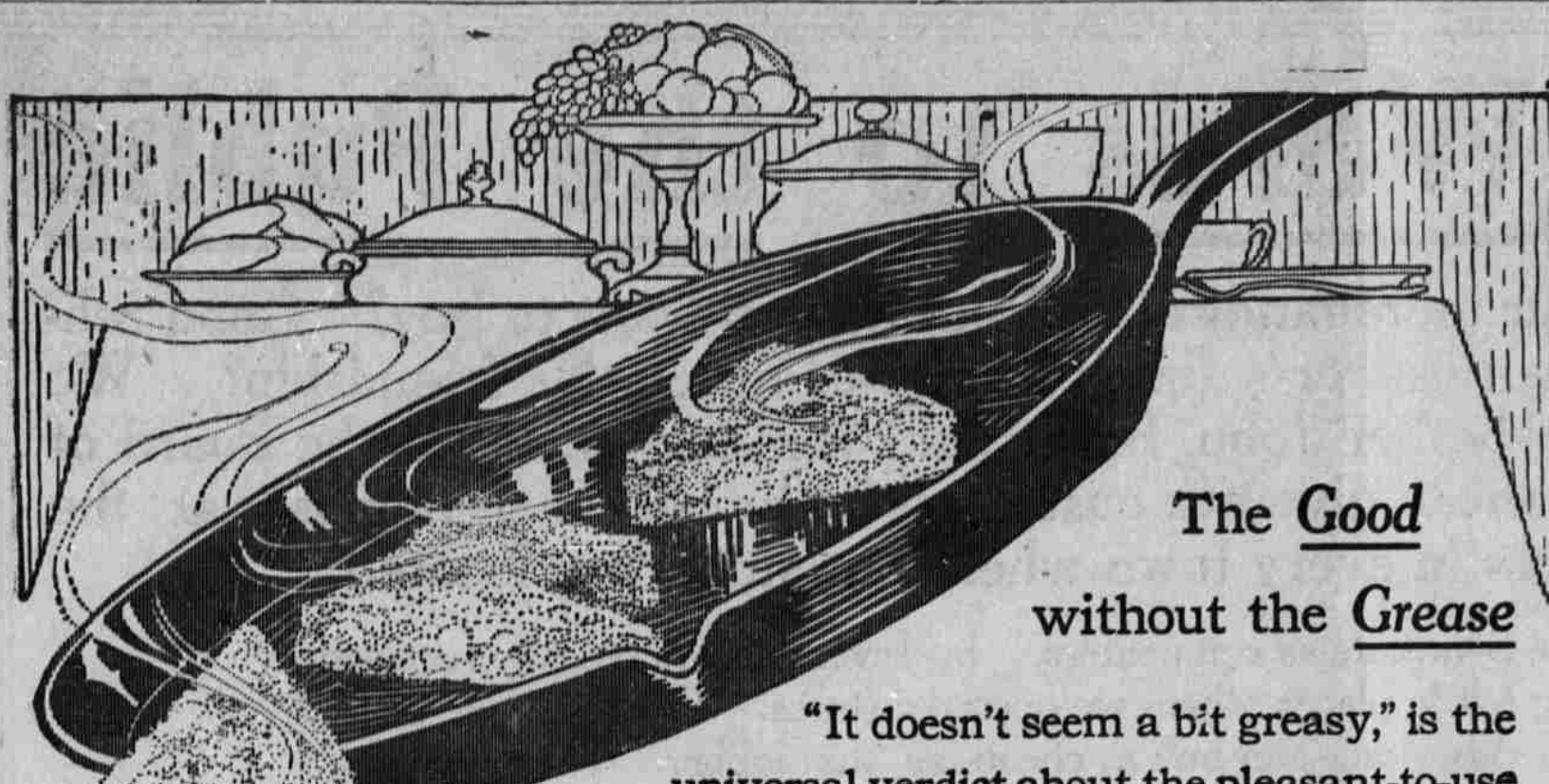

PROMINENT PORTLAND MAN IS DEAD AT 83

JUDGE MALLORY PASSES AWAY AFTER A MOST ACTIVE BUSINESS CAREER.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—Judge Rufus Mallory, of the law firm of Dolph, Mallory, Simon & Gearin, died yesterday at his home, 356 East Thirty-ninth street, after an illness of three days. He lacked but a few weeks of being 83 years of age. Death was due to the nature failure of health from old age.

The dead jurist is survived by his widow and a married son, Elmer E. Mallory, and by a brother, Homer H. Mallory, 87 years old, who lives on his farm, near Andover, N. Y. All arrangements for the funeral have not been made.

Elmer Mallory announced last night that his father's body would be cremated at the Portland Crematorium, an institution which he helped to organize.

Judge Rufus Mallory was born in Coventry, Chenango county, New York, June 10, 1831. He traced his ancestry back to Peter Mallory, who came from England in 1643 and settled in New Haven, Conn. David Mallory, one of his ancestors, fought in the Revolutionary war.

of it as possible. This may be repeated with benefit several times daily. If one has a regular cup of coffee so much the better. The mother should not attempt to dose the child with any kind of medicine on her own responsibility; rely only on the doctor for this.

The Care of Children

Storing the Furs.

Furs should not see the light of April—if they are valuable enough to care about at all and it is a wise woman who attends to the putting away of the family furs before the really warm days approach.

Most city folks now send their hand-made furs to cold storage for the summer months. The slight fee charged is inconceivable beside the comfort of knowing that one's furs are safe and may be dismissed from the mind until they are needed again in the autumn. The low temperature of the cold storage rooms also gives the furs a rich, silky luster and makes each separate hair stand out as it does on the animal—for, of course, fur-bearing animals come from cold countries, and the 20 below zero temperature of cold storage is a deal better for your sealskin coat, madam, than the stifling 90 in the shade of the cedar chest, in the home attic.

But moths, not summer heat, are the most dangerous enemy of furs, and the surest preventive against ruin by moths is to get the furs put away before the moth eggs have been laid. The moment you see a moth flitting about be sure that eggs have already been laid somewhere—perhaps only in that old winter blanket folded under the cover of the divan; but equally, perhaps, in your \$300 set of pointed fox which you have not had time to put away. If moth eggs are discovered in the furs don't take any chances; carry them to a reliable furrier to be treated and cared for. If you are sure there are no moths in them hang them in the air for a whole day, brush them thoroughly and then wrap in newspapers before slipping into the cedar chest or moth bags. Moths detest newspaper, and if well wrapped and sealed ordinary newspapers are as efficacious as camphor balls in keeping out the pests. If fur looks dull and matted and has lost its gloss and fluffiness, sprinkle it well with powdered starch and leave, covered with newspapers, for twenty-four hours. Then shake out the starch and the fur will be light and fluffy, as your own hair is when treated to a dry shampoo of oris root and talcum.

Dolls on Table.

The newest table decoration consists of dolls with china heads and bodies dressed in flower petals in Louis XVI. costumes, in two contrasting colors. Either the hoped skirt is in pink, the bodice and overdress in blue, or these may be reversed. The petals are sewn closely together on some invisible material, and the dolls, their white and pink faces and pal-

ed coiffure of the period rising above their flowered costumes, look very quaint and pleasing; the more so, as the contrast is so great with the exiguity of gowns of today.
