partial report on the lumber industry made public by the commissioner of corporations. The report opposes any effort to exempt lumber associations from the operation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

This partial report is part four of the findings in a complete investigation of the lumber industry and deals only with combinations to restrict trade or raise lumber prices.

Price Agreements Found.

After reciting that price agreements among lumber manufacturers exist in practically every region of lumber production, the report says: "While some of the avowed purposes of the lumber associations are to foster practices that are beneficial to both producer and consumer, the chief purpose apparently has been to advance prices." "Wholesale prices of lumber have been raised by associated activities of lumbermen."

BOMBARDMENT MADE ON WEST COAST, REPORTED

SAID THAT MARINES HAVE BEEN LANDED — WASHINGTON MAKES DENIAL.

MEXICO CITY, April 30.—The port of Manzanillo, on the Pacific coast, was bombarded by an American warship, according to a telegram received here by General Aureliano Blanquet, Mexican minister of war, from Jose Maria Mier.

According to General Mier's message the warship entered Manzanillo harbor at 4 p. m., April 28. At 4:30 the telegraphers left their posts, carrying their instruments with them, and at 5 o'clock the bombardment was begun.

The telegram says the wharves and adjoining buildings were destroyed.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—The South Dakota, the first of the big cruisers to go south, reached Mazatlan, much further up the coast, only yesterday. The gunboat Annapolis is the only war vessel reported at Salina Cruz, and she carries no marines.

"There is not a warship at Manzanillo," Captain Frank M. Bennett, commanding the Mare Island Navy Yard, said, when told of the reported bombardment there. "There could have been no bombardment. I do not think there is anything to the report that marines were landed at Salina Cruz."

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Secretary Daniels said he did not believe the Mexico City report that Manzanillo had been bombarded by an American warship or that marines had been landed at Salina Cruz. He said he was in constant communication with Rear-Admiral Howard, whose last report was that all was quiet on the Pacific coast.

The wives of Captain Hill and Second Mate Simons were taken from the vessel yesterday morning by the Umpqua life-saving crew of Florence. The women refused to leave the ship during the night, when the fury of the breakers made attempts of the life-savers to reach the boat almost impossible.

The Hugh Hogan, carrying 350,000 feet of lumber, bound for San Francisco, was being towed to sea from Florence when the tug lost her while crossing the bar.

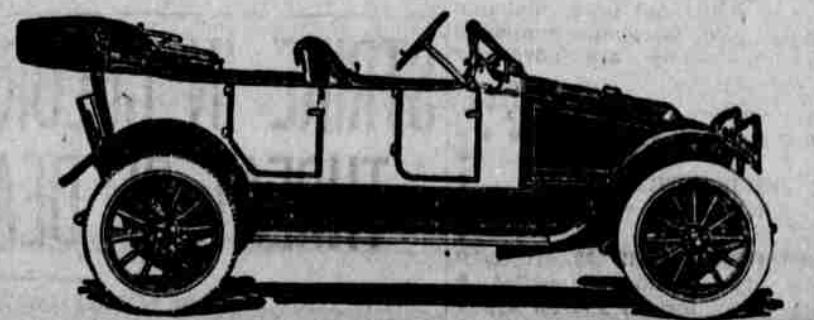

MUNICIPAL GOLF LINKS ARE OPENED AT SPOKANE

SPOKANE, Wash., April 29.—Municipal golf links were opened in Spokane at the up-river park this week under the direction of the board of park commissioners. The course has nine holes, with a number of good natural hazards and two artificial ones. Within the main course is a beginners course of six holes. The links border the Spokane river and are accessible to street car lines. The park board is working on another municipal undertaking in the shape of a public swimming and wading pool within one mile of the business district. By July 1 the bath houses will be completed, according to A. L. White, president of the park board.
