## FROM THE PEOPLE

**SALING DENIES CHARGE.**

My opponent for the nomination for county clerk at the coming primaries has announced that he will work for a flat salary and has accused me of keeping fees coming into the office contrary to law. During my ten years in this office my books have been checked by expert accountants once every two years and it is shown by these reports, now on file, that all fees belonging to the county have been turned over and properly accounted for by me. I have retained no fees or other moneys belonging to the county and there is no fee system connected with the office. My compensation is and has been the flat salary provided by statute. I keep and retain as my personal money all money paid to me by home-steaders who make proof before me when I act in the capacity of a notary public or United States commissioner, and I also keep one-half of the naturalization fees which is so provided in the law and both these cases have been so decided by the supreme court of the state of Oregon. The total amount of all these fees does not exceed \$150 a year.

While my opponent is canvassing the county and urging voters to vote for him instead of me he is drawing a salary from the county as school supervisor to look after the schools in the west end of the county and is spending half of his time outside of his district but putting in his monthly expense bill for it just the same. If he takes this much advantage of the opportunities offered to draw a salary how much of the land proof and naturalization fees would be turned over to the county if elected?

I regret very much having to answer Mr. Yeager's charges, and would not have done so had he confined himself to the truth, but his abuse of my good nature and his disregard of truth has compelled me to again tell the people just what I am receiving in this office as I have openly told them during every campaign since first elected. I know that my friends and those who have known me all my life in Umatilla county understand the situation but there may be a few strangers who might get the impression from my opponent's broad assertions that I was growing rich on fees which I had refused to turn over to the county.

## NOTICE OF BIDS FOR STREET SPRINKLING.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the City Recorder in Pendleton, Oregon up to 5 o'clock P. M., on May 27th, 1914, for sprinkling the unpaved streets of The City of Pendleton, for the season of 1914. For the purpose of sprinkling, the City will be divided into districts as follows:

District No. 1—All that part of the City lying north of the Umatilla river.

District No. 2—All that part of the City of Pendleton, lying south of the Umatilla river, and East of Main street.

District No. 3—All that part of The City of Pendleton, lying South of the Umatilla River and West of Main street.

No street that has been paved to be included in the contract. Each bid must specify the price per man and team, per month, straight time, the man and team to be under direction of the Street Commissioner when not engaged in sprinkling. The City to furnish sprinkling wagon and water.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of \$100.00 made payable to the order of the Mayor of The City of Pendleton as an evidence of good faith, that the bid-

der will execute his contract if his bid is accepted by the Council. The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

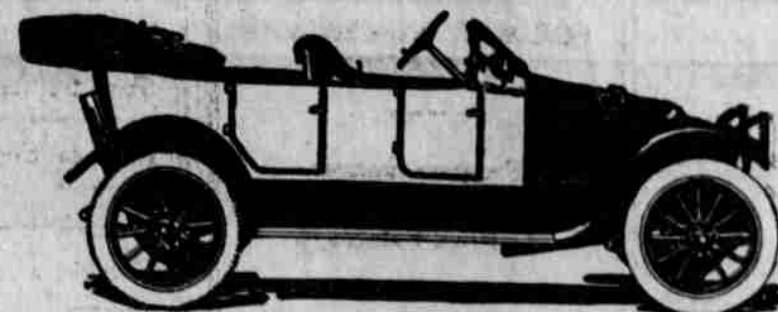
