REPRESENTATIVES OF WETS AND DRY'S FIGHT

TWO MEN ARE WOUNDED AT RAINIER AND SALOONKEEPER IS UNDER ARREST.

RAINIER, Ore., May 8.—O. Danigan and Sam Lavere are wounded, W. C. Lee, a saloonkeeper, is under arrest on a warrant sworn out by city officials and the city is in a furor of excitement as the result of a street fight here between representatives of the "wet" and "dry" factions, now contending for the control of the city. The trouble started when Nels Carlson, the city marshal, attempted to arrest Lee on the charge of operating a saloon within the city limits without a license. Lee was convicted last Sunday on a charge of selling liquor to minors and his license was revoked. He opened the saloon again yesterday, contending that the notice of the council's decision had never been served on him.

Lee resisted arrest and called the officer names. It is said.

In the melee the officer's pistol fell to the sidewalk. O. Danigan, a "wet" stopped on the gun and refused to yield it, when the officer butted him in the stomach with his head.

The weapon was discharged, the bullet penetrating Danigan's groin and inflicting a serious wound. The bullet entirely passed through Danigan's body and seriously wounded Sam Lavere, a bystander. Danigan is in the hospital, but will recover.

Rainier went dry last November. Judge Aiken later voided the election. The "dry" are now in control of the council.

Lee's license was revoked on the ground that he was not obeying the law. Lee alleges that Carlson tried to make the arrest without a warrant. He is now under arrest on a charge of allowing minors in his saloon, a second warrant having been issued.

MONEY TO EDUCATE BOYS.

Gates' Widow Plans to Establish School for Orphans.

AURORA, Ill., May 8.—A report reached Aurora from Colorado Springs Colo., that the vast wealth of John W. Gates is to be spent almost wholly by his widow in founding schools for the education and maintenance of orphan boys and worthy boys of poor parents. Charitable organizations, too, will share in the fortune, it is said.

The report from Colorado Springs came shortly after a dispatch announcing the death of Henry Rockwell Baker, 23 years old, a nephew of Mrs. Gates, in whom her deepest affections were centered. Mrs. Gates idolized her nephew and persuaded her husband to put a stipulation in his will, leaving Baker \$250,000 on condition that he finished a college course, in addition to thousands which she lavished upon the boy.

When failing health prevented young Baker from meeting the terms of the Gates will, his aunt gave him the quarter million outright from her own purse, and when he would not leave his home in St. Charles for the west because his sweetheart, Nina Carlson, would be left behind, she persuaded the girl's father to let the girl accompany him as his nurse. Soon after arriving in the west, the young couple were married.

COAST SHOWS PROSPERITY.

Increase in Carload Shipments Evidence of New Adjustment.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—"The railroads have been facing a crisis and have had to adjust all their expenditures to a basis commensurate with a shrinking income. There has been less passenger travel and a decidedly smaller freight movement," said E. O. McCormick, vice president of the Southern Pacific, on his return from a three months' stay in the east.

"Every mile that brings you nearer to the Pacific coast adds to your optimism and western optimism is well founded. The most significant evidence of approaching prosperity on the Pacific coast is the marked proportionate increase in carload shipments of freight as compared with less than carloads."

Charities and Correction Conference MEMPHIS, May 8.—With representatives present from almost every state in the union, the fifty-sixth annual meeting of the National Conference of Charities and Correction convened here. Sessions will continue through May 15.

COLORS WILL BE SUBDUED.

CLEVELAND, May 8.—Colors in women's fall and winter garments are to be more subdued than those prevailing in 1914 spring wear.

This is the advance notice of the 50 delegates to the 24th semi-annual convention of the National Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' association, which will be held here.

PASSING OF PIONEER RECALLS INDIAN WARS

FORMER EASTERN OREGON MAN DIES AFTER AN EVENTFUL LIFE.

(Special Correspondence.) ECHO, Ore., May 8.—Word was received this morning by wire from Tangent, Oregon, of the death of W. J. Smith, an old Oregon pioneer and resident of Umatilla county. He came to Oregon in 1851 from Iowa when only a lad of 14 years and settled with his mother in the Willamette valley.

In 1855-56 he fought in the Indian war in eastern Oregon. Was present at the three-days' battle near Touchet on the Walla Walla river. He was married in 1862 to Miss Minerva Watson of Albany, Ore. Eleven children were born to the union, ten of which survive him.

In 1879 he moved to Umatilla county with his family and settled near Helix, Ore. His wife who also survives him, was postmistress of the first postoffice at that place.

In 1895 Mr. Smith returned to the Willamette valley, where he resided until his death.

He was a member of the Masonic order, under the auspices of which he will be buried in the Albany cemetery.

