The Care of Children

Block Plays.
No, not the blocks as we know them on the toy-shop counters; picture blocks, blocks that are accompanied by printed directions telling a child exactly how to fit them together to make a miniature house, a barn or a wall; not even the tiny stone blocks that are cut in a myriad confusing shapes.

These are dead toys for your child because they think for him. He wants live toys; toys that give him an opportunity to use his own brain in planning his play and his own hands in carrying it out. Most of all does your child want—need—a set of plain, uniform pine blocks.

Select a set of large, smoothly planed, carefully cut blocks and, if possible, provide a box for them that the child may learn order and neatness through putting them away when his play is done. These blocks may be cut in the shape of cubes, half cubes, bricks, pillars and square pilings to provide for constructing the architectural form dear to the child; doors, roofs, bridges, chimneys, windows, gates and walls. And they should be large blocks, so generous of dimension that little hands must stretch to hold them and their weight test and strengthen the child's muscles as he lays the last brick on the very top of the chimney of the house he has built all alone.

Home Hints and Recipes

Poultry Advice by a Marketman.
A marketman writes: "Thinking it might be of some interest to the readers, I will try and explain a practical way of taking the tendon out of a turkey's leg. Cut the scaly skin of the turkey's foot between the ankle and the knee around with a pen-knife and break the bone in the leg where the skin is cut. Then hang the turkey by the broken foot on a meat hook or a large nail, and holding it with your left hand, pull with the right hand. It takes a little strength to pull those large tendons but they will all come out clean as a whistle. Then chop the other half of the broken foot off with a cleaver."

New Negligees.
On a charming new negligee made of chiffon there is a girde of wide flowered ribbon edged with fur. Under the fur is fastened a frill of wide yellowish lace. The combination of lace and fur with the ribbon is most attractive, says the Denver Times.

Another dainty negligee is made of pure white chiffon. There is a trim little packet of rose-pink taffeta that is fastened in the front with a big silk covered button and a buttonhole worked in a little tab of the coat. The jacket is the only touch of color on the negligee.

The governor of Keiff has recommended to St. Petersburg, that the residents of these suburbs be attached to the Pale district of Lukonovska, but in the meantime the police are inspecting permits of residents with a view to prosecution and expulsion.
