SCIENCE NOTES.

Dr. Bottlinger of Munich says that gravitation is absorbed in traversing a medium, so that the interposition of a third body between two others affects their mutual attraction of the run on the moon is enfeebled when the earth comes between them, when there is an eclipse. Dr. Bottlinger admits that the enfeeblement of gravitation depends on the density of the medium traversed and is, therefore, obliged to construct a hypothesis respecting the interior constitution of the earth. The perturbations of longitude, calculated in this way, from 1834 to 1909, are translated into a feeble oscillation of which the period is 19 years. The epochs of maximum and minimum corresponds exactly to those which have been found empirically by Newcomb.

The scottish of Pittsburg, as determined from careful measurements

during the last year, ranges from 595 to 1950 tons a square mile per annum. The eductive possibilities of this great deposit may be illustrated by stating that if an equal amount of lampblack were ground with oil so as to form black paint it would cover seventeen to fifty-seven square miles with two coats. Statistics of soot fall at certain places in Great Britain are as follows: Industrial section of Leeds, 529 tons; center of London, 426 tons; Glasgow, 829 tons.

There is a theory that the circular, crater-like mountains of the moon are not of volcanic origin, but are the result of the moon's being hit by planetoids. Another new theory is to the effect that the earth was at one time encircled by a ring similar to that which now encircles Saturn and that this gradually collected, gathering first around a large number of nuclei and finally uniting in a sphere—the moon.

HUERTA DECLARES HE HAS NO THOUGHT OF RESIGNING

LONDON, May 6.—President Huerta told the Mexico City correspondent of the Daily Mail that he was not going to give up his position of chief executive of Mexico. He said: "I have had no thought of resigning the office which the republic conferred upon me."

General Huerta declared that his health was good. In reply to a question as to his sentiments toward Americans he said: "The conduct of my government and of the Mexican people towards Americans who are remaining here during the present conflict is the best answer to that question."

CONVICTS WILL BE USED TO CLEAR LAND

WISCONSIN WILL KEEP 60 PER CENT OF TRUSTED MEN AT WORK.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(Special)—"Sixty per cent of the convicts can be trusted in some way," stated E. Stagg Whitin, of the National Committee on Prison Labor, before the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce at a recent hearing on the Hughes bill to limit interstate commerce in convict-made goods. Dr. Whitin appeared in favor of the bill, the passage of which would go far to break down the contract system of prison labor.

The contention was made that this would cause embarrassment to some of the states in that it would be difficult to find employment for their convicts. To refute this contention, Dr. Whitin outlined the constructive scheme for the development of the prison industries of Wisconsin which he had worked out for the governor and the board of public affairs.

The state of Wisconsin has an asset in its lands, but it cannot sell them at profit because of the stumps. The first proposition is to have the sixty per cent of the convicts who can be trusted away from the prison out on those lands to take out the stumps," he said. "Then the stumps must be brought down to some central point near the railroad. Those convicts who can be trusted farthest away must build a road embracing all the state lands, and quarrying the stone for the road, while the road will also add to the value of the lands. A pulp mill and saw mill should be located at the central station where the waste wood can be turned into pulp and the timber sawn. From the mills the pulp and timber should be shipped to Wauwaton prison.

"At the prison the forty per cent of the prisoners who need to remain within the stockade could manufacture school desks and paper for the use of the state. There are probably twenty-five life prisoners at Wauwaton who will not likely come out and go into industry. These men could be employed at printing for the state. When you gather up your waste paper from the capitol and, instead of selling it to a junk man, send it back to be worked over again at the prison plant, you have a complete round-up of your system."

"Constructive schemes, adapted to local conditions and needs, should be worked out in each of the states," Dr. Whitin concluded, "and then it will be possible to place all the prison industries on an efficient basis, to pay the prisoner a fair wage for his work and do away with unfair competition with free labor."

QUANTITY OF OPIUM IS SEIZED AT LA GRANDE

LA GRANDE, Ore., May 6.—Harry J. Strowbridge, of the United States Customs Service, with Special Agents Guy M. Watkins and E. P. Stott, raided the Chinese stores, laundries and lodging houses and secured a quantity of pure opium, several cans of mixed opium compositions, a dozen or more variegated pipes and three gunny-sacks filled with "empties," scales, lighters and other paraphernalia.

No arrests were made, as no violations could be proved against anyone in particular. Advance information had reached the local officials from Huntington and some are thought to have secreted their wares.

VENEZUELAN REBELS DEFEAT REGULAR TROOPS

WILLEMSTAD, Curacao, May 6.—A force of Venezuelan rebels is reported to have defeated the government troops on Saturday at Churuguara, in the state of Falcon. As a consequence General Leon Guardo, with 1000 regulars has been ordered from La Guaira to attack the rebels.

DR. SMITH CHARGES SHOWN TO BE FALSE

(Continued from page one.)

In view of the charges made by the Portland Oregonian against Dr. C. J. Smith it is interesting to note the news stories and editorial comments of the days when Dr. Smith was mayor of Pendleton. The Oregonian yesterday accused Dr. Smith of favoring wide open gambling here while he was mayor.

The files of the East Oregonian show that the charge is false and that instead of upholding gambling Dr. Smith immediately after becoming mayor gave orders that gambling be closed down and that his order was obeyed.

Dr. Smith became mayor of Pendleton on January 1, 1898. On January 12 of that year the following significant news story appeared in the daily edition of the East Oregonian:

NO MORE GAMBLING. Games in Pendleton Saloons Are All Closed Down.

After a short season as a wide open town Pendleton has settled down to quietude and morality at night time. The tiger and her cub are no longer found in the back rooms of saloons, awaiting combat with all comers and particularly the jay who is anxious to separate from his lair as soon as possible. To be sure the nickel in the slot machines still remain but these afford a very mild sort of sport compared with faro, craps, chuck-a-luck and stud poker. Pendleton has been about deserted by transient gamblers and tin horns, for their occupation is gone.

A policeman said last night that only a few are left of the many who have been preying upon lawless lumps in this locality. All the games were notified to close down by Marshal Heathman and promptly obeyed the order. This was done more cheerfully perhaps through wholesome fear that the coming grand jury might institute a sweeping reform movement with a larger broom than the hit or miss article of its predecessor. Back rooms are deserted and outfits stored away. The gentlemen of daytime leisure and nighttime industry have departed to the east, west, north and south in search of greener pastures.

All is well at Pendleton.

J. M. Heathman, who was marshal under the Smith administration recalls well the attitude of Dr. Smith towards gambling. Mr. Heathman is not supporting Dr. Smith for governor but he believes the truth should be told and declares that Dr. Smith was always opposed to gambling and gave instructions that gambling be kept closed. It was through the mayor's influence that the town was closed up immediately after Dr. Smith became mayor. The councilmen at that time were not favorable to the Smith policy as they wished to get a monthly revenue from the gamblers. Prior to the Smith term the gamblers had been fined regularly and it was a novel thing to close gambling in those days.

Aside from the above extract from the files of the East Oregonian for the year 1898 the files show at subsequent dates in the same year other news items and editorial comments all indicating that gambling was being suppressed, in the main if not entirely. The closing of gambling was praised editorially by this paper, the statement being made that if the
