Savings.

Many women are kept from making an effort to save by the fact that their husbands with lavish hands fling away more money than they are able to save by their small economies, but this should be the very reason why they should try all the harder. It is hard to walk three or four extra blocks to save 5 cents on vegetables and then see the man of the house buy an expensive cigar or refuse to wear a garment that is patched, but if the 5 cents is safe in the bank it is better than flinging that amount away to show that if one won't save neither will the other.

It usually happens that when the mistress of the house has saved \$100 she can no longer keep the secret, so she unfolds her wonderful plan to the man of the house. Then the saving account goes forward by leaps and bounds, for the husband gladly does his part in making contributions to the fund, says the Mothers' Magazine.

Pleas for Children. In an address to Bristol women, Senator Vardaman made a fervent plea for children. The Mississippi statesman, in dramatic oratory, appealed to the women as mothers to prevent their children from growing into men of the narrow, selfish type. "Does every child who comes into the world in your community have an equal chance with every other child to become a healthy, law-abiding citizen?" he asked. "Or are there institutions in your midst that take the children and dwarf their lives for the sake of adding gold to the fortune of men who are already overconscious of their wealth? The greatness of your municipality does not lie in its factories. Our town can only become great as the boys and girls get a chance to grow into robust manhood and womanhood. That you may give them this chance you must get rid of the institutions which make them machines for profit."

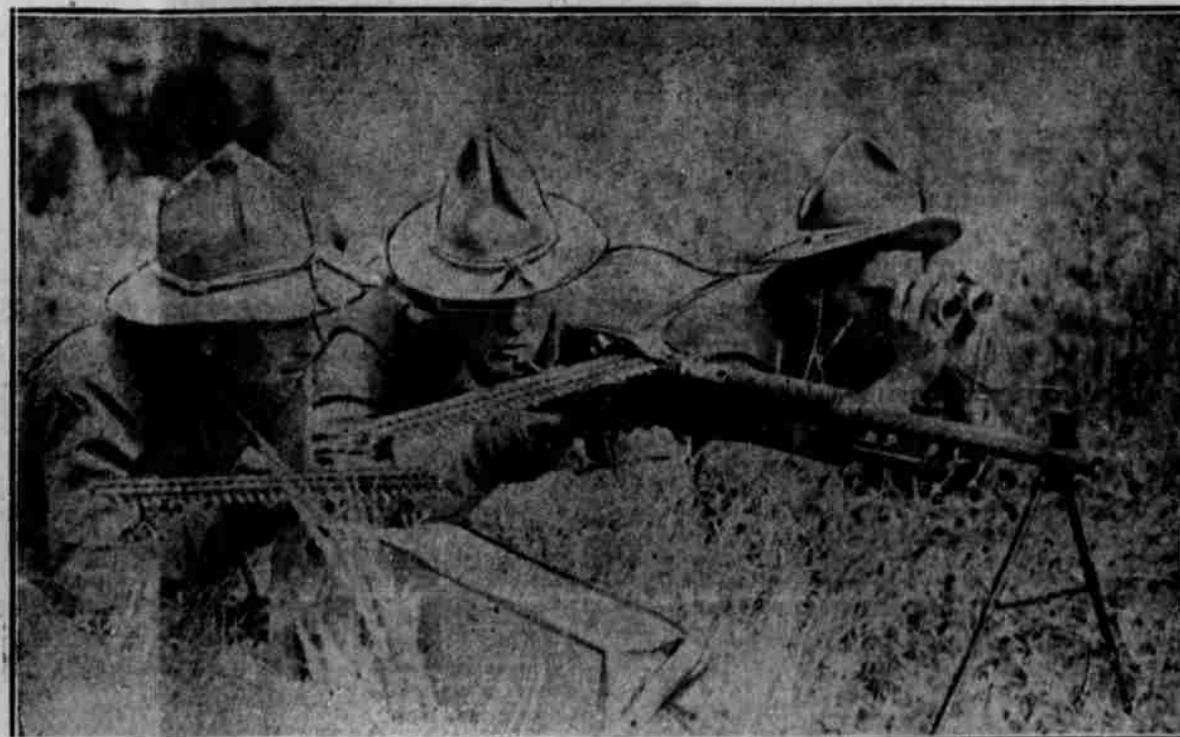

ENTHUSIASTIC WELCOME IS GIVEN DR. C. J. SMITH

(Continued from page one.)

When Dr. Smith was introduced by Chairman Peterson as one of the best beloved men of this community the crowd broke into applause that lasted several minutes and then died only to break forth afresh. The candidate for governor expressed his deep appreciation and gratitude for the reception accorded him in a way that left none in doubt as to how deeply he felt the honor.

In his remarks he did not defend himself from the charges made against him. He did not come here for that purpose. His friends of many years had arisen and vindicated him, and their vindication was so complete that he had no need to speak of his past. In forceful, clear and intelligent language he discussed the two principle issues of the campaign, economy in government and law enforcement.

He pointed out that the gross income of the state during the year was approximately \$150,000,000 and the taxation \$24,000,000 which was equivalent to taxing every head of a family \$160 or nearly 50 cents a day. He cited the \$2,000,000 legislature of 1903, in which he served, as one considered extravagant yet the legislature of 1913, he said, passed bills carrying appropriations aggregating \$6,551,000. He pleaded for the voters to look well to the candidates for legislative positions and he urged them all to give their support to a bill permitting the governor to veto single items in the appropriation bill.

In speaking of his law enforcement pledges, Dr. Smith used language direct and positive. It is an issue, he said, which no honest candidate for governor can ignore. The laws were made by the people, he said, and the surest test of their fitness for conditions is rigid enforcement. If, when enforced, they are found unsuitable, he said, the voters then have the power to repeal them.

What many considered Dr. Smith's strongest point in favor of law enforcement was his contention that the influx of immigrants to this state after the opening of the Panama canal would throw the state into lawlessness unless steps were taken immediately to curb the contempt for law. Within a few years, he predicted, the population of the state of Oregon will be doubled by the immigration of foreigners and, he said, if we are to rule our own land we must take a stand now for a brand of government that will make law-abiding citizens of these newcomers.

In closing Dr. Smith urged that the voters take as their slogan and their battle-cry these words, "Enforce the law, enforce the law."

Music was furnished at intervals during the meeting, an orchestra playing several selections and Mrs. J. S. Landers favoring the crowd with a beautiful vocal solo. Led by Mrs. Landers the audience sang "America" just prior to the address of Dr. Smith.
