Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Has Poisoned Hand.

Brown Has the Mumps.
D. C. Brown, well known linotype operator for the East Oregonian, is the latest of the many victims of mumps in the city.

Automobiles Collide.
Two automobiles driven by T. B. Swearingen and C. E. Engdahl collided yesterday afternoon on west Alta street at an intersection but no very great damage was done to either car. Neither car was traveling at any great rate of speed.

Bears Sold to Oaks.

Carload of Jerseys.

Baskets Made by Patients.
In the windows of the Frazier book store today is an exhibit of interest. It consists of baskets of all shapes and sizes made by patients in the industrial department of the eastern Oregon state hospital. The baskets are perfect pieces of handiwork, several of the patients being skilled weavers. They are made of white ash shipped from Hoboken, N. J.

Indian Boy's Arm Broken.
While running the laundry machine at the Indian agency yesterday, Samuel Walker, a 17 year old Indian boy, had his arm caught in the machinery and broken in two places. He was brought into the city by his stepfather, Charlie Van Pelt, and the fractures were reduced. The injury was a very painful one but no serious results are anticipated.

Kicked by a Horse.
John Myrick, well known farmer who lives seven miles west of Helix, is today reported improving from injuries received Sunday when he was kicked by a horse. The animal's hoof struck him on the right side just over the liver, fracturing one rib and doing internal injury. Dr. I. C. Temple, was called and today reports the patient showing signs of improvement.

Round-up Cowboys Star Again.
Several well known Round-up performers were winners in the recent rodeo held at Bakersfield, California. Art Acord, winner of the 1913 championship, made good his record by throwing his steer in 18 seconds. Happy Jack Hawn, former owner of Sharkey the bull, won first place in the cowboys' bucking contest and Mrs. Happy, who won the cowgirls' championship here last year, took first honors in Bakersfield also. Johnnie Dobbins, Skeeter Bill Robbins and Earl Simpson, all well known here, were prominent riders at the show. All will be at the Round-up this year.

Well Known Colored Man Dies.
A victim of typhoid fever, Leader Buckner, better known as Lee Buckner, well known colored stockman of Pilot Rick, died last night at the Buckner ranch east of that town. He had been suffering from the disease for some time past and gradually death won out in the fight against medical skill. Deceased was only 22 years old at the time of death. Though young and colored, he commanded a great deal of respect in his home community and had been successful in the stock-raising business. He was in partnership with Frank Michaels, running about 200 head of cattle on Fly creek. He is survived by a mother and several brothers.

STRIKEBREAKERS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RUN MINES

WASHINGTON, May 13.—No Colorado mines not already in operation will be allowed to resume with forces of strikebreakers, Garrison said positively today. The regulars he explained, were sent to the coal fields to restore order, not to break the strike.

The mines which were running when the federal soldiers arrived, he added, will be protected in continuing

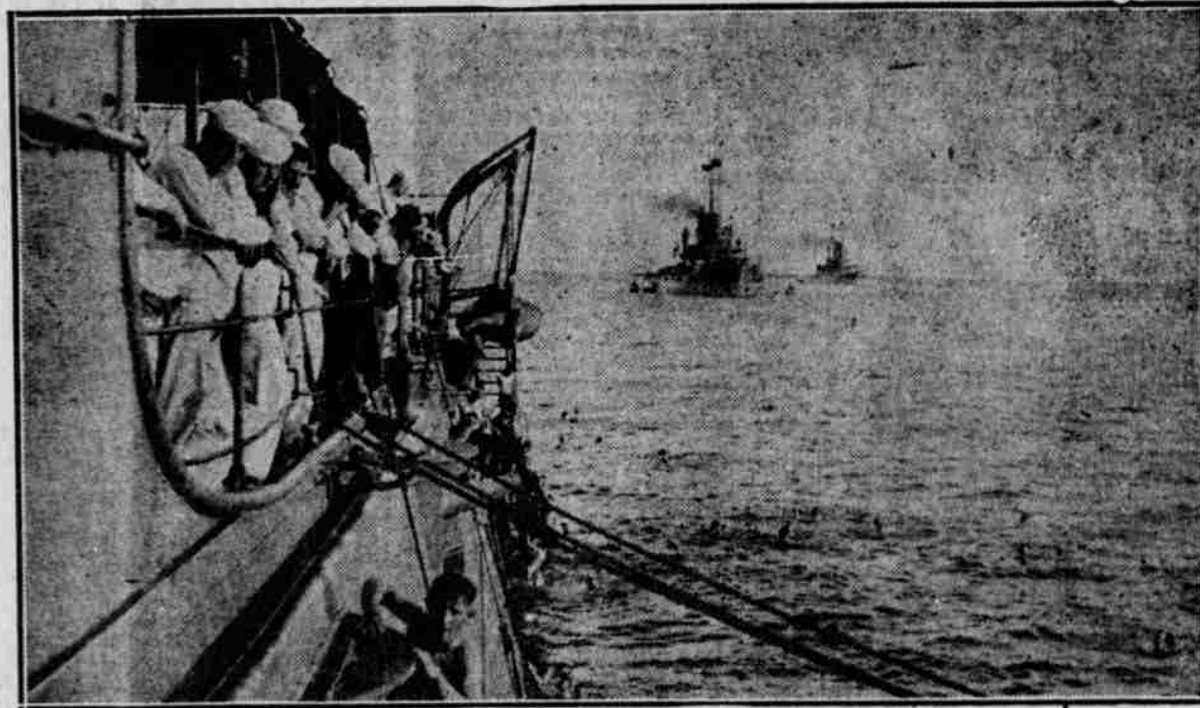