Besides a host of friends he leaves his wife and ten children, three of whom reside in this county. Mrs. Joel Howton of Freewater and Mrs. Louis Scholl, Jr., and T. G. Smith of Echo.

LOCAL FRIENDS OF DR. SMITH RALLY TO SUPPORT

(Continued from page one.)

It is significant that Dr. Smith is receiving almost united support from local law enforcement circles. W. W. Harrah, chairman of the Law and Order League, which conducted the recent gambling clean-up in Pendleton, is an ardent Smith supporter.

"I have known Dr. Smith for 24 years," says Mr. Harrah. "He is clean and straightforward in every way. He has always been interested in educational work and every move for the elevation of community life. He has always opposed gambling and lax saloon methods. I lived adjoining while he was mayor 16 years ago and know that gambling was put out of business when he became mayor. All vice may not have been stopped, but Dr. Smith's influence was always for a clean town and opposed to the open town policy."

G. M. Rice, cashier of the First National Bank for the last 10 years, is a strong supporter of Dr. Smith and had this to say:

"In the 10 years I have known Dr. Smith I have been very close to him in a business way and a social way. I have talked to him so much on community affairs and other subjects that I feel I know him thoroughly. He is a man of high ideals and clean principles. I have every confidence in his judgment and his integrity. He means what he says. His campaign statements are in accord with his convictions and his past record."

A strong local supporter for Dr. Smith is Assessor C. P. Strain, the man who brought the railroad assessments in this county to a true figure. "I came to this county during the year Dr. Smith was mayor of Pendleton," Mr. Strain says. "I did not live in Pendleton then but know Dr. Smith was for law enforcement. He is a man of clean personal life and has always opposed the vice element."

Will M. Peterson, democratic county chairman, says he has known Dr. Smith for 12 years and had offices adjacent to the Smith offices for six years. "There is no man in the state of cleaner or more moral life than Dr. Smith. He has always upheld better moral conditions and as a leader in educational affairs and other civic enterprises always looked upon the moral side as well as the intellectual or commercial features. I have heard Dr. Smith say many times that it is a disgrace to have laws that are not enforced and that if laws are not to be enforced they should be repealed. I remember talking with him on his

return from Europe several years ago and he commented strongly on the more rigid enforcement of laws in Europe and upon the fact that there are fewer technical delays than in this country."

J. W. Maloney, county judge of Umatilla county and one of the law enforcement leaders in this city, is a supporter of Dr. Smith. "Dr. Smith is a man of very clean personal habits. He has never been a frequenter of saloons and his law enforcement promises are what one would expect because he has always been antagonistic to what is called the open town policy. I did not know personally of his work as mayor of Pendleton but my information is that he caused a great improvement in conditions."

CENTRALIA ASKS RECALL.

Three Members of Council Face Serious Charges Filed.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 8.—Petitions asking for the recall of Mayor H. W. Thompson and Commissioners Albert Sears and William Kier were filed with the city clerk by Victor Jackson, but as no affidavit accompanied them, as required by law, the clerk refused to accept them, notifying Jackson by letter of the circumstances.

The petitions, placed in circulation two months ago, ask the recall of the officials on the following seven charges: Allowing a saloon to sell liquor under conditions contrary to law; taking money from fallen women; permitting a bawdy house to operate inside the city limits; permitting the sale of liquor in this same house; selling water for drinking purposes when they know it to be impure; allowing current expense fund to remain beyond its legal limit, and entering into a contract with a Portland cement firm for which Commissioner Sears is local agent.

Mayor Thompson was pastor of the Presbyterian church at the time of his election, but resigned before assuming office.

SKIN GRAFTED ON EYELID.

Scars of Childhood's Burn Removed By Operation.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 8.—A rare operation in optical surgery has been performed at a hospital here, when three large pieces of skin were taken from the arm of Miss Sara Trego to make new lids for her left eye. It is thought the sight of the eye will be saved. Already the grafted skin has taken root and the patient can partly open and close the eyelid.

After the skin was taken from Miss Trego's arm the scarred tissue surrounding the eye and the membrane of the lid were removed. In the denuded area the skin of the patient's arm was grafted. Miss Trego was burned about the head when a child.

\$50,000 Voted for Water.

BAKER, Ore., May 8.—By a vote of 55 to 30, the town of Richland, in this county, adopted a new charter which widens the powers of the city council so that that a bonded indebtedness can be incurred up to \$50,000. This was done in order that the city may put in a gravity water system, which will be done at once.

It is proposed to put in a pipe from Eagle creek, 5 miles above Richland, and to furnish water to the little town of Newbridge, two miles away. Here, before wells and pumps have been the only means of getting water at both towns.
